

TEMPERATURE HITS RECORD LOW POINTS

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motorists were marooned at any time.

Orchardists in the Rogue river valley darkened the skies with smudge pots as they sought to protect budding pear trees and at Medford the smudging was called one of the heaviest in recent years.

Sunshine alternated with clouds this morning but the weather bureau, although predicting unsettled weather tonight and tomorrow with rain or snow in the southwest, said slightly warmer temperatures were in prospect.

Crops Not Harmed

Despite the unseasonal cold, D. C. Holbrook, assistant statistician of the U. S. department of agriculture, said general crops probably were not damaged but that the lamb crop, estimated at 90 per cent of last year on March 1, might be cut another five per cent.

"The colder weather earlier this year retarded much seeding," said Holbrook, "so this spring should cause no material damage. Any loss will be more than offset by the snow and moisture which accompanied the cold. Spring rain conditions have been exceptional in Oregon. The only available grass is in southeastern Washington."

Planting Held Back

"The February cold probably caused a total loss of apricots in Oregon, so this spring did no more damage. The only crop remaining in apricots apparently is around Yakima. The extent of damage to the nut crop remains to be determined."

"The only effect of the cold, so far as other crops are concerned, will be to further retard spring planting, which is already about two weeks late."

Ice pavements in Portland caused the closing of one bridge for an hour while crews sanded it.

Anti-Trust Law Verdict Offered

In a voluminous decision partially read by Chief Justice Hughes, the court outlined in great detail its view of the scope of the famous anti-trust statute. There was no dissent.

Government Sees Victory

It held that exchange of trade information and statistics was legal. An agreement by members of the sugar institute to abide by posted prices without deviation was construed as an "unreasonable restraint" of competition and so illegal.

Walter L. Rice, special assistant to the attorney general, who participated in argument of the case for the government, said: "We regard the decision as a sweeping victory. The changes in the decree are of comparatively minor importance."

WASHINGTON, March 30. (AP)—According to a request by the government, the supreme court refused today to pass at the present time on constitutionality of the public utility holding company act.

WASHINGTON, March 30. (AP)—New Mexico lost today in the supreme court in its effort to impose a 5 cent per gallon tax on gasoline bought by a bus line outside the state and used in passing through the state.

WASHINGTON, March 30. (AP)—Provisions of the Washington state law of 1933 imposing an occupation tax on radio broadcasting were held unconstitutional today by the supreme court.

The litigation involved conflicting claims as to whether the state or federal government had jurisdiction.

In a unanimous opinion delivered by Justice Stone, the tribunal reversed the ruling of the Washington supreme court approving the levy.

SALEM, March 30. (AP)—Oregon's primary election lists which close tonight will contain the names of Senator William E. Borah of Idaho and Franklin D. Roosevelt for the republican and democratic preferential vote for president on May 15. Oregon will have 10 delegates in the two national conventions.

Authoritative information received at Portland stated Senator Borah would have his filing for the republican preferential vote in the hands of the secretary of state by 3 p. m., just two hours before the deadline for declarations. President Roosevelt placed his filing here two weeks ago.

Vice-president Garner's name was entered for preferential vote as running mate of the president. William S. Bennett of New York is the only filing received to date for republican vice-presidential choice.

Three men will compete for republican nomination for United States senator, including Senator Charles L. McNary. Sam H. Brown of Gervais and Theodore C. Nelson, Townsend supporter of Salem, will compete against McNary; while Willis Mahoney of Klamath Falls and John A. Jeffrey of Portland are working for the democratic nomination.

Filings were coming in fast today for seats in the house and senate and for district attorney positions. A total of 324 filings had been received for the various national, state and district offices at noon.

The focus of interest, however, burned with increasing brightness upon the principal figure, Bruno Richard Hauptmann, despite the sudden injection of the new characters into the case. The question to be answered either by the court of pardons or by Governor Harold G. Hoffman was whether Hauptmann would die as scheduled at 8 o'clock tomorrow night.

No Change Expected

The court of pardons was not expected to change its former attitude, which was against clemency. The governor professedly was without power to interfere, his power of reprieve having expired; but there were many today who believed that he might find a way, if the pardons court failed, to extend the prisoner's life again.

The bizarre drama that found preparations being made to execute Hauptmann while the others were in widely separated cells, one directly charged with the crime and other "confessing" it, was made even more weird and confusing by the conflict of
