The fire department was called, and the blaze extinguished by chopping away a portion of the under floor in the basement.

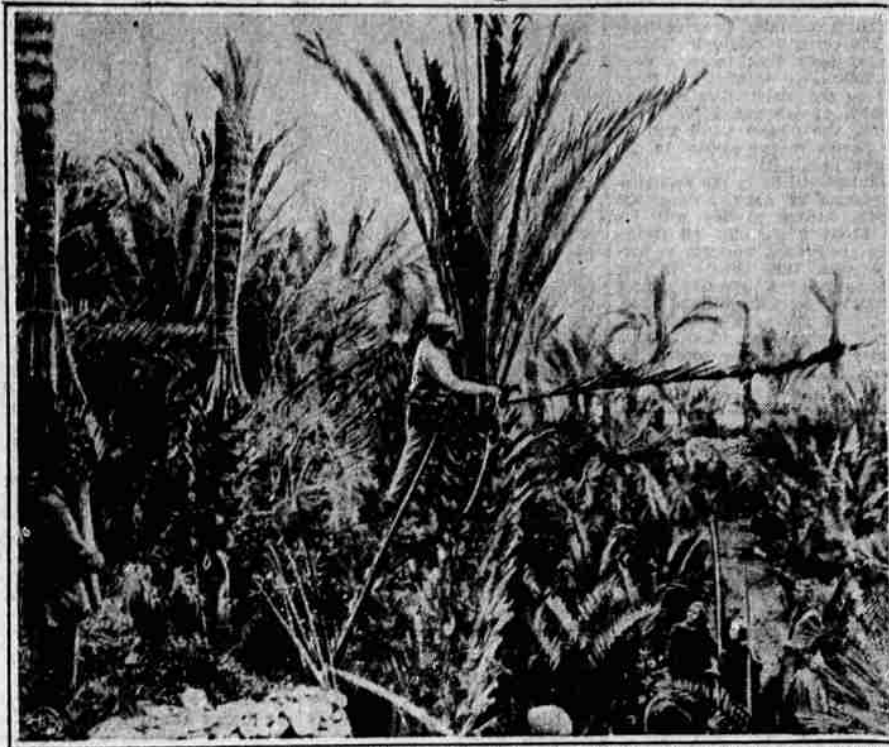
Roseburg Judge to Hear Cases

Appointment of Judge Carl E. Wimberly of Roseburg to hear the case of Jensen vs. the Klamath county court and others, was announced Wednesday morning by the supreme court. Jensen, who is county surveyor, is suing the county court for back wages allegedly due him. His attorney, David R. Vandenberg, filed an affidavit of prejudice against Judge E. B. Ashurst, whose place Judge Wimberly will take in the case. No date has been set for the trial.

Jackie Coogan Wins Two Damage Suits

LOS ANGELES, April 8. (AP)—Jackie Coogan, young screen actor, won two damage suits against him for \$300,000 today. Superior Judge Frank Swain directed a jury to bring in a verdict for Coogan. The suits were based on an automobile accident last year in which Coogan's father, John H. Coogan, and three of the actor's friends were killed. Judge Swain ruled there was no evidence that the elder Coogan, who was driving at the time, had been drinking.

Kittredge Buys Ranch at Bidwell

ALTURAS, Calif., April 8. (AP)—William Kittredge, former operator of the old "P" ranch in Oregon, now a wild fowl refuge, has become owner of the Warner Valley Stock company, north of Fort Bidwell. It is announced here by Roy R. Baker. He said the price was \$400,000.

Kittredge's "P" ranch, south of Burns, Ore., was purchased by the government biological survey recently for migratory water fowl. Kittredge, one of the last of the big cattle men of southern Oregon, declared afterward he'd dry up and blow away if he didn't have some place he could hear dogs bawling—so he bought the Warner valley property.

Joe Penner's Duck Ordained

LOS ANGELES, April 8. (AP)—An investigator for the Los Angeles Ministerial association charged today that at least 913 persons, and Joe Penner's duck, have been ordained by a local "mail-order church."

Dr. U. L. Di Ghilini, the investigator, said \$10 was charged for ordination as a minister, \$5 more for a doctor of divinity degree—with no theological study necessary—and \$15 additional for a third rank of bishop.
