

Oregon Schools Ready for Tournament Fight

Stanford Upsets Dope

Easy Victories Over Washington Come As Surprise To Northwest.

No bigger surprise has occurred in coast sports this season than Stanford's two-straight victory over the University of Washington for the conference basketball championship. After the Huskies had grabbed 10 games in a row from northern division rivals—including two from the runner-up Oregon State team—many lines were written describing the Washington combination as the most powerful ever seen in the north. At the time the assertion seemed correct. Then all of a sudden the Huskies hit the skids and dropped one to Idaho and two to Washington State.

While there was a hasty withdrawal of the unqualified opinion that Washington was the "best ever seen," the Huskies still were favored in the south. Stanford's drive to the championship was nothing short of remarkable. The Cards, you remember, lost two in a row to Washington before the conference season started. The champions had a pretty tough time taking the title in their own division from the Trojans. Perhaps that hot competition down south was just enough to bring out the best in the Stanford team.

No doubt about it that Hank Luisetti is just about the sweetest player to hit the conference.

Lanky Hank, it is understood, is but a sophomore. That means two more years of sensational basket shooting against northern and southern foes.

The championship was Stanford's first since 1921.

Card Manager Demands Dizzy Give Loyalty

BRADENTON, Fla., March 16. (AP)—Branch Rickey still insisted on the "loyalty oath" from Dixie Dean today. Trout Limit Ruling Continued By Board

PORTLAND, Ore., March 16. (UP)—State game commission Saturday decided to continue the no-length-limit on trout during 1936. Under the regulations, all trout taken, no matter of what length, should be kept by fishermen and counted as part of their limit which again was fixed at 20 fish or not to exceed 15 pounds in any one day. A special warden will be appointed to patrol Diamond lake. The trout season was fixed at from April 5 to October 31 inclusive. It will be the first Sunday trout fishing season opening in several years.

SIXTEEN ENTER TITLE RUNNING

Big Event Opens Wednesday Afternoon At Salem.

The state basketball tournament at Salem from Wednesday to Saturday will climax a great season, which produced an unusually large host of strong contenders for the state crown.

Sixteen fighting high school teams which had what it takes in the pinch, will represent their districts at the tournament, the biggest event of the year for high schools.

Roseburg Team Entered

The four final entrants were crowned the past week. Oregon City won the district four title from Milwaukie. Beffountain's sensational giant killers had little trouble striding through the district 16 tournament and beating Thurston 19 to 13 in the finals.

A new face at the state meet will be Roseburg, which beat Marshfield 22 to 21 for the district eight crown. Mill City became district 15 B league champion the second consecutive year, by edging out Wheeler 29 to 24.

For the first time B champions from four sections of the state entered the battle royal last year, and didn't have to beat "A" teams to do so. Four will come again this year, but will be bracketed among themselves for the first two rounds.

The winner of the second round will continue in the regular tournament and meet an "A" team the third round.

This makes a tournament of 16 in a tournament, so how about a "Little All-State" team, selected from the four "B" teams, Mr. Spec Keene, Mr. John Gray and other gentlemen who run the tournament? Then if any of the players were good enough—as was the case last year—they still would be eligible for the real all-state team.

Opening Games Important

An unusually good array of first-round games will greet tournament patrons the first day. Any one of half a dozen or more teams looms strong enough on paper to win the crown, so evenly matched (if somewhat up and down) have been the teams this season. Myrtle Creek's flashy five that won the southern Oregon invitational tournament, meets Mill City and Unplains meets Beffountain in the first round of the "B" division. Beffountain is the favorite to win and give the "A" teams a headache.

One of the classics should be the first round meeting of Astoria, twice defending champion, and Benson, for the second year Portland champion. The Portland teams have a full week to rest before the tournament for the first time in years, so may be more formidable than of late.

Ashland vs. Corvallis. Corvallis, labelled the team to beat, meets the darkhorse Ashland high quintet, which has quietly gone about winning this season, and carved a record comparable to any.

Roseburg's tournament bow will be against the rugged, hard-driving Franklin high Giants, who barely were nosed out of first place in the Portland league.

Possibly one of the fastest and most spectacular games of the tournament will be the first round meeting of Salem, host team, and Tillamook. Both teams use a super-fast breaking offense. Salem's size advantage will be somewhat offset by the marvelous ball handling of the speedy Cheesemakers. Frequently they bat in- and out of pass the ball.

The La Grande team, which hit a brilliant stride in its district tournament, will engage the Oregon City Pioneers. The final game of the first round, and the opening day, will throw the Bend high Lava Bears against the scrappy Milton-Freswater team, which has had an unusually bright season.

SNOW CARNIVAL SET APRIL 26

Event Will Be Held At Crater Lake Park Next Month.

April 26 was set as the tentative date of the Crater Lake Snow carnival at a joint meeting of Klamath Snow Clansmen, Rogue Snowmen and Crater Lake Ski club representatives in Crater lake park Sunday afternoon.

The April date was chosen because of the necessity of plowing out ample parking space for several hundred cars before the tournament. A study of park weather statistics and present snow conditions indicates that there will be ample snow on the ground in April for the tournament—as much or more than there was at the time of the tournament two years ago.

Tony Castel of the Crater Lake ski club suggested that a special feature of the tournament be a parade of champions of various ski clubs of the northwest and northern California. He proposed that the champion and runner-up of several clubs be invited to attend and to spend about three days in Southern Oregon as the guests of the clubs. These men would make exhibition jumps and other performances as a chief feature of the snow carnival.

The plan was discussed at length and will be definitely decided upon at a later date. Another joint planning meeting probably will be held at Medford next week.

There was also a discussion of the possibilities of conducting snow princess contests in Klamath Falls and Medford, naming two girls to rule jointly over the snow carnival. Decision on this will also be made later.

Many other matters were talked over and committees were appointed to plan for the hill construction and to see what can be done about getting relief for that project.

A meeting of the Klamath Snow Club has been called for the chamber of commerce for Wednesday night. All members are urged to be present.

Washington Downed Two Straight in Title Hoop Series.

PALO ALTO, Calif., March 16. (AP)—Champions of the Pacific coast for the first time since 1921, Stanford university basketball players looked back today on a topsy-turvy season topped off last week-end with victories over University of Washington for the conference title.

Luisetti Runs Wild Paced chiefly by Angelo "Hank" Luisetti, sharpshooting forward, the Indians took Washington's Huskies into camp Friday and Saturday nights to clinch to coast crown in the playoff series between the winners of the northern and southern divisions.
