Seattle Indians Drop 6-2 Game With Seals in Coast Battle.

Upsetting the best prognosticators and the normally high flying Angels, Oakland's Acorns insisted on staying with the Pacific Coast baseball league leaders.

It took the first extra inning game of the young season to do the trick. Behind the smart pitching of Hank McDonald the Oaks nosed out Los Angeles 3-2 in 10 innings yesterday. The winning run came when Leroy Anton singled to centerfield, scoring Jimmy Hitchcock who had tripled. McDonald allowed only five hits, but one of them was a homer by Wes Schulmerich with one on in the seventh.

Accompanying the Acorns as the circuit's current topnotchers were the Mission Reds, winners of the season's first night game. Lloyd Johnson set the Portland Ducks down last night 4 to 2. His wild throw to second in the second inning spoiled a double play and opened the way for the Ducks' first run.

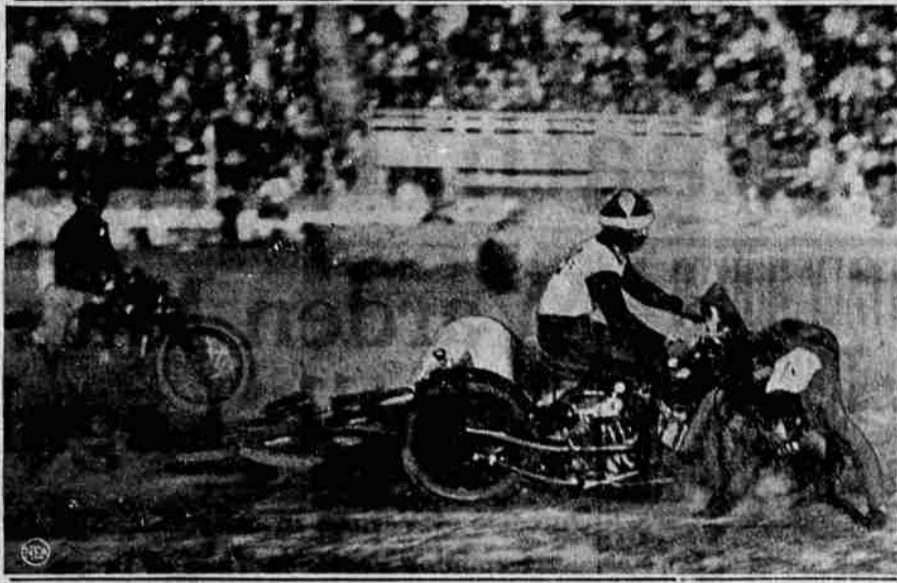

COSNECK LOSES TO BELCASTRO

Illinois Grappler Unable to Return After Fall

Pete Belcastro gained his second straight victory since his return to Klamath Falls by defeating Barney Cosneck, Illinois, in the main event wrestling match at the armory last night.

The dispute lasted less than 12 minutes.

Groggy from a head-on collision, Cosneck was shoved into a series of rope swings that ended up in body slams. He was knocked out by the force of the slams and was unable to continue the match.

The midwesterner gained the first fall in eight minutes and 19 seconds with an arm lock.

Right up to the moment before the final fall, he gave Belcastro, junior heavyweight champion of the coast, no end of trouble. Belcastro was battered around by Sonnenberga until he launched one of his own and nearly put Cosneck out. After this Cosneck was an easy victim of the body slams. The fall came in three minutes and 17 seconds.

COAST QUINTET REACHES N. Y.

Washington Huskies Seek Victory in Olympic Event.

NEW YORK, April 1. (AP)—Washington University's Huskies today viewed with more hope than confidence the Olympic basketball competition starting in Madison Square Garden Friday with five college teams, two A. A. U. fives and Y. M. C. A. champions battling for the right to represent the United States at Berlin.

The boys from the northwest have never seen any of the other teams in action but they are confident they will do credit to themselves against De Paul of Chicago in their first round game.

But there the confidence ends and they become hopeful for a victory over the Chicago quintet probably would put the Huskies against the towering McPherson Oilers. The National A. A. U. champions, the Oilers, averaging six feet, five inches in height, not only are strong favorites to whip Temple university in their opening encounter but also to win the tournament.

Alongside De Paul's speedy team, the Huskies do not believe their names. Stack them up against the Oilers or the University of Arkansas' Rasorback and they look almost like midgets.

SPINA DEFEATS FOE IN THIRD

Castillo Beaten At Portland by Technical Knockout.

PORTLAND, Ore., April 1. (AP)—Al Spina of Portland proved too thorough a ring master for Frank Castillo and scored a technical knockout in the third round on the main event of last night's fight card.

Castillo, a Los Angeles boy, proved willing enough and after being edged out in the first frame came back to even the score in the second. In the next, however, inexperience told. Castillo went to the canvas with a hard right to the jaw but popped up at the 3 count instead of resting. He went down again three times before perfectly timed punches, once for the count of nine, before Referee Tom Loutitt halted the battle.

Spina weighed 124, Castillo 124.

"Tiny" Cooper, 154, Salem, won a rough bout from Frank Riggi, Qion Brooks, in the six-round semi-windup. After two slow rounds, the boys opened up, with Cooper getting a decisive margin with knockdowns in the fourth after talking to the canvas once himself. The last two frames brought out plenty of slugging.

Otto Blackwell, 142, Portland, won a decision from Charley Roper, 150, Spokane. Roper lasted the route despite hitting the canvas twice in the first round.

"Tiny" Holden, 220, Dillon, Mont., and "Cyclone" Thompson, 193, Seattle, battled four vicious rounds to a draw.

Kid Thorley, Silverton, won a decision from Frankie Gullo, Solo, in the four-round preliminary top welterweights.

Two Webfooters Receive Honors

EUGENE, Ore., April 1. (AP)—All-American swimming honors came to Jim Hurd and Jim Reed, University of Oregon swimming stars, for their strong showings in the national collegiate championships at Yale university last week end.

Only two other coast collegians received similar honors. They were Jack Medina of University of Washington and Jim Gilhula of University of Southern California.

Hurd placed fifth in the 50-yard free style swim at the national meet and was eighth in the 100. Reed failed to gain the finals, but placed eighth out of a field of 25 entries in the 150-yard backstroke. His qualifying time was 1:41, more than five seconds under his coast-record time.

Coach H. S. Hoyman and the swimmers will return here Friday noon, in time to take part in the qualifying heats of the annual northern division conference meet here Friday and Saturday.

GET COACHING LAUNCH

Ambers Named Challenger for Canzoneri Title

NEW YORK, April 1. (UP)—The New York boxing commission named Lou Ambers of Herkimer, N. Y., the No. 1 challenger for Tony Canzoneri's lightweight crown, thereby snapping the string of misfortune that hobbled Unlucky Lou since his first title tilt with Tony last May.

Now—through a last minute "break"—the Herkimer hurricane is virtually assured of a second shot at Canzoneri in June or July, under 26th Century club or Madison Square Garden promotion.

The 135 pound champ has notified the commission he will defend against Larruping Lou anytime after the Canzoneri-Jimmy McLavin non-title bout in New York on May 13. And if Ambers wins the title, he has guaranteed to defend against any designated challenger within 60 days. Lou's manager, Dave Steinberg, will post the challenger's \$500 guarantee this week.

Amateur Boxing Event to Open

PORTLAND, Ore., April 1. (AP)—Amateur fighters will swing their fists here tomorrow night for the Oregon A. A. U. championships and the right to enter the National tournament at Cleveland. Decisions must be given at the conclusion of all finish fights.

Several of the winners of last week's novice tournament here will seek new honors in the meet. About 30 fighters were entered.
