European diplomats, weary from extensive conversations on international problems, paused in their negotiations to observe the Easter holidays today as Turkey requested formal permission to abrogate the Lausanne pact.

The Turkish foreign minister handed formal notes to the other seven signatories to the treaty, which established demilitarized zones on each side of the Dardanelles. The governments were asked to amend clauses of the treaty to permit rearmament of the areas.

In Geneva, the league conciliation committee of 13 recessed until next Thursday, as Salvatore de Madariaga, Spanish delegate sought to bring together Italian and Ethiopian emissaries for peace talks. The League powers, according to a month's recess, gave British Foreign Secretary Anthony Eden an opportunity to attempt to formulate a security plan for Europe.

Italian forces in Ethiopia continued to receive the assistance of Revolving Galla and Azebo tribesmen. Field Marshal Pietro Badoglio reported to the Ethiopian defenders had been slain by the rebellious warriors.

Campaign Leader Sent to Yakima

ima, Wash., inaugurated a wooden box campaign. Watkins, an employee of the company, was named manager of the campaign and through the efforts of the workers in this drive, enough merchandise was transferred from fibre to wooden boxes to use over three and one-fourth million feet of lumber, increasing the payroll by over \$50,000.

The Yakima movement received wide publicity, and similar campaigns were started elsewhere. On January 1, 1936, Watkins was borrowed to start the campaign in the Klamath basin and Lakeview district, and he has been here much of the time since. Dorris and Mt. Shasta of northern California also came in.

This drive has now grown until about 11,300 men are joined in it and a large percentage of the goods shipped into the territory is packed in wooden boxes. Hean will devote all of his time to carrying on the program. Hean was an employee of the Weyerhaeuser Timber company for several years. He is an old-time resident of Klamath Falls.

It is estimated that 55 per cent of southern Oregon lumber is box lumber. It must be used for box purposes, or cannot be sold for enough to yield the cost of production, the wooden box promoters state. Thus, they say, the importance of selling this grade of lumber is readily seen.

"When we stop to think that 55 per cent of all the people west of the 100th meridian are either directly or indirectly dependent upon lumber for their livelihood, we realize how important it is to keep the mills running," said Watkins. "Approximately seven men are employed to make a given number of wooden boxes for every one employed to make the same number of fibre boxes."

At the first annual county conference on family living, which will be held at the Henley grange hall on April 17, Mrs. Azalea Sager, extension specialist in clothing and textiles, will discuss "When the Family Buys Shoes."

Mrs. Sager says: "I find that few parents know how much larger the shoes should be than the feet. Many parents tell me they spend more money on shoes than on any other item of clothing, and some times they wear well and again they are a 'poor buy.' The cost, comfort and wearing qualities are the problems in buying shoes," Mrs. Sager emphasizes.

Mrs. Sager will discuss the types of shoes for the various members of the family, men as well as women. The first shoe necessary for the very small child will not be forgotten, and the correct type for growing boys and girls will be explained.

The demonstration will include not only the development and care of the feet, but the shopping points to look for when shoes are purchased. Models will be used to demonstrate both foot development and shoe fitting.

An extensive exhibit illustrating both good and poor footwear will be on display during the day.

VATICAN CITY, April 11 (AP)—Several thousand German pilgrims cheered "Heil Papa" to Pope Pius today as the holy father received 4,000 visitors in Rome for the Easter holidays.

After receiving the pilgrims the prelate delivered a short speech saying he hoped they would receive new spiritual life from Easter which is the purpose of celebrating this religious holiday.

SAN PEDRO, Calif., April 11 (AP)—Special Easter services will be held aboard all the larger warships of the United States fleet tomorrow morning.

All warships having chaplains will hold regular Easter services at 10 o'clock on Easter morning, while a number of the ships will also hold earlier services at 8:30 o'clock.

Catholics will be granted shore leave to attend mass.

House Softens Revenue Bill's Harsh Details

WASHINGTON, April 11, (AP)—

Heeding stern warnings from business and financial leaders, congressional tax experts Friday agreed to soften the blow of the administration's new revenue bill on corporations in debt.

At the same time, the house ways and means sub-committee drafting the tax measure voted to place foreign banks, insurance companies and trust units operating in America in the same category as similar domestic units and tax their net income 15 per cent instead of the proposed 22 1/2 per cent.

Foreign Business Helped
Chairman Samuel B. Hill, democrat, Washington, of the sub-committee said his group virtually had abandoned plans of taking a tax of 22 1/2 per cent on dividends that go abroad to non-alien firms from foreign corporations operating in the United States.

Foreign corporations in receivership in American courts also are to be given special consideration. They will be subjected to the 15 per cent tax imposed on American corporations in receivership, Hill stated.

Short of Needs
He declined to estimate the loss in revenue that will result from these exemptions and revisions. The bill, prior to changes made today, fell \$345,000,000 short of the amount President Roosevelt estimated would be needed over a period of three years to balance the ordinary budget and finance the bonus and farm programs.
