600,000 twisters Sunday night and Monday.

Floods, generated by 4-inch rainfall, poured through the Carolina foothills, closing highways. About 200 Negro homes in Charlotteville, N. C., were inundated. Bridges were washed away in eastern North Carolina.

Additional rain was predicted for Georgia and the Carolinas. Continued cool weather and frost dominated the forecast for tornado-wracked states to the west.

Storm bred fires, which added heavily to the Gainesville death toll, still smoldered today. WPA workers, convicts and national guardsmen dug through debris of the business district to recover the last of the victims.

Remains Searched for Dead Civilians and soldiers searched for more victims in Tupelo as the bereaved set out to bury their dead.

Tornadoes last Thursday killed 48 persons, centering their fury upon Cordele, Ga., and Greensboro, N. C.

Death of many injured persons added to the Gainesville toll today.

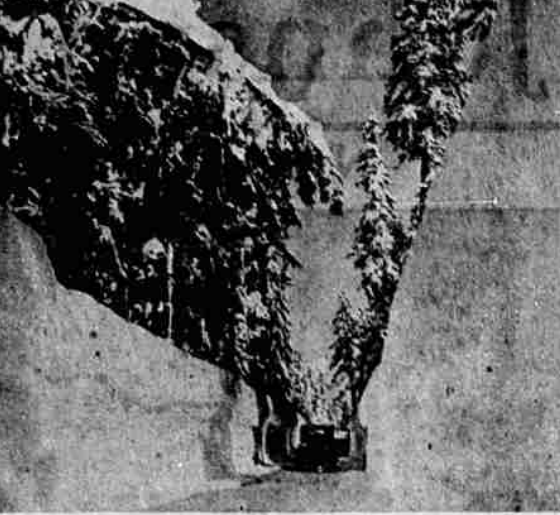

A SAPPHIRE JEWEL IN DAZZLING WHITE



Only those who have seen Crater Lake in its winter setting can conceive the beauty of this wonder work of nature over a mile high in the Cascade mountains of Southern Oregon. The Oregon State Highway Commission has kept both the highways from Medford and from Fort Klamath open to the park boundary throughout the winter. The National Park Service has kept the balance of the route open to Government camp just below the rim and will shortly have it cleared to the top. The upper photograph shows the lake in its robes of white. The lower view gives some conception of the beauty of the highway carved out through snow ranging from a foot deep in the lower levels to more than 16 feet in the higher elevations. From the point where one must leave his car, it requires slightly over half an hour to climb to the rim. Snow shoes or skis are desirable for the climb, according to the Travel and Information Department of the Highway Commission.

on the Cascade line in the Klamath country. The rates were suspended temporarily to determine their justification.

At the hearing, the S. P. undertook to file schedules containing comparative reductions to Klamath Falls from the Oregon origins involved if the suspended schedules were permitted to become effective.

Secretary E. C. Reynolds of the Klamath county chamber of commerce appeared and argued that if any reductions are in order for other southern Oregon points, Klamath should have similar ones.

Subsequently, the ICC revoked its suspensions finding the Southern Pacific's reductions justified. State Utilities Commissioner likewise issued an order finding the suspended schedules worthy of approval and vacating suspension orders.

In vacating the suspension, however, he made that action "subject to the filing of schedules by which any undue or unreasonable prejudice or disadvantage to the Klamath basin territory is removed."

McColloch, in a letter to the chamber transmitted with the copies of his order, said the new schedules had not been filed and therefore it is not as yet definite what the rate here will be.

of there, and that two Pullmans went through the bridge and caught fire.

"All passengers in those Pullmans, apparently about 40, were carbonized," he reported. "The engineer also was burned to death."

"One first class car also fell

into the ravine but apparently all passengers escaped." Other information said 10 bodies had been recovered at 10 a. m. Manuel Hernandez, superintendent of the Vera Cruz Terminal company, escaped death although he was injured, leading to belief other Pullman passengers also survived.

A wrecking train left Vera Cruz to lift the Pullmans and facilitate the search for bodies.
