Borah in Oregon Primary

The Inside Story From The Capital

WASHINGTON, March 30.—An inkling of what is happening to the economy program may be found in the old slick-trick method by which congress now appears to be economizing off federal appropriations but is not. The house appropriations committee courageously economized on appropriation bills. The committee really studied expenditures and did a sincere minor job of curtailing. This was big news and attracted big headlines.

After that, a quiet little process of wriggling out of the economies got started. First, the house membership voted to restore a few of the committee cuts. Then the senate committee voted back a few more. Finally the senate itself, in a burst of generosity, not only wrecked the entire economy work of the house committee, but voted extensive appropriations even beyond the budget.

If you think this is a minor matter, consider the fact that the senate has increased the house appropriation bills by \$2,179,000,000 so far this year.

SECURITY
The interesting part of it is that the restorations attract little attention. They are made item by item. Hence they are of great interest only to particular localities and interests affected by each item. They are not voted up or down in bulk.

Congress apparently desires it so. Today you can find a foot-high stack of reports on appropriation bills by house and senate committees. These are published in the congressional record. But nowhere will you find a compilation of the amounts of the bills as finally passed with all the restorations, unless you figure it out for yourself or consult an expert of either the house or senate appropriations committee.

This does not mean congress is concealing anything. The figures are available. But the point is that, while the purported economies are handed out with eclat, you will have to dig to find that they did not last long.

Note—Digging through records kept mainly by the Associated Press senate staff indicates the senate this year increased the agriculture bill by \$40,000,000; the war department appropriation by \$66,000,000; the interior bill by \$63,000,000 (all virtually unnoticed), and the independent offices bill by \$2,919,000 (for the bonus and farm plan, as widely advertised).

WRIGGLING
The executive branch of the government appears to have borrowed some phases of this economy technique.

Latest move was the restoration by Releifer Hopkins of 250,000 abolished WPA jobs in the flood area. Before that, President Roosevelt agreed to the restoration of all the CCC camps which he had earlier ordered abandoned. Just prior to that, he signed a bill restoring 26-day vacations and 15 days' sick leave for government employees. Incidentally, this was the last restoration of the original economy law, adopted shortly after the new deal came in. The original 15 per cent salary cuts have been restored as well as all the veterans' cuts except one. And in addition the veterans have been voted a bonus.

Thus while economy occupies the headlines, the whittling of economies appears to have become a more effective business. The general inner expectation is that spending from now until November will be greater than last year.

PUNISHMENT
Both Mr. Roosevelt and General Hagood kept quiet about their meeting on the presidential train. Recent news pictures of the general, however, show him without a smile.

Speaking at La Grande last evening to a gathering of Townsend club members Mahoney warned the pension seekers that "divided, they'll (the opponents) look the stuffing out of us"—and promptly proceeded to advocate rebellion against the political dictates of those leaders who had read him out of the ranks of the blessed.
