Locey Well-Known in Football

New Oregon State Assistant Dean Former Olympic Club and Denver University Coach. City League Offers Good Basketball in Title Series.

Percy Locey, who goes to Oregon State college as assistant dean of men, has been one of the best known men in far western athletics.

Although Locey's new position will have no official connection with athletics, many Oregon Staters believe he will have considerable influence with the Beaver sport program.

Locey, 41 years of age, graduated from Corvallis in 1924. He was a football star of coast-wide reputation.

He headed the Olympic club football teams, and then went to Denver university as coach.

Dr. Hunter, chancellor of higher education in Oregon, is the former president of Denver university.

Hunter became acquainted with Locey in California, and it was through him that the new Oregon State assistant dean went to Denver.

These last three games—the championship series—will mean much to the City league. As pointed out before, the league has struggled through a season of poor attendance.

Texan Appointed Backfield Coach for Card Eleven

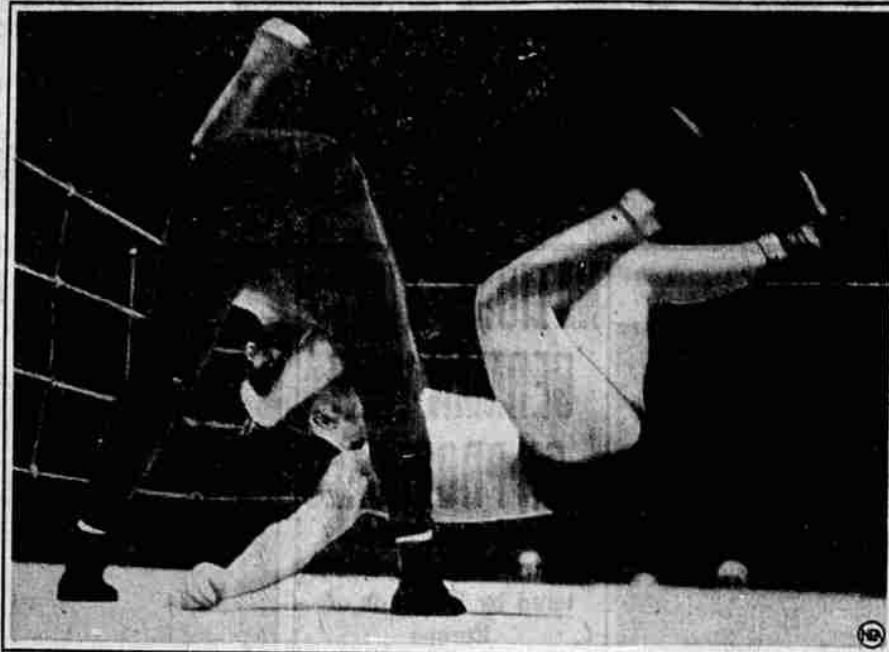

SALEM, March 21. (UP)—A group of state department employes who fought in the Spanish American and World wars today organized the "National Association of Profiteers of Future Wars."

"We fought in the last wars," said Rufus White, president of the Salem chapter No. 1. "We agree to handle all supplies for the armed forces of the next war. We'll construct cantonments and handle all other war-time expenditures on a basis of cost plus 25 per cent. We'll even pass on 5 per cent of our profits to the men who do the fighting."

Mangan Leading Candidate for Olympic Honors

TORONTO, March 21. (AP)—Joe Mangan, who studies law at Cornell, plunks a mean ball, his spins moments and runs mile races with considerable success, evidently isn't worried about the danger of being "burned out" by too much competition in the Olympic year.

While his winter rivals, Glenn Cunningham of Kansas and Gene Venzeke of Pennsylvania, remained idle, Mangan has stepped out twice in the last few days to smash the Canadian mile record.

After running a mile in 4:16.3 at Houston, Wednesday, slipping three-tenths of a second from Cunningham's Canadian indoor mark, but logging to an opponent who had at 40-yard handicap, Mangan cut loose last night and won the mile feature at the Maple Leaf Garden's games in 4:16.2.

Frank Nordell of the New York A. C. made a great effort to keep pace, but faded at the finish, and was third behind Bill Daley of Detroit university.

The sprinting feats of Helen Stephens (last year's champion), and the rivalry between the dusky speedsters, Eulace Peacock of Temple and Sammy Richardson of Toronto, furnished other features of the meet.

Miss Stephens broke the Canadian record for the 60-yard dash in 6.9 seconds, and equalled the 50-yard mark of 6 seconds flat.

Peacock beat out Richardson by inches in the 60-yard men's dash as both equalled the Canadian record of 6.2 seconds. Richardson made a record leap of 24 feet 10 inches, 13 inches better than Peacock's winning jump last year, to take the broad jump. Peacock was third behind Milton Green of Harvard.

High jump: Al Threlgill, Temple, 6 feet 7 3/4 inches; Cornelius Johnson, Compton, Calif., junior college, second.

Soil Conservation Farmers Will Get \$10 Acre Benefits

WASHINGTON, March 21. (UP) Farmers who cooperate in the new deal farm program will get federal benefits averaging \$10 an acre for substituting "soil conservation" crops in place of those which deplete fertility of their land.

The program is designed to encourage reduction of the crops in which surpluses have accumulated.

The practical effect will be to pay cotton farmers slightly more than last year for reducing their crops, while producers of wheat, corn and a number of other commodities will receive about half what they got in 1935.

The conference revealed that plans have not progressed to the point where an individual farmer can tell exactly what his reward will be for following the government's suggestions as to the use of his land.

Brooklyn May Be Stumbling Block for Many Nationals

CLEARWATER, Fla. March 21. (AP)—The "Daffiness Boys" from Brooklyn may be the nightmares of the 1936 National league pennant race.

Casey Stengel's crew, a set of strange faces to the rabid fans of Flatbush, probably will fumble and stumble with an uncertain infield but they'll spread no little misery among the hot pennant contenders with one of the slickest pitching stiffs in baseball.

I'm not going around predicting a pennant for my boys," said Casey, "but we're going to make the road rocky for a lot of ball clubs. My pitching staff, I figure is the best we've had at Brooklyn for years. My big worry is the infield, but I'm running my boys out there in 24-hour shifts in an attempt to get a good lineup. I also have worries about the outfield but have a lot of talent."

Acquisition of Fred Frankhouse and Dutch Brandt from Boston have rounded out the hurling staff, Van Lingle Mungo, the fire baller, will be the number one man assisted by Brandt, Frankhouse, Watson Clark and Big George Earnshaw.

Outfield Looks Good. Emil Leonard, six foot right-hander, also is slated for a regular berth with his old teammate, Raymond Herres, to catch him. The ever reliable Tom Zachary, 39-year-old relief ace, completes the staff.

Every spot in the infield, however, is open except shortstop where Linois Frey expects to operate. Bud Hassett, the crooner, Dick Selbert, and Randy Moore are all candidates for first base.

Vince Sherlock, obtained from Indianapolis, should plug up the second base hole. Jersey Joe Stripp, a holdout, may have to battle to keep his job at third away from Jim Bucher, a converted outfielder, who can give the ball a ride. E. Gordon (Fatty) Phelps, who hit .364 last season until he broke his right hand, and Berres should hold up a catching staff weakened by the trade of Al Lopez to Boston.
