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on the part of all naval powers, will serve to prevent a naval race.

He said the American government regretted that the instrument "falls short of our best hopes in that it makes no provision for quantitative reduction and limitation."

Cut Not To Be Expected

He said that the international situation was responsible for this fact and that, "in the circumstances, a drastic reduction of naval armaments was manifestly not to be expected."

"We have undertaken," he said, "to keep each other informed not only of our current construction in navies but also of our projected construction. We undertake to notify each other of all vessels which we contemplate laying down."

"Anyone who thinks for a moment will recognize the manifest advantages of such an undertaking."

"Dread of the unknown has been a seriously disturbing factor in international relations. The fear of what your neighbor is about to do causes distrust and suspicion which may in turn lead to a competitive increase in armaments."

"We hope to eliminate this fear in respect of naval armaments by telling each other frankly and honestly, in advance, of our intentions."

"We believe that such an act will tend to regulate the rapidly and development of the construction of one nation that it cannot be regarded as a menace to others."

Davis, on behalf of the United States, was the first diplomat to sign the treaty.

Davis told American correspondents at a luncheon that the new treaty would prevent a race in sea armaments.

"I can assure you," he said, "that the United States has not been involved in European affairs by this treaty. In fact, we hope and feel that it will contribute to European appeasement."

The new pact, replacing the Washington naval limitations treaty of 1922 and the London

treaty of 1930 limited neither the number nor the tonnage of the fleets of the three participating powers, but introduced a new scheme for advance notification of naval building programs.

Delegates to the conference which shaped the new treaty expressed hope that the program for exchanges of information would curb any sea armaments race for at least six years.

The new treaty also limited the sizes of the individual types of warships and inaugurated a building holiday for the larger type of cruisers, in place of the battleship building holiday which endured for 14 years under the expiring Washington treaty.

American and British spokesmen conceded that the chances of quantitative limitation of navies had been dead for more than a year as a result of the denunciation of the Washington and London pacts by Japan, demanding full fleet equality with the world.

The terms of the new treaty, the spokesmen said, contained all that could have been expected from the conference.
