

Grade School All-Star Quintet Selected

How the Golf Game Has Grown

Sport Becomes Major Industry. Game Commission Ruling Well-Received Here.

The so-called major athletics—football, basketball, baseball, track and so on—really don't cast a shadow on golf, angling, bowling, tennis and all other sports that involve the individual rather than the team.

Few persons, comparatively speaking, are members of teams, but thousands swing golf clubs, tennis rackets or drop a fly along the edge of a pool.

To give you an idea of the scope of these more individual sports, the United Press has conducted a survey of the golf world.

Millions of dollars are spent in the United States to supply equipment to the hordes of players on 5717 golf courses.

New York leads the nation in the total number of courses with 461, both private and public. Illinois is second with 377 and Texas third with 272. Delaware with only seven courses has the fewest of any state.

California is about the only state that has suffered a decrease in golf. There, where the climate is reckoned so ideal, the number of courses has dropped off from 276 last year to 241 now.

The survey says there are \$30,039,398 invested in the American golf plant. Over fifteen million dollars are spent annually for golf balls, sixteen million for golf clubs and nearly three million for golf bags.

The state game commission, following the suggestion of the Klamath Sportsmen Association, has been commended for the change of season on the Klamath river. The new dates will give the Klamath country all year angling without damage to the stock.

The river is an excellent sport stream but in the summer months fish caught there are usually thrown away. Cold weather fishing on the Klamath will not only prevent this situation, but it will also preserve the fish. Not so many anglers will fish the river in winter as in summer and the fish taken from October 31 to June 1 will go into the fryer pan rather than the garbage can.

Bobby Grayson, former Portland boy, has told Tiny Thornhill he is willing to join the Cardinal coaching staff this fall. The reason is \$15,000. Bobby, all-American fullback, was willing to play some professional ball but that was his price. He couldn't get it, so he is ready to take up a coaching career at a smaller rate of pay.

Grange, one of the greatest collegiate players during his three years of competition at Illinois, would like to become a coach. Chinese Battalions Save Missionaries From Communists

PEIPING, March 24. (UP)—Six American missionaries, isolated in communist-infested Taiiku, Shanai province, were safe Monday after 2000 regulars of Marshal Yen Hai-Shan's 32nd army arrived to reinforce the city's defenses.

Arrival of the loyal troops relieved fears that the communists under the famed General Mao Tse Tung would capture and sack Taiiku.

Meanwhile, Japanese military observers announced that 2000 reds captured Chinyuan, 60 miles west of Taiiku in the communist-infested area of southern Hopei province.

The British embassy announced that 12 British missionaries, connected with the China inland mission, have fled their stations as refugees to Pingyangfu in southern Shanai province.

British authorities have asked the Chinese to protect missionaries at concentration points against attacks by communists.

Brazil Placed Under 90-Day Martial Law

RIO DE JANEIRO, Brazil, March 24. (UP)—The government Monday proclaimed a state of war, a measure similar to martial law, throughout the republic for a period of 90 days.

The measure was invoked by the government in its struggle against communism and other extremist activities in Brazil.

Senator Abel Chermont, who recently represented Arthur Ewart, alias Harry Barker, foreign communist, in the latter's unsuccessful petition for a writ of habeas corpus, was arrested.

Touhy Convicted Of Mail Robbery

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., March 24. (UP)—Tommy Touhy, last of the terrible Touhys who once ruled Chicago's gangland, was convicted Monday of participation in the \$20,000 mail robbery at the Milwaukee depot here in 1933.

A jury of 10 men and two women returned the guilty verdict against the ailing gangster after deliberating three and a half hours.

Fight That Periled Boxer's Life

Browns Become Stumbling Block For Contenders

WEST PALM BEACH, Fla., March 24. (AP)—The St. Louis Browns, who have been the stumbling block of the impending American league road race.

As last season, when they defeated the Yankees out of the lead and placed the Tigers on the four lane highway to the pennant, Rogers Hornsby and his crew have no hopes of winning the flag, but they expect to have a lot to say about who will. Turning the red light on the speeders is their specialty.

Fifth place is Hornsby's goal, and he generally gets what he's after.

"We'll have substantially the same club as we had at the finish of last season except that we'll be a bit smoother with our experience of playing together," said the Rajah, "so I figure we should have no great amount of trouble jumping a couple of notches. With Detroit, Boston, Cleveland and New York to contend with, our only reasonable hope can be fifth place. Canada Approves Trade Agreement

OTTAWA, Ont., March 24. (UP)—Canadian-American trade agreement was approved by the house of commons Monday and sent to the senate for concurrence.

In a last minute attack on the pact, Opposition Leader R. B. Bennett predicted the treaty would be a "calamity" to Canadian interests.

Minister of Finance Charles A. Dunning answered by quoting trade figures between the two countries since the agreement went into operation to show that "the calamity forecast is not yet on its way."

Karasick, Belcastro Take Featured Spots on Mat Program.
