WHEAT GOES DOWN LATE WEDNESDAY

CHICAGO, March 18. (AP)—Wheat dropped late today to the lowest level since the middle of last month.
A wave of liquidating sales on the part of holders was attributed more or less to the fact that on all rallies lately to above \$1 a bushel the wheat market had encountered sharp resistance. A tumble of oats values to new low records for the season was a contributing bearish influence.
Wheat closed nervous, 1/4 to 1 cent under yesterday's finish. May 97 3/8-98, July 88 3/4, corn 1 1/4-1 1/2 off, May 80 1/4-80 3/4, oats 1/2-1/2 off, and provisions unchanged to a rise of 17 cents.

Stock Market Quotations

NEW YORK, March 18. (AP)—Aviation and specialty issues helped to prop up a generally shaky stock market today.

Floods sweeping through the east appeared responsible for depressing some divisions of the list. Otherwise, domestic and foreign news was brighter. The close was irregular. It was the duller session in nearly two months, transfers approximating only 1,700,000 shares.

The European situation, apparently growing calmer day by day, again was less of a market factor.

Business and industrial developments were being studied more closely.
Aircraft equities reflected hopes of new plane orders both from governmental and private sources.

Improvement was recorded by shares of Columbia Carbon and Spicer Mfg., Douglas, International Harvester, American Can, United Aircraft, North American Aviation, Seaboard Oil, Consolidated Gas, Great Northern Preferred and Chesapeake & Ohio.

Losses up to 2 points or so included U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, Chrysler, Westinghouse, Case, American Telephone, Western Union, N. Y. Central, Pennsylvania and Southern Pacific. Butterick stock dropped a full point on announcement that the issue would be stricken from the list next Wednesday. The company is under reorganization.

Commodities were mixed and foreign currencies were narrow in terms of the dollar. Bonds were fairly steady.

The main building will be ready for occupancy at the beginning of the next school year.

Salem Starts Civil Service

SALEM, March 18. (UP)—A movement to repeal Salem's civil service regulations for police, firemen and firemen was started Tuesday as result of indictment of Police Chief Frank A. Minto and Sergeant O. G. Coffey.
Mayor V. E. Kuhn said an ordinance repealing civil service would be introduced at next Monday's council meeting, with his recommendation for approval. If the ordinance passes, repeal of civil service will be referred to the voters in May.
