Lower Freight Rate Goes Into Effect

Lower potato freight rates from Klamath points to Seattle have been put into effect by the Southern Pacific company, according to L. L. Graham, district freight and passenger agent. The new rate is 35 cents, against an old rate of 43 1/2 cents. In previous seasons, Klamath has shipped few potatoes to Seattle. This year, however, a number of carloads have gone into that market, and the lower rate is expected to encourage still further shipments from here to the Seattle district.
