SENATOR ASSAILS HEARST NEWSPAPERS

WASHINGTON, March 26, (AP)—Senator Minton (D., Ind.), a member of the senate lobby committee, today accused William Randolph Hearst, the publisher of "prostituting" his newspapers for his own private interests.

Minton made his accusation in a speech on the senate floor as the committee was preparing to file its reply to a suit brought in District of Columbia supreme court by the publisher to prevent use of certain of his telegrams seized by the committee in its investigation into lobbying.

"He is the greatest menace to freedom of the press in the country," the Indian said, as he interrupted the senate's routine "business hour" to attack Hearst.

Hovey has been located at Canby for some weeks past, superintending the construction of the mill and 24 miles of logging railroad.

He was enthusiastic over the operation, and the future of that district. The Walker-Hovey company also has large timber holdings between Klamath Falls and Bly.

Hovey was popular among all classes with which he came in contact. A keen business man and energetic worker, he drove himself harder than his employees.

He is survived by his widow, and one son, Charles Hovey, who has been engaged in the mill construction operation at Canby.

INJURED YOUTH FREES MOTHER

SANTA BARBARA, Cal., Mar. 26, (UP)—Pale and dry-eyed, her fingers rapping a nervous tattoo on the arm of her chair, Mrs. Dorothea Wendt Livermore sat silently in justice court Wednesday while her son Jesse Livermore, Jr., absolved her of attempting to murder him as an aftermath of a midnight drinking brawl.

Charges against the dark-haired, 33-year-old divorced wife of Jesse Livermore, Sr., famed Wall street broker, were dismissed after a preliminary hearing in which her son snapped the state's case by insisting the bullet his mother fired into his chest was shot accidentally.

Judge Ernest Wagner dismissed the case after a 90-minute hearing, during which Mrs. Livermore did not utter a word.

The slender 16-year-old son of New York's most famous stock raider recited in unemotional tones the events of the drinking bout at his mother's Montecito home last Thanksgiving night, which ended when she pumped a .22 caliber bullet through his right lung, nearly costing him his life. He left a sick bed where he has been convalescing from the bullet wound to testify supposedly for the state against his mother.

"My Fault," Boy Says
"It was my fault," the boy said in a low voice. "I forced the gun into my mother's hands and pulled the barrel toward me. That is what discharged the gun."

Completing his testimony, the pale blond youth stepped down from the witness chair and walked swiftly out of the courtroom without looking at his mother. Later he posed with her for news cameramen, and chatted amiably as they left the courthouse.

Federal Reserve Places Banks on Brokerage Level

WASHINGTON, March 26, (UP)—The federal reserve board Wednesday issued regulations governing loans on securities which placed banks upon the same level as brokers and dealers in the matter of margin requirements.

The action brought open market regulations up to date under provisions of the banking act of 1935.

Existing margin regulations were scrapped by the board, as the long awaited regulation "U" governing bank loans for the purpose of purchasing or carrying stocks as a supplement to regulation "T" governing dealing of brokers, were issued jointly. The regulation "U" is effective in May, and changes in regulation "T" are effective April 1.

Under regulation "U" the maximum loan value applying to registered stock had been fixed at 45 per cent of current market

At the same time a general rule was laid down to brokers and dealers providing that the maximum loan value of a registered security (other than an exempted security) shall be 45 per cent of its current market value.
