Another Olympic Entry

Bob Leslie Expected to Enter Trials for Berlin Games.

Klamath county may have another track star for the Olympic games in Berlin this summer. Four years ago at Los Angeles, one of the American team's most outstanding representatives was Bob Leslie, who was a member of the University of Oregon track and field team.

This year Klamath county's candidate will be Bob Leslie, ex-Pelican track and football player.

Leslie, who is joint holder of the state 100-yard dash record along with Bobby Grayson, Stanford's famous fullback, is a freshman at Oregon State college. While Leslie went to Los Angeles last fall with the expressed intention of entering UCLA, his registration was never completed. He returned to Oregon, and soon enrolled at Oregon State, where he is now developing into a most promising sprinter.

He is top man of the track squad, and there isn't a variety regular who can beat him in the dash.

There is little doubt that Leslie will enter the tryouts for the northwest and Pacific coast.

His best time for the 100-yard dash is 16.6. The Olympic record for 100 yards, slightly more than 100 yards, is 16.2.

Louis Promised Foreign Tour if Beats Schmeling

NEW YORK, April 9, (AP)—Joe Louis today had an added incentive for knocking Max Schmeling in June and then taking the world's heavyweight crown from James J. Braddock in the fall.

Jeff Dickson, former Jackson, Miss., boy, but now Europe's foremost sports promoter, has promised the brown bomber a tour of 11 countries if he beats Schmeling and Braddock. Louis is willing. So are his managers and Mike Jacobs of the Twentieth Century Sporting club, which has Joe under contract until 1940. Starting in October, Dickson, who arrived in New York Wednesday, plans to have Louis appear in exhibitions in England, France, Portugal, Spain, Denmark, Switzerland, Sweden, Belgium, Czechoslovakia, Austria and Poland. Dickson also would like to book Max Baer for several European engagements. If the former champion is willing to come out of retirement, the Paris promoter would send him against Tommy Farr, a 23-year-old 110-pounder, in London, against Andre Langlet in Paris and a suitable opponent in Madrid.

Genshlea, who says good ball players don't crab, got his share of fight, pop bottles and cushions in the 12th when he ran Jack Glynn out of the game because the Oak right fielder protested too vigorously against his decision. Three policemen protected Genshlea from a threatened A's mob.

Glynn singled in the ninth to drive in two runs and tie the game after the stage was set by Dixie Howell's error. In the 12th inning the former Alabama football fash squared accounts by robbing the Oaks of victory with a great one hand catch of Bol-yard's liner back of second.

St. Louis' beardless Senators got the Stringfellow habit yesterday and helped Seattle to a 3-2 victory with six errors. Shortstop Sid Stringfellow set the pace with two bobbles, bringing his average back to an even error a game. The Indians did their share by pounding three Sacramento hurlers for 18 hits. It was the Tribe's seventh successive victory.

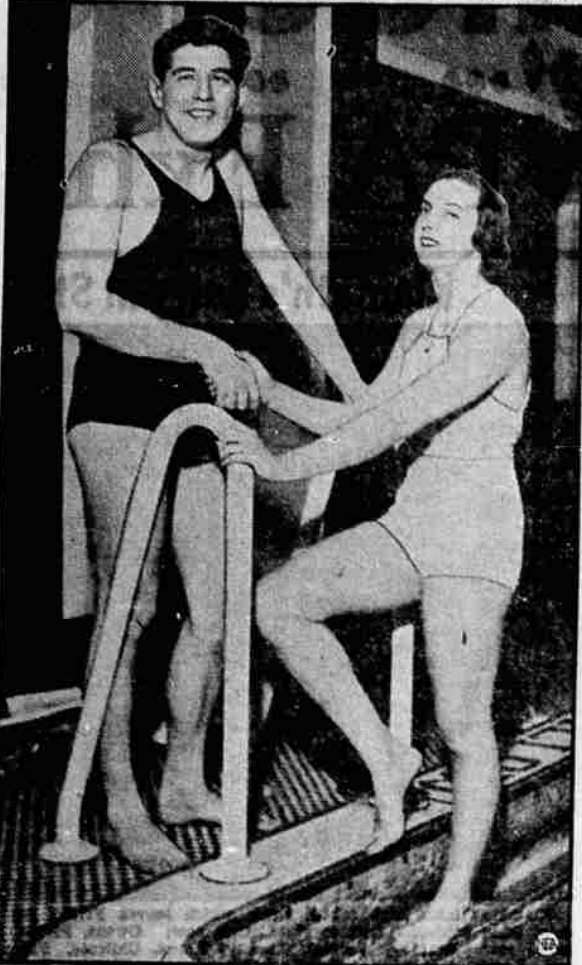
King Befriends Former Caddy

Wilson Favorite to Defeat Champion Belcastro

The two grapplers will headline the program scheduled for the Klamath armory next Tuesday night.

Belcastro has not lost a match here since returning from Southern California and Mexico. Meeting Chick twice, Wilson proved that he had lost none of the power that carried him to all-American fame as a football player for the University of Washington.

PORTLAND, April 9, (UP)—Detectives and patrolmen who "frisked" Frank W. SHIKAT CAUSE OF MAT STRIFE

Grappler's Jump to Outlaw Circuit Opens Controversy.

NEW YORK, April 9.—Dick Shikat has jumped to the outlaw and a bigger and better burping war is on.

The howls of the heads of the big bone-bending combine, make it plain that Shikat wasn't supposed to do what he did to Danno O'Mahoney at the Garden the other night.

But Shikat, who really can wrestle, evidently grew tired of being given the run-around, so eloped a hammerlock on O'Mahoney, who can't wrestle.

The men hardly were in their dressing rooms before Jack Curley and Joe Mondt, the New York promoters, announced that the result didn't mean a thing inasmuch as the New York commission forces mat engagements to be advertised as exhibitions.

Paul Bowser of Boston said that the heavyweight championship was of little importance, anyhow. Tom Packs of St. Louis and Ray Fabiani of Philadelphia made light of Shikat's surprising victory.

Nevertheless, Curley, Mondt, Bowser, Packs, and Fabiani, directors of the main mat wheel, realize that Al Haft and Billy Sandow of Columbus now have the upper hand with Shikat on the throne.

Marshall Gets Chance
Sandow virtually controlled the industry in America for more than a decade with Ed Lewis as his shooting star. The powers have treated him like a stepson since he broke with the Strangler in 1934.

Meanwhile, Sandow has patiently bided his time on the kerosene circuit with Everett Marshall, a stocky California blond with more hammers, locks, and scissors than a hardware merchant.

It is reported that Shikat is to collect \$50,000 for pulling and tugging with Marshall in Denver, May 22. The crown is worth vastly more than that to Sandow, who with his man on top would be in position to invade once more the larger centers and make things tough for the opposition.

Those closest to the situation will be surprised if the leadership of the behemoth isn't passed along to Marshall.

Shikat, who has been around for quite a spell, was overly blessed with bucks office magic, which is the principal requirement of the burly bloke bossing the wrestling works. The dashing Marshall, on the other hand, might succeed in making the turnstile spin.

As Gus Sonnenberg, who put wrestlers into the more important money by bringing football tactics to the canvas, explains, the next big draw will have to show the public something new and exciting. With Sandow advising him, Marshall can be depended upon to give the customers a show.

Roughhouse Tactics Old
Speaking of Sonnenberg, the old Dartmouth lineman is credited with having revolutionized the antiquated dodge with his flying tackle or butt, although the Greeks "lowered their heads and thrust themselves forward, butting like rams" 4000 years ago.

Two Horses Head Favorites for Kentucky Derby

NEW YORK, April 9, (AP)—The betting commission's favorites for the Kentucky Derby at 13 to 5 and holding Hal Price Headley's Hollywood at 4 to 1 to take the Kentucky Derby, but their trainers declare the odds far too short.

"It's a 3 to 1 shot you can't name a starter," declared Pete Coyne, who arrived with Headley at Louisville Wednesday.

"Hollywood is too short at those odds," said 28-year-old Duval Headley, as he watched his uncle's star work out at Belmont park.

But regardless of the odds, Tom Shaw, eastern bookmaker, reports a heavy play on the two colts, which dominate the future books as few horses have in recent years. The odds on Headley were reduced sharply following his victory in the Florida Derby, in which he equaled the world's record of 1:48 1/5 for a mile and one-eighth. The quotations on Hollywood have declined gradually as reports of his fine condition come from the stable.

Barring a sensational race by the Bonar stable's Grand Slam or some other Derby eligible in the Chesapeake stakes at Havre de Grace, April 18, Headley and Hollywood almost are certain to hold their positions, at least until the renewal of the Wood Memorial, at Jamaica, April 25. The mile and 70-yard race will be Hollywood's first important test, in which he will be asked to match strides with many of the other ranking Derby candidates. Young Headley is expected to give his charge a six-furlong trial before the Wood, however.

Small yearly assessments on all club members helped raise necessary finances.

Boxers leaving tomorrow for the Olympic boxing tryouts in Cleveland are Ken Robertson, 160; Don Wood, 147; Ace Heintz, 126; and Frank Pitka, 135. Tom Louttit, Multnomah club boxing instructor, will accompany them.

The club will send Herbert Hinton, 145, to the tryouts at Lehigh university April 16, 17 and 18.

Alfred Amundson, 165-pounder, who is a weight lifter, will go to the National A. A. U. championships at Cleveland.

Four club girls will enter the Junior National A. A. U. medley relay swimming championships at San Francisco April 29. They are Audrey Haffenden, Nancy Lewis, Arline Darby and one more to be selected.

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
