CASEYS BEATEN TWO STRAIGHT

Final Contest Goes to County Club by Score of 36 to 34.

Chiloquin's Lumbermen were the champions of the City basketball league following their second straight victory over the Knights of Columbus at the Klamath armory, Thursday night. The score of the deciding contest was 36 to 34.

REYNOLDSTOWN WINS AINTREE

Major Furlong's Horse Gains Second Victory in Steeplechase.

AINTREE, Eng., March 27. (AP)—Major Noel Furlong's Reynoldstown repeated his 1935 victory in the grand national steeplechase today.

Sir Davis Llewellyn's Ego, an outsider, was second and James V. Bank's Bachelor Prince, third in the field of 35.

Golden Miller Falls

Golden Miller, the 1934 winner and the favorite, fell at the first jump, regained his feet but was pulled up before completing the first round with no chance of overtaking the leaders. Only seven finished the four and one-half mile test.

Reynoldstown, held at 7 to 1 in the closing odds, was the second horse to win the race two years in succession. The Colonel turned the trick the last time in 1889 and 1870.

20-Length Lead

Reynoldstown, ridden by Jockeys Waiwyn, loomed home 20 lengths in front of Ego after trailing the first time around the course. Bachelor Prince was another six lengths to the rear.

Castle Irwell, owned and ridden by G. H. (Pete) Bostwick, finished seventh.

Aintree's 30 gruelling jumps took their usual heavy toll. Only eighteen horses completed the first round with John Hay Whitney's American owned Double Crossed, Mrs. Violet Mundy's Avenger, and A. Mildmay's Davy Jones showing the way.

Avenger, one of the three favorites, fell on the second time around the course, however, breaking his neck. He was destroyed.

Davy Jones Leads

Double Cross stumbled at one of the difficult jumps but managed to keep his feet and finished in eighth place far behind the field.

Crown Prince was fourth. Invisible fifth, and Provocative sixth in front of Castle Irwell.

Whitney's other two horses, Royal Ransom and Rod and Gun; J. B. Snow's Delaneke, and Jesse Metcalf's Kiltel fell the first time around the course.

Davy Jones, an outsider, showed the way until just before the final jump. He then swerved and left the course, leaving Reynoldstown, which had moved up fast, all alone to win as he pleased. Davy Jones, emancipator and Reynoldstown raced almost together after taking the canal turn jump the second time.

Emancipator fell the third jump from home leaving the race to Davy Jones and Reynoldstown. The latter was timed in 9:37 as compared to 9:20 1-5 in winning the race last year.

HUSKIES WIN FROM BEAVERS

SEATTLE, March 27. (AP)—The University of Washington Huskies last night won the coast Olympic games basketball title by defeating Oregon State college, 35 to 29.

They will represent the coast in the national tournament at New York.

Close, tight checking and fast passing, combined with accurate shooting, gave Washington the victory.

Edge Draws Credit

The Huskies led throughout, except for a brief period early in the first half, when Oregon State was ahead 5 to 4. At half time the score was 17 to 10.

Much credit for the win went to Bob Egge, Washington guard, who checked Wally Palmberg, high-scoring Beaver forward. Egge held Palmberg to two field goals. At the same time he scored four goals himself, and played the entire game without making a foul.

Cards Edge Out Trojans

In the second half Washington took a long lead, running up the score to 32 to 18. Then, as Coach Hec Edmundson sent in substitutions, the Oregonians gradually whittled down the margin.

Egge, with nine points, was high man of the game. Palmberg and Folen scored six each for Oregon State.

Last night the Beavers upset predictions by eliminating the coast champion Stanford Indians from the tournament. Stanford took third place tonight with a 43-42 victory over University of Southern California.
