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Showing Them Up

RECENT developments have indicated that the Townsend horse isn't going to be so easy to ride offwards as some may have thought. It appears likely that some of the candidates who were quick to adopt this method of getting themselves elected will be pretty well discredited before the year is over. The probe going on in congress is likely to show up some of these politicians, while the hub-bub in Oregon has gone a long way toward exposing the cheap motives of others.

Among Townsends themselves there seems to be a tendency to recognize cheap political appeal for what it is. While they are strong for the plan, a lot of them can see through the efforts of some of those who get up and weep publicly for the old people, with their thoughts on a fat, easy job for themselves. The conflicting situation in Oregon already has proved that some of the most ardent of these gentlemen aren't willing to sacrifice any of their personal ambitions for the sake of the cause for which they shout so loudly.

They Started Something

CITY councilmen discovered Monday night that they started something, a year or so ago, when they yielded to a demand that they adopt an ordinance prohibiting the advertising of prices by barber shops. Monday night beauty shop operators were there to ask the same thing.

Real purpose of such regulations is not so much to prohibit advertising, as it is to prohibit price-cutting. The idea is to make it difficult for a shop offering services at lower prices to let the public know about it. The council is asked to give the authority of a city ordinance to this restraint, even threatening punishment if somebody should tell the public about a bargain-rate permanent wave. Then there's the possibility that there are persons who would like to know, without risking humiliation by asking at various shops, where lower prices are to be had.

Good Picture

AMONG the productions that have come recently out of Hollywood, none has been more creditable than "The Life of Louis Pasteur," which has shown here this week. It illustrates what Will Hays means when he says that there is a distinction between motion pictures with a message, and those with self-serving propaganda.

Hays, incidentally, in that remark recognizes the social responsibility of the film industry to the public. It reaches into the lives of 80,000,000 Americans. It can be a tremendous force for enlightenment as well as entertainment.

The public may be expected to protest, eventually, when the quality of films drops to lower levels, but often it is too late and the damage is already done. More pictures of the quality of "The Life of Louis Pasteur" would be a real credit to the industry.

In the current issue of the Oregon Voter is a paragraph containing favorable mention of Klamath's two democratic legislators. Says the Voter: "Harry D. Boivin and Henry Semon of Klamath Falls, both democrats, have no republican nomination listed. NEWS BEHIND THE NEWS

The Inside Story From The Capital

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WASHINGTON, April 7.—Congressional leaders have been exceptionally shy in dodging publicity about their remaining legislative program.

The reason is President Roosevelt has tipped them confidentially to hold off the flood control pork barrel and other budget evasions until he gets back. A radio program was received by them direct from the presidential yacht late last week, although they did not let that fact out generally. It promised them a flood control powwow at the White House immediately after the president returns.

At that time Mr. Roosevelt will insist that the flood bill be limited to uncultivated surveys by army engineers. He will also demand cuts in some of the pending appropriation bills which have been quietly packed with extra budgetary pork.

LETTER WRITING

Not only the polls now suggest that Governor Landon's lead has been increased. The surprised faces of some of his adversaries hereabout confirm them.

Republican spade men in congress have not generally been strong for Landon. They were not at first impressed by his candidacy. They thought it would be impossible for him to perfect an organization because he has declined to travel much and has not maintained any regular contacts with local leaders out through the country.

A series of developments like those in Kentucky and California lately has caused them to change their opinions. They are beginning to get evidence that the Kansas stay-at-home has a tremendous under-cover organization. They say it was established almost entirely by mail. They already speak of it respectfully as "The Chain Letter Campaign."

That is exactly the same technique Mr. Roosevelt used to build up his pre-convention organization four years ago.

PREPARATIONS

The Japanese are only kicking up dust in Mongolia. Their hidden purpose is to create an excuse for moving more troops up to the Russian front. This is the inside explanation accredited to the best official circles here. No one here believes hostilities are as imminent as they appear to be.

The amusing part of it is that the Mongolians are showing remarkable resistance. They have declined to run like most of the Chinese. That fact in itself is sufficient reason for believing that current bombings and border incidents will lead only to a strengthening of the Japanese military position.

The war will come later. Note—Outer Mongolia is not yet a part of the Soviet union. But it borders on the autonomous outer Buryat Mongolian republic which is Russian territory. The people of both countries are of the same race. Moscow has been training its Buryat subjects and sending them into outer Mongolia as missionaries. The result has been a mutual assistance pact between the Soviet union and outer Mongolia.

UNDERSTANDING

The secret understanding between Tokio and Berlin is supposed to be somewhat one-sided. It provides that if the Japanese decide to move against Russia, no obligation rests upon Germany to join immediately. But if Germany decides to go, the Japanese will move at once. This information is in the hands of competent authorities here. They believe it to be highly important. It means that Japanese aggression would not immediately cause a world war, but German aggression would.

TREATIES

Rome and Vienna would deny it vigorously, but the best informed are convinced Mussolini had an understanding in the Austrian conscription act. They think he okayed the Vienna move in order to give the Ethiopian sanctioning nations something to think about.

By ordering conscription, Austria violated the treaty of St. Germain. It represents just as serious a violation as Hitler in a legal sense.

What European nations will have next is a new set of treaties specifically legalizing violations, just as the new London naval treaty does.

CONSISTENCY

No. 1.—The government has urged shorter hours on industry etc., but night guards at federal prisons generally work up to 12 hours a day, and in some places nine days out of ten. Also, in one federal prison they work seven days a week.

ject was considered good unless he discussed the "psychological aspects." This year it is "philosophy." House stenographers have tired of speeches beginning, "The philosophy of this legislation," blah, blah, blah.

The popularity of these two words during the last two sessions is attributed to the fact that if a speaker does not know the details of his subject he can speak freely about the psychology or philosophy of it.

PORTLAND, April 7. (AP)—Dana Sleeth, 58, one-time editor of the old Portland News and for years author of the "Hill-Billy" column in a newspaper chain, died from injuries received a week ago when he fell into a tub of scalding water.

He was born in Iowa and followed newspaper work in Seattle, Los Angeles, Plattsburgh, Neb., and Lincoln, Neb.

His widow, a daughter, Mrs. William A. Winston of Brownsville, Texas, and a son, Marshall Sleeth of Portland, survive.

PORTLAND, April 7. (AP)—The lumber industry will see permanent prosperity from now on, C. C. Crow, publisher of the Pacific Coast Lumber Digest, told Portland chamber of commerce members.

"The last great stand of timber is here and there is little competition ahead," he said, adding that Oregon's 292 billion feet of standing timber eventually will bring \$7,700,000,000 into the state.

PORTLAND, April 7. (AP)—Statements by Chief Detective Yoris of Seattle that Portland and other Oregon points are "dumping" unwanted criminals on Seattle are unfounded, as far as chief of Police Harry Niles of Portland knows, he said today.
