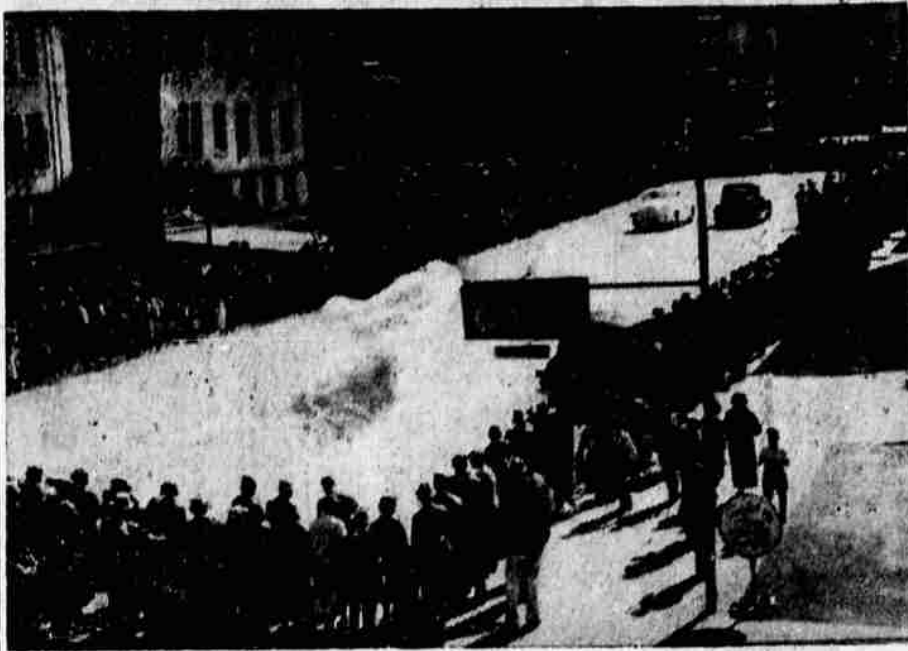
Among strong Mahoneyites here, who weren't pleased at the failure of the board to endorse Mahoney's candidacy for the United States senate, incidentally, Dr. Caswell did come home with an endorsement for himself for democratic national committee, but he has since withdrawn that candidacy.

The Logan letter spoke highly of Dr. Caswell's services and his loyalty to the cause. He has similar letters from other state and district leaders.

Logan, in Portland Tuesday, accepted the national board's ruling on the endorsement question as final. He announced it would be an "open primary." At the same time, the national board's action cancelled the plans of Charles Paine, state campaign manager, to build a political war chest out of nickel-and-dime contributions of Townsenders. The national board informed Logan that not only would it be against policy to endorse primary candidates, but it is "contrary to the policy of national headquarters to levy assessments upon Townsend membership for the support of candidates."

To the extent that Mayor Mahoney has been counting on the Townsend plan in his campaign, the news Tuesday brought new hope for his ambitions. When the endorsements were made, Mahoney received a definite setback. It is believed that he worked diligently to bring about the repudiation of the endorsements, and he told audiences that he had talked by telephone with Dr. F. E. Townsend, himself, about the matter. Townsend, he said, had told him the endorsements

were against policy, and for that reason, Mahoney refused to yield to them.

The rumormongers over the endorsement situation, and startling exposure of inside workings of the Townsend movement in a congressional investigation, have tended to deflate Townsend's political campaign. Dr. Townsend, apparently, was being harassed on all sides by such squabbles as developed in Oregon, where the locally rejected appealed to him for assistance. It is believed that is one reason he turned the whole business over to a national board.

The Caswell situation here has some interesting undercurrent features. Anti-Caswell rumors have been set afoot to the effect that the doctor was going to be asked to resign as a board member, and that he beat the askers to the gun when he announced his intentions. Pro-Caswell stories are that the chiropractor, at the advisory board meeting here when he resigned, swung sentiment in his direction, with the exception of a few devout Mahoneyites. More recently, there have been stories that local clubs might ask the area board to accept Caswell's resignation, as a dig at the doctor.

Change Made

Transfer of A. G. Goehring, manager here for the Pacific Telephone and Telegraph company since 1930, to the general commercial engineering department in Portland, and the appointment of Charles E. Seavey as Goehring's successor, was announced today by R. B. Bacon, district commercial manager for the company.

The change will become effective immediately.

In his five and a half years of service in Klamath Falls, Goehring has made many friends in this district. He has served on many important chambers of commerce committees, and is at present the vice-president of the Kiwanis club. He has been interested particularly in young people, and has been prominent in church and school activities.

Goehring started his telephone work in 1911 in Indiana, transferring to the Pacific coast, at Seattle, in 1916. In 1919 he left the company to go into business for himself, but returned to telephone work in Portland in 1923. After two years in the Portland office, he was named Klamath Falls manager in November, 1930.

Seavey, who succeeds Goehring, is 31 years old, but has had 12 years of telephone service. He started in the plant department in 1924 as a groundman in Portland. Subsequently he was a combination man at Eugene and this city. In 1928 he was transferred to the commercial department in Portland as a salesman.

From September, 1929, to May, 1931, he was manager at Baker. From that time until January of this year, he was with the general sales office in Portland, and since January, he has been commercial representative at Eugene.
