Be A Tailor-Made Girl To Greet The Spring In Great Style

A smart way to greet the spring is to wear a sack suit cut like a man's, made of materials such as he usually selects—checks, stripes or herringbone weaves.

If you can do this tailored thing well, and can feel as comfortable and inconspicuous as a well-dressed Englishman with your waistcoat and fedora, you are in luck, says Harper's Bazaar, giving these suggestions to guide your choice of haberdashery.

Wear waistcoats of traditional white pique, of fancy brocade, or even flowered silk ones in the style of eighteenth century dandies. And blouses of printed silk with light or dark backgrounds, of cobwebby wool jersey, of fine silk jersey or of new acetate taffeta. Also blouses in sheer organdie and cotton knitted fabric as unassuming as a man's undershirt. With the manly tailleur, wear soft frilled handkerchief linen blouses to contrast. With dark worsted suits, the good old standbys of pale pink or pale blue silk are as good as ever. With any suit, wear a plain white silk blouse cut like a boy's shirt, or a handknit wool sweater in natural pickled pine shade, or in one of a hundred colors.

Wear shoes of English calf polished till they have a lustrous patina like waxed floors. Or shoes of brown suede, brown antelope, or of alligator skin. With a dark blue suit, wear shoes of cherry-wood calf.

Match your gloves to your shoes. Or wear ones of white guernsey cloth with one button, or of white doeklin, or chambray. If your suit is gray, add a new note by wearing longish plasticine blue antelope gloves.

The hat of the season is the felt like a man's fedora that you can wear day in and day out. Or wear any small sharp felt hat in black, in pale misty blue, or a queer bright shade.

Your bag should be of box-calf, medium size, tailored and tough and firm. When it is hand-sewn like your gloves, the effect is very fine.

Wear jewelry, but be sure it is either the conventional diamond clip, the conventional pearl, or your grandfather's gold cuff links.

LOAN APPLICATIONS WILL BE RECEIVED

Application for emergency crop loans for 1936 are now being received at the county agent's office by George Hilton, field supervisor of the emergency crop and feed loan section of the farm credit administration.

The emergency crop loans will be made only to farmers who cannot obtain credit from any other source, as provided by regulations issued by the governor of the Farm Credit Administration. The money loaned will be limited to the farmer's immediate and actual cash needs for growing his 1936 crops and in no instance may exceed \$200 to one farmer.

Farmers are not eligible for emergency crop loans if they can borrow from an individual, production credit association, bank, or other concern. Farmers will also be considered ineligible if they have an application pending with resettlement administration, have received assistance from that organization this year or are indebted to the resettlement administration for an unpaid loan.

As in the past, the security for an emergency crop loan will consist of a first lien on the crop financed. Landlord or others having an interest in the crop to be financed will be required to waive their claims in favor of a lien to the governor of the farm credit administration until the emergency crop loan is repaid.

Checks in payment of approved loans will be issued by the regional emergency crop and feed loan office at Spokane, Wash. Applicants are urged to file their applications on Monday or

Tuesday of next week to facilitate action on their loans, according to C. W. Henkle, assistant county agent.

Although the applications will be taken at any time during the week, they will receive much speedier attention if they are made on March 30 or 31.

Newsstands Get Warning Against Indecent Papers

Klamath newsstand operators and magazine dealers received this week from District Attorney Hardin D. Blackmer a warning letter regarding display and sale of so-called "spicy" magazines.

In his letter, Blackmer said that he had received several informal complaints at the number of newsstands handling "indecent and immoral magazines, books and literature."

He cited the Oregon law covering such publications and, while declaring he would not pretend himself to say which were decent and which indecent, he appended a list of magazines which had been suggested as falling under the provisions of the statute.

These were: Gay Broadway, Gay Parisienne, Pep Stories, Bedtime Stories, Spicy Stories, Frothy Stories, Tattle Tales, Breezy Stories, Sassy Stories, Spicy Adventure, Spicy Mystery and Spicy Detective.

Blackmer said it was up to the newsdealers to determine immediately which publications were indecent and then to clear their racks of those publications.
