

## HOOVER ISSUES RALLY CALL TO G.O.P. BANNER

FORT WAYNE, Ind., April 6. (UP)—Former President Herbert Hoover Saturday called upon the American people to follow the "sure footed" republican elephant rather than the "bounding white rabbits" of the new deal.

"I recommend that magician's animal as the symbol of the new deal party," Hoover said in the seventh of his series of addresses. "It travels in uncertain directions at high speed. It multiplies rapidly."

**Battling Average Low**  
Hoover's speech was sponsored by the Fourth District Republican organization of Fort Wayne.

In his new-found epigrammatic style, the former president charged the Roosevelt administration had failed to keep its campaign promises and had not solved "our great national problems."

"Some of the multitude of new deal promises have been right," he conceded. "The American people do not expect policies undertaken to reach 1,000 per cent battling average."

"But a baseball statistician says their battling average on promises has been .033. On major policies it has been .050. On the constitution it has been .006."

**Propaganda Charged**  
Hoover charged that new deal "subordinates" in answering his previous speeches "have loomed a smoke screen of personalities and have begun to fire the squirt guns of propaganda."

"They are not the bold answers of responsible leaders expounding their point of view and offering their solutions," he said. "And slogans do not even pinch hit for facts."

He criticized an administration which seeks "a greater and greater control of the nation's thinking."

**Intimidation Seen**  
"Those who seek for power thus move easily from propaganda to raucous denunciation," he continued. "From that it is but a step to intimidation. And we witness today the seizure of private communications of innocent persons and the press. That is a gross violation of the spirit of the bill of rights."

"But Americans are not easily intimidated. A number of unverified facts have been taken to send the pungent telegrams, expressing the prayer that some new deal agency will seize them and commit every word of them to memory."

**Asked Anti-Inflation Pledge**  
Hoover said that 15 days before Mr. Roosevelt's inauguration he asked the president-elect to issue a statement promising a balanced budget and no currency inflation. Such a statement, Hoover contended, would have averted the bank panic.

Hoover recalled that under his policies, "economic forces turned upward in July, 1932."

"Then arrived the new dealers with their point of view," he said. "There was a youngster once who told his father that the teacher wanted him to bring to school simple statements of the Einstein theory and of the new deal. Father said, 'We will begin with the Einstein theory. That is easier.'"

**Great Compliment**  
"Mr. Roosevelt's campaign for election was based upon the implication that the depression was caused by me personally. That is a great compliment to the energies and capacities of one man."

"From this point of observation they got the conclusion that depressions could be easily cured by the magic of spending, priming the pump, tinkering with currency and credit, artificially increasing prices. They adopted the curious concept of economy of scarcity."

"From all they showed down the natural forces of recovery which were in motion. And the price of that is infinite misery and anxiety to those whose jobs have been delayed."

## TULELAKE LAND AUCTION FRIDAY

Active and enthusiastic bidding is predicted for Friday when the department of the interior will offer a quantity of land adjoining Tule lake for sale at auction.

F. W. Gilbert will act as auctioneer and W. I. Tingley as clerk. This sale has aroused considerable interest in all parts of the Klamath basin as well as in the Tule lake district, and a large crowd is expected to attend the auction. While the lots are to be sold to highest bidders, value has been set from \$65 to \$200 by the department of the interior.

The lots to be sold are 8, 9, 10, 15, 16, 17, 21, block 3; lot 10, block 4; lots 2, 5, 17, 19 to 28, inclusive, and lot 31, block 14, and all lots in block 15, 20, 21, 22 and 23.

Blocks 3 and 14 adjoin the railroad right of way, block 15 is the old park site south of the Legion hall, while blocks 20 to 23 lie northwest of the present townsite, lying north of the block on which the water well is being drilled.

This sale will be under the acts of April 16, 1906, and June 27, 1906, and will be sold to the highest bidder at not less than the appraised value.

The lots will be sold for cash or at the option of the purchaser in four equal installments; the first installment to be payable at time of sale and the balance in three equal annual installments with interest on deferred installments to date of payment at the rate of 6 per cent per annum, the deferred payments and interest to be paid at the United States land office at Sacramento.

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## TWO TREE-TROOPER CAMPS APPROVED

Recommendation that one of two Civilian Conservation Corps camps established in the Squaw Butte area as part of the range improvement program be moved to Washington, it was stated by Ormand R. Hoan, Portland, chairman of the planning board, under the present program, the Squaw Butte cooperative grazing experiment station, located near Gap ranch about 40 miles west of Burns, can continue its work with one CCC camp, the recommendation points out. Much work needs to be done in attempting to control larks in the Paisley region, and it was decided the camp would be much more valuable here.

The camp in this section of the state is all the more desirable, since it has been announced that the one now at Bonanza, in Klamath county, will be moved soon, the committee points out.

The committee recently recommended that at least 12 camps for grazing range improvement be established in eastern Oregon.
