

RAT EXTERMINATOR OPENS DRIVE HERE

Miss Helen Caldwell, who has exterminated rats and mice in some of the best cities of the United States, is going to try her hand on the Klamath Falls rodents.

Miss Caldwell arrived here Thursday, direct from long-run engagements in Portland, Portland and Marshfield. She went first to city hall, where she obtained a written recommendation for her campaign from J. A. Hunt, city meat and milk inspector.

"From a health and economic standpoint, this (rat and mouse extermination) would be advisable," Hunt wrote cautiously.

More than willing to take the bull by the horns, Miss Caldwell was to launch her offensive Friday in the warehouse districts, promising, in six easy lessons, to teach the wholesalers how to put rodents on the side.

Next victims of the Caldwell campaign will be the members of the Genus Mus Merchantorum, known vulgarly as rats and mice of the business district.

With the situation well in hand on the downtown front, Miss Caldwell will advance on the residential sections, where, house by house, block by block, she will pursue her relentless drive against the little grey beasts.

In two weeks' time, Miss Caldwell estimates, neither rat nor mouse will dare venture within the city limits. Then Miss Caldwell will once again pack her poison kit and push on to greener pastures.

Miss Caldwell is a graduate of Vanderbilt university, where she majored in chemistry and developed a yen for travel. Now

she is killing two birds along with countless rodents—making herself a job and seeing the country.

Besides being a rat and mouse exterminator, Miss Caldwell is a rat and mouse statistician.

"Do you know," she says, "knowing very well that you don't, that there are twice as many rats and mice in every community as there are people? And do you know that rodents cost \$1.82 a head annually to feed?"

Her culminating assertion leaves you gasping. "In three years," Miss Caldwell says, "a pair of rats or mice can have 359,000,000 descendants."
