NEW INFORMATION ON BRICK STORE

Corrections and additions to the stories being revived about the old brick store are contained in a letter to The Herald-News from Robert Emmitt, Klamath pioneer.

It follows: "In your editorial history of the old brick store leaves the impression that the store was built by Martin and Moore, which is not a fact. However, we completely exonerate the press from any erroneous statements as its information is gathered from various sources which is often incorrect.

"The first store in Linkville was operated by Alex Miller and George Nurse, which was a small wooden building located about the middle of the present street at the east end of the bridge with the front facing east down the street.

Not long afterwards Miller died and the business was continued by Nurse with a clerk named John Gotfred who afterwards was replaced by H. M. Thatcher. Some years later Nurse retired and moved to California and at which time H. M. Thatcher, the clerk, and Silkes Worden purchased the business and built the brick store and moved the stock into it about 1873.

This same firm also built the first steamboat that ever plied the waters of upper Klamath lake and navigated Wood river as far up as Fort Klamath. Some two or three years later Charles S. Moore, a clerk at the time, and Jerry Martin purchased the business from Thatcher and Worden.

"In the meantime a hardware store, whose firm name was carried down to a very recent date, then after a year or more withdrew from the Baldwin store and entered the brick store firm. "In 1889 the little village of Linkville was almost completely wiped out by fire, the brick store included with the brick walls still standing. The brick store firm, Martin Moore and Reames, rebuilt and restocked the business which was operated successfully for many years until they decided to discontinue. It was my pleasure to have contacted all the men socially and financially and found them honest, thrifty, energetic, conservative and worthy citizens."

Japan Honors Its 'Human Bullets'

Secretary of Labor Refutes Rumors of Jewish Ancestry

WASHINGTON, April 6. (UP)—Madame Secretary of Labor Frances Perkins struck back Saturday night at what she called an un-American whispering campaign concerning her ancestry.

Miss Perkins, history's first woman cabinet member and close friend of President Roosevelt through her work as state secretary of labor in New York when he was governor, made public two letters denying that she is Jewish. She added:

"If I were a Jew I would make no secret of it. On the contrary I would be proud to acknowledge it."

Attached to the letters was a copy of an alleged marriage certificate which Miss Perkins said had been circulated by "the Associated Farmers of Riverside county, California."

This document showed that one "Paul Wilson married a Miss Matilda Wutski at Newton, Mass., Feb. 6, 1910." The certificate showed that the bride was born in Sumulwek and the groom in Warsaw, Russia, and that both were silk mill workers.

Widely Circulated
Labor department officials said the certificate had been circulated so widely the secretary felt it necessary to scotch the rumor

concerning her birth and marriage.

She wrote Charles F. Woods, public librarian at Riverside, Calif., and Mrs. W. MacMillan, New York, both of whom had inquired about the truth of the stories concerning her.

Miss Perkins told Mrs. MacMillan about her English and Scotch ancestors who arrived in New England in the 17th century. She told her mother, Paul Caldwell Wilson, an insurance executive, in Grace Episcopal church, New York, Sept. 26, 1913.

Two Other People
To Woods, who forwarded Miss Perkins a copy of the Newton marriage certificate, she wrote that it concerned individuals other than herself and her husband. An accompanying statement from the Associated Farmers organization, she said, was "made up from start to finish of untruths concerning me and

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concocted apparently for political purposes."

RIVERSIDE, Calif., April 6. (UP)—Spokesmen for the Associated Farmers of Riverside, accused Saturday by Madame Secretary of Labor Frances Perkins of starting a whispering campaign that she is a Jewess, insisted that the only reference made to her ancestry was that she was of Russian descent.

CHILOQUIN STILL IN DEBATE EVENT

PORTLAND, April 6. (AP)—Three teams, one gaining a bye, went into the second and third rounds today of the Oregon high school debating league championship. Four other squads will meet tonight and Friday.

A team from Dulles, defeating Roseburg, and another from Coquille, defeating Grants Pass, survived last week's contests along with Chiloquin, which drew a bye.

The teams of McMinnville and Clatskanie debate tonight for the right to meet Coquille, while the Grass Valley and Hermiston teams meet Friday, the winner opposing Coquille. Dulles meets the winner of the Coquille contest.

The question being debated is whether the states should enact legislation providing adequate medical service to all citizens at public expense.

Beaverton won the state championship last year. The teams in the championship tournament represent the winners of eastern and western Oregon district contests.
