The Inside Story From The Capital

WASHINGTON, April 8.—Treasury Secretary Morgenthau's remarkable case of gripe improved progressively as the house tax hearings neared an end. The timeliness of the attack, which dispatched him to sunny Georgia just before the hearings started, likewise restored him to health and Washington the day they were scheduled to close.

The absence of the general during the formative stage of the battle has caused considerable comment among camp followers. They are making the natural mistake of suspecting that it is a personal matter, whereas it involves the whole strategy of the administration fight.

Therein lies the explanation of what has happened so far and the promise of what is to come.

CAGEY
 More than one general has considered it wise to find out where the army is going before attempting to lead it there. This technique is especially advisable with armies as unruly as congress in a tax fight during a campaign year.

What happened was this: General Roosevelt and Morgenthau submitted the vague outlines of a corporation tax reform with astounding possibilities for soaking the rich and sharing the wealth. They then sent a couple of cavalry troopers, Colonels Oliphant and Helvering (and Captain McLeod), up to argue it out with the army while they went fishing, or during the gripe, as the case may be.

In the interim, the details of the tax issue have been fought out. The vagaries of the original scheme have been clipped off. It is possible to see just what can be done.

A vigorous leadership for that can now be undertaken.

RESULTS
 A general understanding has been reached among the insiders that the final form of the bill will not carry any broad-reaching or wealth-sharing implications.

The corporation tax, they say, will strike only the few corporations which have more surpluses now than they will ever be able to use and the personal corporations which have been used for tax evasion.

Such exempt exemptions will be provided to enable corporations generally, big and little, to retire their debts and accumulate reasonable surpluses without an increase in existing taxation.

If that is not sufficiently guaranteed in the bill now being composed by the house committee, it will be provided in the senate. At least it is the promise now being made as generally on the inside that it has become a general expectation. Some skeptics will want to wait until they see it.

It may mean a fairly good bill, although it will not raise anything like the \$800,000,000 of additional revenue which this president demands.

CONFESION
 The increase proposed in the corporate tax reform has been concealed by the fact that the tax is being transferred from the corporation to the individual. That makes comparisons difficult.

Internal Revenue Commissioner Helvering let the cat out one day when he testified that the new proposed tax would be equivalent to a flat tax of 25 per cent on corporations. The average corporation income tax now, including the capital stock tax, is 16.4 per cent.

Thus corporation taxation under the proposed plan would have been boosted to a level higher than in Great Britain, supposedly the highest taxed nation in the world. In Great Britain the corporation tax is 22 1/2 per cent, a reduction from the high point of 25 per cent.

News of Oregon

PORTLAND, Ore., April 8. (AP)—The boys can't whoop it up in Portland any more—not if the police department hears about it. Noise, as such, is definitely out. Six motorists already have fallen under the curfew for quietude, launched as a result of a new city ordinance. They tooted their auto horns—unnecessarily, officers claimed.

The city will resemble a silent movie if the ordinance prohibiting the following is carried out: Bell-adorned animals, shouting newboys (except in certain districts), unnecessary grating and grinding, out-of-hours construction work, blaring radios, unmodified motor vehicles, shouting and horn-blowing.

LA GRANDE, Ore., April 8. (AP)—The Eastern Normal Dental Association, of which Dr. Frank Eames of La Grande is president, will hold its spring meeting here April 11.

SILVERTON, Ore., April 8. (AP)—George W. Steelhammer, chairman of the Silverton hospital board, said plans are underway to construct a \$20,000 one-story unit near the present hospital. The new unit would accommodate 25 beds, a surgery, maternity ward and X-ray rooms.

BURNS, Ore., April 8. (AP)—Sheriff C. W. Frazier took Tobe Skeins to the penitentiary at Salem a few hours after Judge Charles W. Ellis sentenced Skeins to 10 years in prison for slaying his brother-in-law, Ed McDonald, last August.

Skeins was convicted of manslaughter. Defense Attorney H. V. Schmalz said he regarded the punishment as a life sentence since Skeins is 54 years old and accustomed to an out-door life.

PORTLAND, Ore., April 8. (AP)—A Eugene resident found Portland police "get their men" even if only for minor traffic law violations.

Patrolman George Johnson, in charge of the overtime parking tag window, said the Eugene man had 12 tags, failed to answer four letters and finally was picked up here and compelled to hand over \$12. The first tag was nearly a year old.

PORTLAND, Ore., April 8. (AP)—Miss Reinholda Dobberfuhl, 22-year old Portland girl and graduate of St. Vincent's hospital, will be assigned a position as stewardess on an airliner, United Air Line.

officials announced. The firm employs 125 in like positions.

PORTLAND, Ore., April 8. (AP)—Sam Lee's cry for "police" cost him \$20 on charges of possessing lottery equipment.

John W. Keegan, whom Lee wanted police to arrest, was given a six-months suspended sentence. It started last week when Lee set up a complaint outside his store. Officers responded. Lee said Keegan was disgruntled because he did not win on a lottery and took some money anyway.

As the officers started Keegan toward the jail, one asked "where was this lottery?" Lee went along, too, when he answered "just inside."

ST. HELENS, Ore., April 8. (AP)—Except for portions of Willamette slough, fishing for Chinook in the St. Helens area has brought meagre results, fishermen said today. Higher and clearer waters in the Columbia and tributary streams probably will bring better luck, they opined.

ASTORIA, Ore., April 8. (AP)—Posting of bonds resulted in freedom for eight defendants in the Seattle labor riot case, the first trial of which is scheduled tentatively for April 27.

Judge T. R. Peters of Hillsboro will preside. Thirty-seven men were charged with participation in the clash which cost the lives of two.

MARSHFIELD, Ore., April 8. (AP)—Ed W. Miller, secretary-manager of the Oregon Coast Highway association, said action of the state highway commission and the works progress administration in authorizing the \$1,017,000 road-beautification project in the Portland area was to be commended. His statement followed publication of protests from Pacific highway officials.

MARSHFIELD, Ore., April 8. (AP)—M. P. Schwenker said he will appeal to the supreme court from his conviction on charges of operating a lottery. The Marshfield city council refunded his \$300 bond, issued when he began operation of a dart game here, pending settlement of the case.

PORTLAND, Ore., April 8. (AP)—Federal department of justice agents will attend a five-day school here beginning June 29. C. C. Spears, "G" man chief in

Portland, said similar instructions would be given in five other cities in the midwest and east.

Identification through fingerprints will be emphasized. Agents from most western states will attend the Portland course, Spears said.

ASTORIA, Ore., April 8. (AP)—Steve Petrich, about 60, died here as a result of injuries incurred on a highway Feb. 7. He was found badly injured by a passing motorist.

Police today renewed their search for the hit-run driver believed responsible for his death. Petrich was attached to the transient camp at Camp Clatsop.

GRANTS PASS, Ore., April 8. (AP)—Anyone who can cook food on a camp fire for a group of hungry men might do well to get in touch with G. E. Mitchell, supervisor of the Siskiyou National forest.

Mitchell was asked concerning the greatest handicap in maintaining 1,800 miles of trails, 500 miles of roads and 600 miles of telephone lines.

The greatest difficulty, he said, is obtaining "cooks who can prepare food over a camp fire for maintenance men in camps."

Ten Years Ago in Klamath

SAN FRANCISCO, April 8. (AP)—The climatic spring calm that usually prevails throughout California about this time of the year, is being torn to shreds by a succession of storms, a particularly hard one hitting the coast from end to end today, bringing successive surges of gales, hurricanes and drenching rains.

An exhibit building, constructed of Klamath pine from basement to roof, will be built at the southern Oregon tourist bureau station at the junction of the Ashland-Klamath Falls and the Pacific highway.

California Muddle

CALIFORNIA, steaming political swamp wherein many a strange idea or movement is hatched, reports a highly muddled situation in the republican party at this time.

Latest trouble seems to have developed around the presidential candidacy of Alf M. London, the Kansas Coolidge, which has collided with party difficulties said to be the result of some kind of a deal between William Randolph Hearst, the publisher, and Governor Frank Merriam.

Hearst has been beating the drum for London, who, according to some pretty good reports, is none too happy about it but can hardly tell his powerful supporter to get off the wagon. Recently Merriam also came out for London, astounding observers who knew he had some high-powered presidential ambitions of his own.

The state republican assembly—a "young republicans" organization, thinks it sees through it all. It charges that Hearst and Merriam, who have never wasted any love on each other, have worked out a deal whereby Merriam gives his support for London, and in return gets control of California federal patronage if a republican happens to be elected president. He already controls state patronage.

If this is true, and the deal works out, California republicans would be in much the same position with reference to their delegation at the national convention as California democrats were four years ago when W. G. McAdoo traded Garner out of the national situation under orders of Mr. Hearst.

It is particularly unfortunate to the extent that it puts Mr. London in a bad light. The situation, no doubt, is not one of his own making, and the chances are it has some complex angles that he himself does not understand from a distance.

An Injustice Done

AN incident at this week's council meeting illustrates the chances for injustices in the council's blanket policy on package beer license recommendations.

Some time ago the councilmen, harassed by numerous applications for beer permits, adopted a resolution stating that it would recommend no more new licenses for package liquor stores except bona fide restaurants and hotels.

Monday night the council, because of this policy, was forced to turn down an application from a neighborhood grocer out on California avenue. All this grocer wanted to do was to sell packaged light beverages for off-premises consumption. It seems unfair that he should be denied that privilege, yet the council, in view of its adopted policy, had little choice.

Beer gardens and other establishments where alcoholic beverages are consumed quite often become nuisances. A blanket policy limiting the number of such places has far more justification than one that applies to package business.
