ROMILLY SINGERS WIN MUCH PRAISE

The Romilly boy singers, who appeared at the First Presbyterian church Tuesday evening of this week, presented one of the most remarkable programs ever to be heard in Klamath Falls, one that would be outstanding in any community. They hail from Barry, South Wales, where the music-minded Welsh have been outstanding as singers for generations. They are the product of 30 years of careful training in the public schools.

Virtually all of the musicians of the city were present in the audience that taxed the capacity of the auditorium, with many standing throughout the whole program.

One musician said of the concert, "The most wonderful singing I ever heard. The Presbyterian church should be congratulated in bringing such outstanding singers to the city."

Still another said of the whole program, "Very delightful; the soloists were exquisite; the harmony was remarkable. It shows what can be done in the public schools where teachers know how to handle children's voices. Of course, we have in this country voices that could be trained like that."

An outstanding vocal teacher said: "The concert was lovely. It was as nearly perfect as it is possible to be. I never enjoyed a concert more. I cannot recall a finer program ever presented in the city."

Still another added, "It was splendid throughout. It was simply thrilling."

The general audience, representing the highest degree of culture of the city, was enthusiastic. Those who were privi-

leged to entertain the boys over-night regarded it as a rare privilege.

After a trip to the north, the boys are to return to Hollywood, where they are to be filmed and sing in a Romeo and Juliet scene. This is the first tour that this organization has made in the United States, and it is possible, even probable that they may return a year from now.
