FIRST DIVISION TEAMS VICTORS

Portland Drops Another Ball Game to Oaks, 4 to 3.

It took two extra inning games to it, but the first division rolled solidly ahead of the second section in the Pacific Coast league's baseball offering Thursday.

Sacramento's cellar Senators put up a game and valiant fight for 13 innings before letting the Seattle Indians win 5-4 for their eighth consecutive victory. Fourthly swabs by Fred Muller, Seattle's second sacker, in the second inning, and Lou Vezelich, Senator outfielder, in the eighth, each with two men on, were largely responsible for the extra innings.

Padres Lose to Seals
Steve Coscarart fell in the last of the ninth and the pace-setting Oakland A's ran away with a 4-3 victory over the Portland Beavers. With the Oaks trailing 3 to 2 and two men on, Earl Boddard lined one out to deep center field. It looked like an easy catch or at best a single. Coscarart took a step forward, whirled to run back, and fell on his face. The hit went for a triple and the game.

Out-batted and out-hit, San Diego's Padres lost 7-6 to San Francisco's Seals in ten innings. Six Seal errors and three by the Padres helped pile up the score and stretch out the game, even if they didn't add to the reputation of so-called class A.A. ball.

Angels Shut-Out
Little, left-handed Frank Lamanski was way too big for the once mighty Los Angeles batters, and he shut them out, 5-0, allowing only five hits. The Angels got twice that many off Glenn Gabler and J. Millard Campbell. A beautiful peg by Rightfielder Maxie West caught the only Angel who dared to run for home. Only one other of Frank Lellivell's men reached second.

Football Held Bad for Players in Other Sports

PALO ALTO, Calif., April 10. (AP)—Because it "ruins" material for other sports like baseball, basketball and swimming, four of six major sport coaches at Stanford university believe football is the "bad boy" of the sporting world.

Harry Wolter, Cardinal baseball coach, claims the football player has arm and leg muscles so large they affect the way he tosses a baseball and causes the "stop and go" gallop of the football runner while running bases.

Eddie Wright, golf mentor, says the tight shoulder muscles also affect the easy, supple swing on driving. He also believes basketball is bad for golfers, while tennis is on the credit side, because it produces strong forearms and wrists.

In Stanford's basketball department, Coach John Bunn claims football slows up the much-needed tricky footwork of the basketball player, but basketball is beneficial to the football man, especially an end, pointing with pride to Keith Topping of last season's squad, who danced away from tacklers under high passes.

A swimmer's muscles must be long and loose, so football is the fly in Coach Norl Thornton's soup. Thornton says most football players who try out for the swimming team are bulging from the shoulders up and tend more to sink than swim.

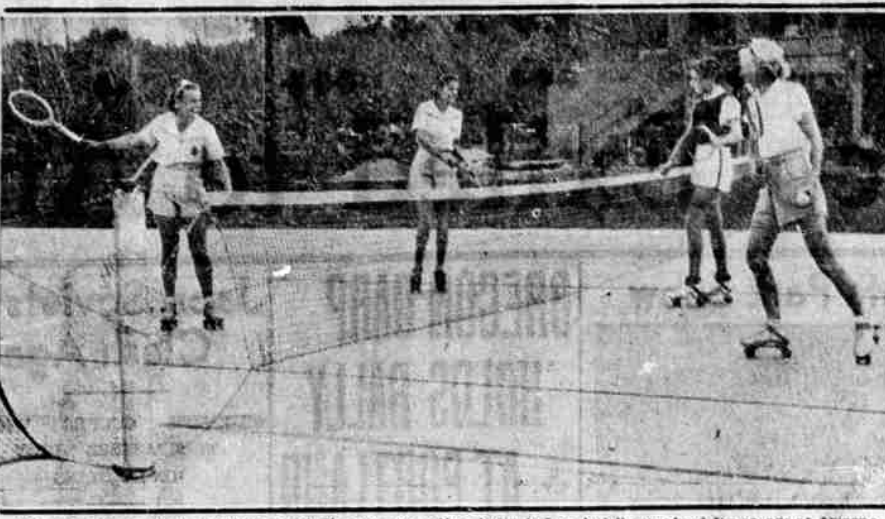
Basketball, not football, is the sport that hurts trackmen, says "Dink" Templeton. It plays havoc with high jumpers.

Hood river was normal, but catches small. Fishing was good in tributaries. Some good catches with salmon, eggs, spinners and worms made in Deschutes river, which remained a little high. High central Oregon lakes were blocked by snow.

Polk and Marion county streams were still high with snow water. If weather remains favorable, conditions were expected to be much better this weekend.

Tony Canzoneri Wins Fight Over Johnny Jadick

NEW YORK, April 10. (AP)—Tony Canzoneri, the lightweight king and one of the greatest of the little fighting men, had another victory to his credit today, a 10-round decision over an old foe, Johnny Jadick of Philadelphia.

Weighing 133 1/2 to 140 for Jadick, Canzoneri had plenty to contend with in the non-title go, and caused some of the experts who picked him to defeat Jimmy McLarnin in their May 8 fight, to wrinkle their brows.

Jadick, who captured Tony's junior welterweight title in 1930, used a left jab to advantage. Canzoneri put the Philadelphia down for counts of four and nothing in the eighth and tenth rounds. Jadick was tired and battered when the fight ended.

Spina Will Meet Oakland Battler

Co-Educational Sports Seen as Coming Policy

CORVALLIS, Ore., April 10. (AP)—Co-educational recreation and sports may find a new place in western colleges next fall.

College women physical training directors in session here expressed the opinion the old high-board-fence policy of separating boys' and girls' sports is passing. They also recognized an increasing demand for recreation rather than mere exercise and went on record favoring granting of credits for participation in games only when skill was shown.

The delegates represented the western society of the departments of physical education for college women.

They passed a resolution urging that students be provided with sports costumes and equipment at no extra cost.

The delegates also concluded that physical education departments must co-operate in providing more and better trained recreational leaders. Closer co-ordination with departments of health education, music and fine arts was advocated.
