Dr. and Mrs. A. M. Simmons of Klamath Falls visited Mr. and Mrs. Owen Peppie on Monday evening.

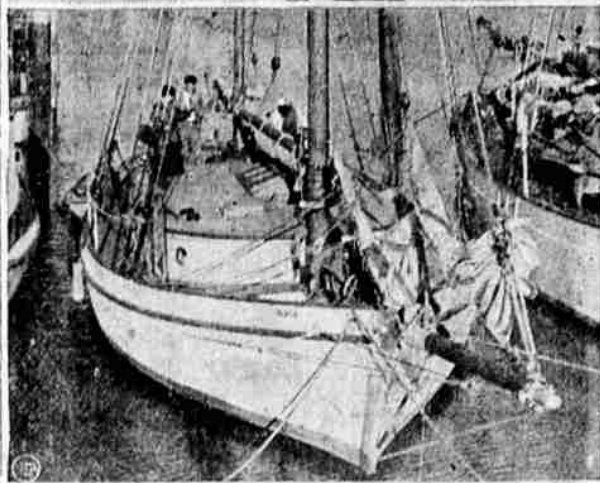
There will be a dance at Loretta Saturday, April 11, given by the Community club. Good music is promised and all are invited to attend.

Boondoggling to Continue, WPA Chief Indicates

WASHINGTON, April 10. (UP)—WPA Administrator Harry L. Hopkins has given the house appropriations sub-committee a clear indication that some of the additional \$1,500,000,000 sought for relief will be spent on so-called "boondoggling" projects, it was reported Thursday.

Likewise, it was learned, Hopkins has given the committee no assurance that this would be the last large relief grant the administration would seek. The \$1,500,000,000 figure was reached, he said, by estimating the cost of continuing WPA for another 12 months at \$125,000,000 a month.

Although the appropriation is not "ear-marked" and the White House is said to oppose imposition of any restrictions on expenditures of the relief money, Hopkins indicated that \$25,000,000 would be spent on roads, \$175,000,000 on waterworks and sewer construction and \$175,000,000 on state, county, municipal and school buildings.
