

## INFORMATION OBTAINED FOR PENSION PLAN

New information on the old age assistance program under the social security act was brought back to Klamath Falls Wednesday by County Judge George Grizzle and Relief Director Phyllis Hartog Whittlesey, following a conference at Medford.

In April, assistance will be given only to those people who have been receiving old age pensions from the county. The staff of the county relief agency will be busy in April making new investigations of these county pensioners.

As soon as this work can be cleared, the staff will begin receiving new applications for old age assistance.

Those who qualify must be 70 years of age. They must have lived in the state five years some time in the past decade, and one year preceding the application. There must be no one who can support the applicant, and he must be an American citizen.

It was emphasized that there is no assurance of the amount to be paid monthly under the old age assistance plan.

A meeting of the Klamath county relief committee has been called for Thursday morning. At the relief office here it was stated that the work of the staff will be facilitated if prospective applicants for old age assistance wait until after the April program is completed before making application.

## Merrill Resident Reported Slugged

Albert Dyer of Merrill was slugged over the head and robbed of approximately \$22 in cash about 5:00 o'clock Tuesday afternoon at the corner of Commercial and Elm streets, according to police reports.

Officers were called by employees of a near-by used car lot who found Dyer. According to his story two men invited him to go with them to their cabin in that vicinity. When he refused, they attacked him, and in the scuffle struck him over the head and stole his purse. He was not seriously injured.

## Sugarman Observes 30th Year in Klamath

## RED CROSS CLASS OPENS TONIGHT

A class in advanced first aid was to open at the fire station tonight under the sponsorship of the Klamath Falls chapter of the American Red Cross.

Ralph E. Carlson of the San Francisco office will conduct the course. Classes will be held five consecutive nights starting at 8:00 o'clock.

Only those who have taken the standard course within the last three years will be eligible to attend the classes. Those taking the examinations will qualify as first aid instructors. Each meeting of the class will be for three hours.

The naval officer, 73, living in retirement after a distinguished career, was shot down before the eyes of his wife Monday night by four men who broke into the admiral's secluded residence. Police kept the slaying secret until last night.

The vice-admiral was senior naval officer at Halifax, N. S., in 1917, and was engaged during part of the war in patrol and

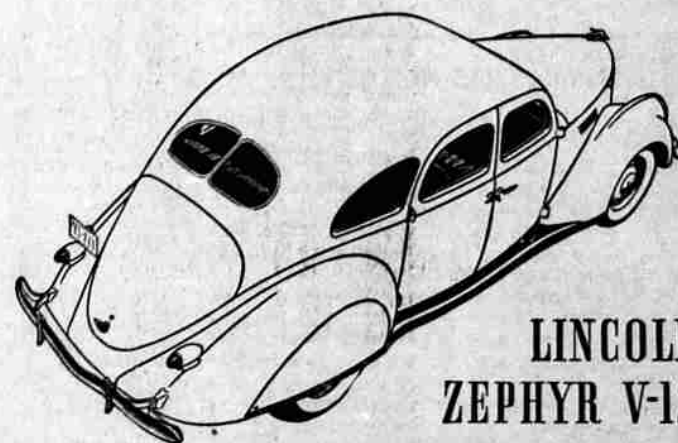
