

RETAIL TRADE UP DESPITE FLOOD MENACE

NEW YORK, March 28, (AP)—While flood conditions interfered with the normal flow of trade in various regions, retail volume for the country as a whole during the past week ran 18 to 20 per cent ahead of the corresponding period last year, Dun & Bradstreet reported today in their business summary.

Easter buying gained momentum, and wholesale markets turned more active as merchants in flood areas were forced to make heavy replacements of ruined stocks. It was stated, "Dominated by women's apparel, dress accessories and toiletries, spring buying reached new high ground for the year in spite of unfavorable shopping weather on some days."

Acquisition of Easter merchandise already has advanced to proportions indicating the largest volume for the season since 1929, with interest spreading to many departments than in previous years.

LAW MAY REQUIRE CAR SPEED CHECKS

SALEM, Ore. (UP)—Legislation to require the placing of speed governors on all motor vehicles is foreseen by Secretary of State Snell unless America's high traffic accident death toll is out.

New Jersey has already become the first state in which a motorist has been compelled to have a governor installed on his automobile, Snell said. The driver in the case has had his license revoked, but had it reinstated for business driving only because he needed to drive to support his family.

"There is only one way to forestall the enactment of severe driving restrictions in the future," Snell said, "and that is by voluntarily correcting present conditions before additional restrictions are made necessary. The continuance of our present accident record will be proof enough that we are really, as a class, irresponsible and untrustworthy; and that, in turn, can only be corrected by mechanical limitations which compel us to drive within reasonable limits of speed. Speed, of course, is not the only factor to be considered, but it is one of the most important, and it is one which can be mechanically controlled if necessary. It is for this reason that we might expect speed governors to be among the first of the drastic steps taken to correct conditions if present methods fail."

CHANGE IN PRODUCE GRADES SUGGESTED

SALEM, Ore. (UP)—Several changes in grades and standards for apples, potatoes, tomatoes, pears and other farm products will be suggested at a meeting to be held in Portland, April 4, according to Frank McKennon, chief of the division of plant industry of the state department of agriculture.

An open container pack for fruit has been suggested by growers, the pack to be used for any grade providing the product is fit for human consumption and free from worms, scale, insect pests and diseases. The Oregon standard apple or pear box would be the standard open pack container and the fruit could not be wrapped or the container lidded.

Other changes recommended were for an open container grade for tomatoes; a provision for selling vegetables in bulk or open container; changing the designation of fourth grade for apples to culls; addition of an unclassified grade on cherries, tomatoes and probably some other products and addition of a combination grade for potatoes.

A suggestion from the Malheur district providing for the use of unbranded bags for potatoes and onions of No. 2 grade or better for eastern shipment, would require legislative action, as present laws provide that these products must be branded with the grade and grower's name and address.

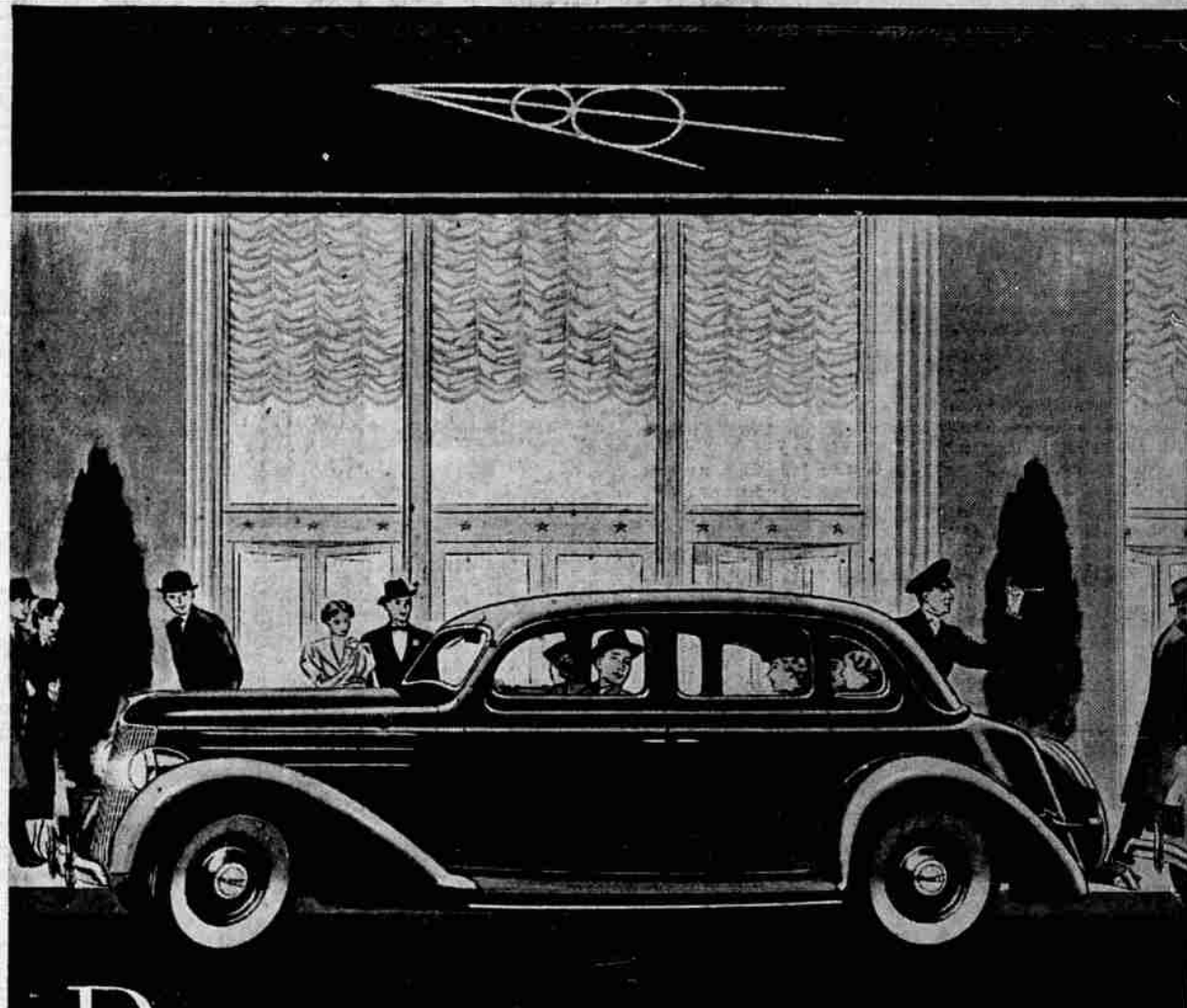
