Veteran Matman Victim of Cowboy's Attack

CHICK STOPS AL KARASICK

Russian Lion Fails to Revive After Airplane Spin.

For the seventh time in eight Klamath Falls matches, Dude Chick, Wyoming's cowboy-wrestler, won a main event clash at the armory last night.

Al Karasick, veteran Russian Lion from Portland, was the victim. George Wilson of Everett, Wash., is the only grappler who has stayed the route with Chick. The former University of Washington football player gained a draw two weeks ago and was then thumped down to defeat last week.

The Russian Lion had a brief but fatal mental lapse just before his defeat. Forced to let go of a Boston crab hold, Karasick momentarily turned his back to the cowboy. He was immediately hoisted on Chick's shoulders, spinned dizzily and then slammed to the floor.

Seconds worked over Karasick but failed to revive him in time to continue the match. The seconds were aided by Louie Polin, the Lion's most faithful follower in Klamath Falls.

Karasick, working carefully and strongly, gained the opening fall in 25 minutes and 26 seconds of hard wrestling. The advantage came with a Boston crab hold.

Chick's fall required but one minute and 20 seconds.

The match was a tough one. Both wrestlers used every hold they knew. Dude's bulldog headlocks were futile, and Karasick, until he clamped on the first Boston crab, found all his tricks to no avail.

The armory was well filled for the match.

Ken Hollis of Arkansas won the battle of the ruffians in the semi-windup by trifling Mike Caddock of Honolulu in one fall. Caddock was trapped in a Boston crab in the second round. He was unable to resume the match.

Barney Conneck of Chicago made a successful debut in the opening match by winning from Stanley Rogers of Texas. Conneck took a fall in the second with a wristlock and another in the fourth with a wristlock. Rogers won one fall in the third with a Boston crab.

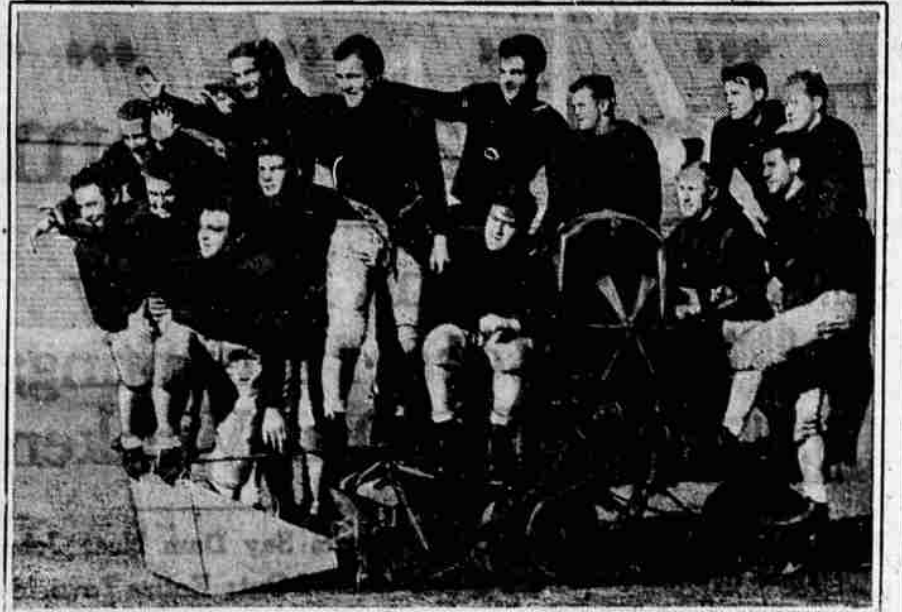

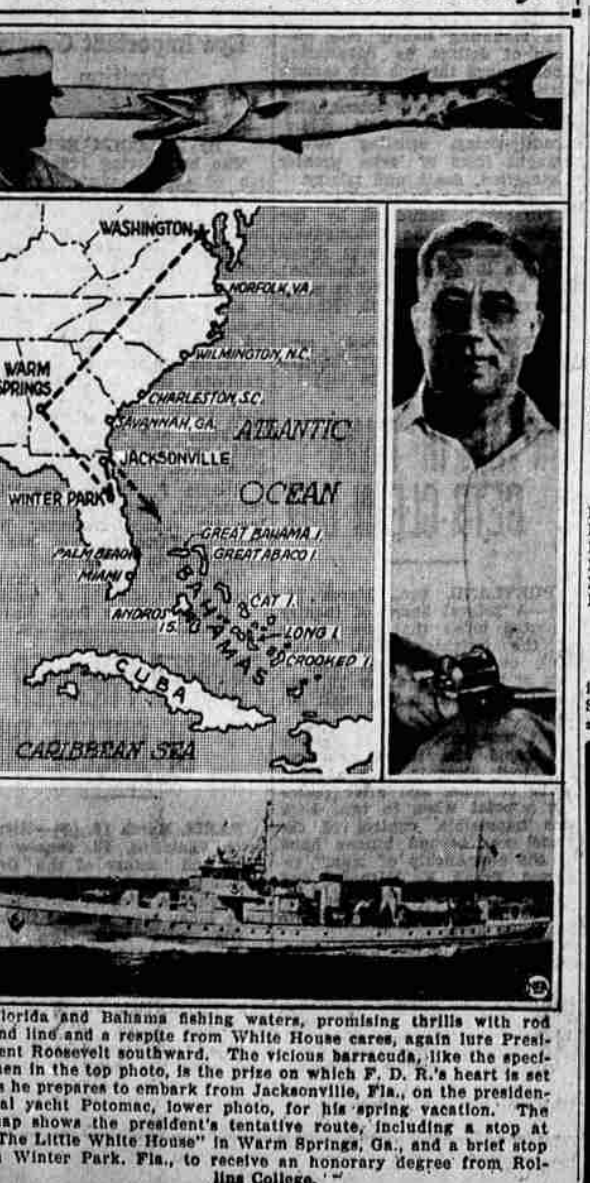
Football, Track Workouts Held

Strong Midwest Teams Leading Denver Event

DENVER, March 18 (AP)—The midwest basketball belt, which has enforced an almost absolute monopoly on national championships since 1921, sent more teams than from any other section of the country into the third round of the A. A. U. tournament today.

Seven midwestern outfits, led by the defending champion Santa Fe Trails of Kansas City, passed triumphantly through heavy firing yesterday.

Oregon's entrant, the Oregon Normal Wolves from Monmouth, put up a good battle before losing to the veteran team of the Penn Athletic club, 38 to 27.

Of the remaining nine quintets still in the contention, the Rocky mountain area is represented by four, the east and the Pacific coast by two apiece and the deep south by one.
