Sessions of the conference will be held at the Masonic Temple, and national defense will be particularly stressed during the two-day meeting, according to Mrs. Mark V. Weatherford, state regent. Mrs. Weatherford has designated Tuesday, March 24, as "national defense" day.

Featured as principal speaker at the opening meeting to be held Tuesday evening will be Dr. Raymond R.
