The vote was 238 to 5. Diego Martinez Barrio, speaker for parliament, automatically became temporary president and will serve until a new chief executive is elected.

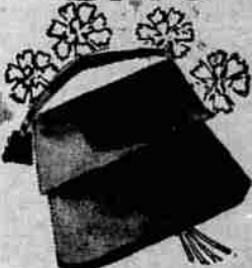
