FRANKLIN GETS SECOND PLACE

Bellfountain Wins "B" Division Title At Salem Tourney.

SALEM, March 23. (AP) — Two brilliant hoop teams from Benton county, in the heart of the Willamette valley, held the "A" and "B" league prep school basketball championships of Oregon today as a result of decisive victories in the last two games of the state tourney.

Corvallis, in a class by itself throughout the meet, culminated an unbeatable drive to defeat Franklin High of Portland 34 to 20 for the state title before a capacity house of 2,600 wildly cheering spectators Saturday night.

Bellfountain finishes third. Bellfountain, which won the "B" league honors only to lose to Corvallis in a hard-fought semi-final game, triumphed over Milton-Freewater 29 to 17 to take third place in tourney rankings. Franklin, unbeaten until its final game, placed second.

The Corvallis team played spectacular ball throughout the meet, coasted when the occasion allowed, showed bursts of tremendous speed when scores were needed and won commendation from officials as one of the finest quintets ever entered in Oregon tournament play.

Warren, center, and Kruger, guard—both all-stars—and Blackledge, forward, led the team in a brilliant drive which even Franklin's fast-breaking and determined quintet was unable to match.

Astoria Gains Fourth. The titlists won over Ashland 49 to 18. Astoria, defending champions, 46 to 26, Bellfountain 34 to 25 and finally Franklin 24 to 20.

Bellfountain jumped into the lead over Milton-Freewater soon after the opening gun and never was badly pressed. Score was 29 to 17. Only one player, Kolbers, was able to cop more than a single field goal for the losers.

Wallace, Bellfountain guard, was high scorer with 11 points. In the consolation bracket, the defenders from Astoria salvaged a bit of past glory by staging a needed and spectacular last-period rally to defeat Tillamook 43 to 26 for fourth place.

Sarpola, Astoria forward, named on the all-state team for the third consecutive year, tossed in nine field goals for 18 points to prove his right to the berth.

In the other consolation game, Benson of Portland had a difficult time edging out a 21 to 17 victory over the host team, Salem. The Portlanders led most of the way but never by a comfortable margin.

Other teams in the meet included Umpine, Ashland, Roseburg and La Grande, who lost their first two games, and Mill City, Bend, Myrtle Creek and Oregon City, who turned in one win each but also were ousted from further tournament play by losing two.

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John Woodward of Washington Wins Ski Race

GOVERNMENT CAMP, Ore., March 23. (AP)—John Woodward, University of Washington skier, led the Huskies to a decisive victory in the three-event Reed college invitation ski tournament on Mount Hood.

The Huskies piled up 300 points. Woodward took first places in the slalom and cross-country races and placed fourth on the dead-hill course.

Reed college placed second with 218.4 points. College of Puget Sound third with 211, and Washington State college fourth, with 181.3.

The Huskies won all five first places in the cross-country, four of the first five places in the slalom and four in the slalom.

Woodward paced the slalom in 52.6 seconds, and the cross-country in 32:10. His teammate, Bob Higman, won the down-hill in 9:08 in a hazardous dash over a 34-mile course.

The usual half-mile course was swept by a blizzard, necessitating the change.

Astoria Second to Corvallis in High Scoring

SALEM, March 23. (AP)—Compilation of state basketball tournament scores showed today Astoria, fourth-place team, scored 162 points—only one behind Corvallis—and that Tillamook, seventh in ranking, piled up 156 for third in scoring honors.

Highest individual scorer was Ted Sarpola, all-state Astoria forward, who counted for 59 points. Other leaders: Moore, Tillamook, 50; Hansen, Franklin, 45; Kruger, Corvallis, 43; Kessler, Bellfountain, 42.

Astoria's 60 to 26 defeat of Milton-Freewater came within five points of tying the tournament record of 65 points, scored by Eugene in 1932.

Sarpola's 27 points against Myrtle Creek tied the single-game individual tournament scoring record set by Wardlow Howell of Ashland in 1931.

Benton county won the state and "B" league championships (Corvallis and Bellfountain); provided the best all-around sportsman (Wallace, Bellfountain); took two places on the all-state first team (Kruger and Warren, Corvallis), and placed three men on the all-state "B" team (Kessler, Wallace and S. Buckingham, Bellfountain).

Bellfountain offered Corvallis the most stubborn resistance of the tourney, losing only by nine points—34 to 25.

Karasick, winning one and losing one here since returning from the southwest, will meet Norman Mack, 185-pound husky from Oklahoma. It will be Mack's first showing in Klamath Falls.

Since going to California several months ago, Belcastro's style of wrestling has improved considerably. Marsh is wrestling here for the first time.

With one victory here already accounted for, Barney Cosneck of Illinois will make his second appearance in the opening match. The mid-westerner is scheduled to tackle Prince Mihailias, an Arabian, in six ten minute rounds.

U.C.L.A. Boxer Dies Following Amateur Fight

SACRAMENTO, March 23. (AP)—Funeral services will be arranged today for Judson Hobart, 17-year-old University of California at Los Angeles student, who died yesterday from head injuries received in a college boxing match.

The youth in a final bout for the Pacific coast inter-collegiate welterweight championship, was knocked out by Robert Bates of Washington State college. Bates was absolved from all blame by Assistant District Attorney J. Francis O'Shea, who witnessed the match.

Hobart suffered a basal skull fracture, physicians at Sutter hospital said, caused not when punched but on hitting the floor of the ring. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. H. M. Hobart of Sacramento, were spectators at the fatal fight.

The young boxer never regained consciousness, dying several hours after being carried from the ring.

I. P. Toomey, boxing coach of California Agricultural college, said Hobart's death was the first fatality in Pacific coast inter-collegiate boxing in 27 years.

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
