National and Local Markets

NEW ACTIVITY SEEN IN SPUD CAR LOADINGS

PORTLAND, April 1 (UP)—Increased activity appeared in potato markets in the past week with Oregon loadings reaching 152 cars, Washington, 24, and Idaho, 685.

Market quotations showed higher prices generally throughout the three states, with advances ranging from 10 to 25 cents a hundred pounds. Supplies were moderate, except in Seattle where liberal quantities were available.

Track holdings in 14 markets throughout the country ranged from 1235 to 1292 cars and on Monday they increased to 1625 cars. A decrease of 49 cars was noted yesterday.

Total shipments during the week decreased to 4787 cars from 6350 the previous week.

Northwestern apple shipments increased to 864 cars last week and onion shipments totaled 54 cars.

WOOL SHIPMENT ARRIVES THURSDAY

PORTLAND, Ore., April 1. (UP)—A shipment of 1,073 bales of wool, the first of an importation of New Zealand, Australian and South American wool, arrives here tomorrow on the Dutch liner, Dinteldyk, which transhipped it from Vancouver, B. C.

W. L. Crowe, importer, said it represented about a third of the wool expected. Other shipments have been received recently and the total movement is expected to reach 2,000,000 pounds.

"This movement is based upon the availability of foreign wools at lowered delivered prices than domestic wools and upon the close grading of New Zealand and Australian wools, which makes them more desirable for use by the American mills than much domestic wool," said Crowe.

MART RECUPERATES AS WHEAT GOES UP

CHICAGO, April 1. (UP)—Re recuperative power manifested itself in the wheat market today, and a maximum overnight rise of a cent a bushel was witnessed.

The fact that Canadian wheat export business yesterday surpassed all estimates and appeared to have aggregated 2,000,000 bushels, had a strengthening influence. Today's Canadian export purchases were figured at 500,000 bushels.

Wheat closed firm, 1/4 to 1 cent above yesterday's finish. May 96 1/2-96 3/4, July 85 1/2, corn 1 1/4 up, May 60 1/4-60 3/4, oats 1/4 up, advanced, and provisions unchanged to a rise of 2 cents.

Stock Market Quotations

NEW YORK, April 1. (UP)—A sustained forward drive in the stock market today sent shares from 1 to 4 or more points higher.

General Motors was a leader with a new 1936 high, and steels, rails, oil and industrial specialties quietly expanded their gains. The best values of the day were maintained near the close.

The late tone was firm, and transactions approximated 1,700,000 shares.

U. S. Steel and Midland Steel products gained more than 2 points and Chrysler and General Motors advanced between 1 and 2.

J. I. Case was up as much as 10 points in participation of action on preferred arrears. Both Philip Morris and Du Pont gained around 4.

Rails, such as New York Central, Union Pacific and Santa Fe, rose a point or more. Seaboard Oil and Standard Oil of N. J., featured that division.

Other gainers included International Harvester, Allied Chemical, Macy, Montgomery Ward, Distillers corporation, Seagrams and U. S. Industrial Alcohol.

Foreign copper buying was a stimulant for American Smelting, Anaconda and Kennecott.
