

STEVENSON TALKS ON ANCIENT EGYPT

MALIN, March 19.—Egypt's eminence in science and art, its advanced civilization and ancient history even before the birth of the great modern nations and the perfection of the Great Pyramid of Gizeh, mightiest of the more than 40 in that near eastern country were the subject of a forceful lecture delivered to an eager audience by Dr. R. M. Stevenson, Sunday night in the Presbyterian church. The lecture is one of a series that Dr. Stevenson plans to give in the next few weeks covering some of the most vital history of the ages.

There is no architecture in the world comparable to the stupendous ruins of the temple of Carus and Luxor nor is there any other building in existence equal in perfection to the Great Pyramid, according to Dr. Stevenson, who in his travels has visited many of the world's most interesting places.

Scientific knowledge at the time of the building of the Great Pyramid was much in advance of our present day knowledge, proved by the fact that the structure is the only one in existence with perfect orientation, its sides facing exactly north, south, east and west.

Dr. Stevenson also touched briefly on the fall of Jerusalem, most besieged city in all the world, which without shedding of blood or loss of life to the entrance of General Allenby during the World war.

According to Dr. Stevenson, who during the war served as a surgeon in the Australian army, Allenby, unwilling to fire on the

Oregon Bootleg Liquor Business Shows Decrease

SALEM, March 19. (U.P.)—Increased sales of hard liquor in 1935 resulted from decline of bootlegging, and temperance is gaining in Oregon, the liquor control commission reported Wednesday to Governor Martin.

"Consumption of wine and beer increased during 1935, and if that trend continues it is not too much to hope that consumption of hard liquors will drop," the commission said.

In accordance with the aim of the Knox law, the commission said it recognizes that its most important task is "to supply the demand for alcoholic beverages without encouraging increased consumption of them."

Bootlegging virtually has been eliminated, because it has been made unprofitable, said Chairman Arthur K. McMahon, and Commissioners James D. Burns and Stanley G. Jewett.

A revision against law violation which followed repeal of prohibition, the commission asserted, also has aided in eliminating bootleggers.

Serious and humorous entries are to be given in two divisions, with students of the seventh and eighth grades competing and entrants in the second division drawn from the fifth and sixth grades. The program will begin at 8:00 o'clock.

Four winners are to be selected and the public is cordially invited to attend. No admission charge is to be made.

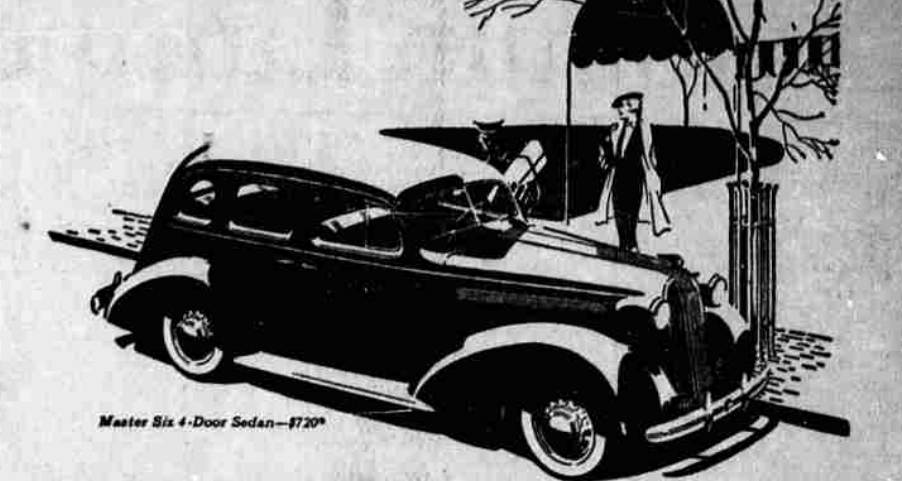
