

Bobby Jones Prepares for Comeback Attempt

Giants Look Bad in Training

Bill Terry Disgusted With Club's Early Showing.

The New York Giants haven't looked so bad in the spring since 1933, which may be a good sign. The Giants won the National League pennant and world championship in 1933.

Bill Terry became so disgusted with the showing of young Horace Stoneham's athletes in exhibition games that he hopped back into the lineup before he intended to, and stuck Hank Leiber in center field. Leiber reported late, after holding out, and consequently was a little behind his teammates in the matter of condition.

Terry hopes the Giants' poor start is a hunch, but you need punch in baseball, rather than hunch.

There are plenty of it's on the Giants, and all will have to come through for the club to get anywhere, which is asking plenty.

The pitching looks the weakest since Terry took charge in mid-season of 1932. Fred Fitzsimmons, who went 10 years without missing a turn, was out for two months last season with an elbow injury, which necessitated an operation. He looks O. K., and so does Hal Schumacher, who injured his arm in September, but these are the only cheery notes.

Carl Hubbell, always the wheel-horse of the staff, seems to be back-sliding gradually. He has won 67 games in three years, so it would appear silly to worry about him, but his scowling definitely is not breaking as sharply as it did two years ago.

Clyde Claitman won 15 and lost only a half dozen in his freshman year, but the Tennessee star is a problem. Baseball men say that he is not as good as his record would indicate. He pitched only nine complete games and had an earned run average of 4.09, which was even higher than that of Pitt, whose arm was bad.

Most young pitchers find their sophomore year tough. Paul Derringer, Russ Van Atta, and Babe Phelps are among those who flopped in their second year, and Claitman may be another.

Harry Gumbert won 20 for Baltimore, and may hold the key to the staff. If he can start, Leroy Parmelee is replaced. If not, the staff is going to be short.

Al Smith is a fine relief worker, but if he is used as a starter, Terry has no one in the bullpen to replace him unless Dick Coffman comes through. Coffman is in fine shape and is serious. He knows that this is his last chance in the majors and he is on the wagon. He hardly will be a regular, but may help to take up slack.

Firpo Marberry had 14 teeth extracted, but so far has nothing to show but open spaces. He is taking his time, and it is impossible to figure him yet. The old Washington Senator and Detroit Tiger is 36, and only a relief pitcher at best.

The catching is O. K., with Harry Danning getting more work than he did last year. The kid can hit, and his work will help Gus Mancuso, who will get a chance to draw a deep breath once in a while. Gus had the best year in his life in 1935, making 298. Theodore Dury, a rookie backstop, is good for another year of seasoning.

First base is a question mark. Terry still is the best in this league, but his left knee has kept him back. He says he's in shape and will play, but we have only his word for it. Sam Leslie can hit, but your aunt is a better fielder, and probably faster.

Burkes Whitehead hasn't been throwing well at second, but there was nothing wrong with his arm in St. Louis. He can field and play a full season, despite rumors. Played through two full years in AA before joining Cards. Naturally, he couldn't beat Frank Frisch out of a job, but he is better than anyone the Giants had at second last season.

No matter what he hits, Whitehead will swing higher than Hughie Crite and Al Cucinello did. His hitting is a mystery. He went well in streaks with the Cards, but there is no guarantee he can sock over a full season.

Dick Bartell hasn't shown anything yet at short. He is 15 pounds heavier and expects to improve, but was a definite flop last season, and the suspicion is growing that he may be another "Philly player."

Stoney Jackson has plenty of pep and looks good. Hit .300 last year, the first time since 1931. Claims that the two half-seasons he spent on the bench in 1932-33 helped

EX-GOLF KING ENTERS MEET

Former Champion to Play in Third Augusta National Tournament.

AUGUSTA, Ga., March 31. (AP)—The Georgia cheering section has its fingers crossed, as a consequence of two previous disappointments, but the signs today point unmistakably to a comeback by its favorite golfing son, Robert Tyre Jones, Jr., in the forthcoming third Augusta national invitation tournament.

Odds Against Player
Just where his current return to form will land him is strictly a matter of speculation. Much as the golf world would thrill to see him achieve it, Jones probably won't win the 72 hole medal scoring race with America's foremost shotmakers, starting this Thursday and finishing on Sunday.

The odds today were "12, 6 and 3" against his chances of finishing 1-2-3 but the price has already shortened, as a direct result of Bob's sensational practice rounds, including a new course record of 64, and may drop again.

Fine Golf Played
Even with the customary discount for practice scores, where the pressure is off, there's no doubt the 34-year-old Atlanta lawyer is playing consistently finer golf than since he retired from the wars six years ago with all the trophies one man could possibly find room for on the mantelpiece.

Three successive rounds of 64-70-78, 54 holes in exactly 14 under par, with an average 30 putts per round, tell the story of what Bob Jones and "Calamity Jane" have been doing lately on the Augusta national's undulating golf course. He has made par golf look easy.

Brackening Jones with Henry Picard, the Hershey (Pa.) professional, and W. Lawson Little, Jr., the amateur king, as his "best bet" in the entire field, Gene Sarazen, the 1935 tournament winner, said today:

"Jones is in an ideal spot now to make a comeback. The pressure of the first two tournaments here is off, but not his incentive. With his old confidence back he is bound to come nearer championship form than at any time since he retired."

Ex-Senator Dill Sues for Divorce in Spokane Court

SPokane, Wash., March 31. (UP)—Cruelty and "personal indignities" were charged Rosalie Jones Dill, New York feminist, Monday as former U. S. Senator C. C. Dill filed suit for divorce here in superior court.

Dill, in a four-page complaint, set forth that: Mrs. Dill was miserably in provision of food for the family, servants and guests; boasted of her cheapness of dress; told his friends he was a "political coward" when he did not run for re-election in 1934; paid "slight, if any, attention to the management and operation of the Spokane home"; became enraged and abusive to him in public and in private, and attacked his political activities and purposes.

Their incompatibility began approximately one year after their marriage at Cold Springs Harbor, Long Island, March 15, 1927, Dill declared, and the couple had been separated since December 15, 1934.

Major Re-appointed To Industrial Post

MIAMI, Fla., March 31. (UP)—President Roosevelt Monday re-appointed Major George L. Berry coordinator for industrial cooperation, empowering him to continue his work in seeking greater avenues of employment for the nation's jobless.

The appointment, effective on April 1, permits Berry to carry on his work for another year. The designation was made in an executive order from the yacht Potomac, Mr. Roosevelt's floating White House. The order was flown to temporary White House offices at the Miami Biltmore here.

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YOUNG MATMEN MEET TONIGHT

Pete Belcastro Slight Favorite to Upset Barney Cosneck.

Two young athletes whose wrestling experience is far greater than their ages would indicate will take top position on Mack Lillard's program at the Klamath armory tonight.

Dusting off Joe Marsh of Missouri in rapid and spectacular style a week ago, Pete Belcastro, the junior heavyweight champion of the Pacific coast, stood out this afternoon as a slight favorite over his opponent, Barney Cosneck of Illinois.

They clash in the one-hour time limit main event.

Belcastro's aggressive, hard-hitting attack is expected to carry him a long way toward a victory over the fast, scientific wrestler from the University of Illinois.

With his drop kicks and rope swings working effectively, the junior champion should have little difficulty in keeping Cosneck on the defensive. The rope swing, combined with a hard backward body slam, gave Belcastro a quick victory over Marsh a week ago.

Cosneck's plans for a win will rely to a great extent upon his speed and power. The well-built midwesterner has not been beaten in Klamath Falls. Two weeks ago he stopped Stanley Rogers of Texas and last week he gained a well-earned draw with Mihalakis, the Arabian grappler.

Because of these two showings, Lillard advanced him to the main event. The Arabian will be back here tonight for his second match in as many weeks. He meets popular Frankie Peck of San Francisco in the semi-windup. Peck has just returned from a series of bouts in San Francisco.

SEATTLE, March 31. (AP)—Seventy prospective University of Washington gridgers, answering the call of Coach Jimmy Phelan for spring practice, were shaped into teams for two months of steady drill in anticipation of one of the stiffest gridiron campaigns the Washington Huskies have ever tackled.

Phelan wasted no time yesterday, the initial workout, in getting his candidates segregated so he could find workable combinations, both backfield and on the line.

Out of the first day's drill came this new backfield: Jimmy Johnson, Caldwell, Idaho, left half, Chas. Newberry, Lafayette, Ind., right half, Al Gruver, Seattle, fullback and Rink Bond, Hoquiam, quarterback.

This set up looked as a possible reserve for the Byron Haines, Jimmy Cain, Ed Nowagroski and Elmer Legg combination.

The Oakland Acorns, who aren't supposed to be among the top four but are, will be hosts to Los Angeles' Angels, perennial topnotchers.
