Pelican Track Squad Meets Malin on Friday

TEAM TO GET FIRST TEST

Warm Weather Aids Pelicans Prepare for Busy Spring Program

The season's first real test of strength for the Klamath Pelican track team will come Friday afternoon in a dual meet with Malin, Leslie Avril, head coach, announced from the high school Tuesday morning.

The event will be held on Modoc field.

Trials were scheduled to begin Tuesday afternoon. Avril said the two best men in each event would be entered in the competition against the Mustangs.

Four places will be counted on the tally sheet.

Warm weather for the last week has done much to put the Pelican athletes in condition for an active season.

Following the practice event with Malin Friday, the team will prepare for the annual Alturas event on Saturday, April 25.

The first major Oregon interscholastic competition of the year is scheduled for Grants Pass when the district meet will be run off on May 2.

The big Southern Oregon-Northern California event, sponsored by the 20-30 club of Klamath Falls, will take place on Modoc field, Saturday, May 9.

The following week, May 15-16, the athletes who qualified at Grants Pass will be sent to the annual state track tournament.

Spring football practice has progressed steadily. As things stand now, it is tentatively planned to run off a practice game between members of the squad at Modoc field on Saturday.

No baseball team has yet been organized and it is possible the high school will not enter a club in county competition this year.

Bill Celebron May Get Chance at Barney Ross

NEW YORK, April 14, (P)—Billy Celebron of Rockford, Ill., has earned a title shot at Barney Ross' welterweight coronet.

An upstart that ripped open an old eye cut last night gave Celebron a technical knockout victory over Cleon Locatelli, who was doing all right for himself until the blood began to flow. The blow that ultimately decided the issue was delivered in the eighth round and Referee Artie McGovern stopped the battle in the tenth. Celebron scaled 146 to 143½ for Locatelli.

Promoters in both New York and Chicago were eager to match the hard punching Illinois brawler with Ross. Celebron, who has knocked out half the men to face him, first attracted nationwide notice when he belted Harry Dubinsky out of the picture.

The road was a rocky one for Celebron during the early rounds, however. Locatelli is a busy battler who pumps both hands with speed and dexterity, even though he isn't a terrific hitter. Celebron lost five of the first six rounds as Locatelli, weaving in and out, plastered him with two-hand barrages.

Sammy Mandell, the old lightweight champion, who is manager of Celebron, sent his boxer out to shoot the works in the seventh round, and Celebron definitely took the upper hand. After his eye was cut, Locatelli kept wading in, but his aim was poor and missed often.

Part-time Jobs for Veterans

Aging Playing Pilots Protect Clubs With Understudies.

Seven of the eight major league playing managers are old pappy guys, as the lives of active combatants go. The records show Jimmy Dykes of the White Sox to be the daddy of them all at 39, although William Harold Terry of the Giants, who blushing admits being 37, probably is closer to 41. Frankie Frisch of the Cardinals is 37, Charley Grimm of the Cubs and Pie Traynor of the Pirates are 36; Jimmy Wilson of the Phillies is 35, and Gordon Stanley Cochran of the Tigers 33.

Joe Cronin of the Red Sox, who broke in as a boy boss in Washington, is 29.

Spring enthusiasm has all of the veterans talking of part-time jobs in 154 games or in enough to keep their clubs right up where they are supposed to be. Five of them are expected to be part-time workers before the grind is very old, however. These are Frisch, Terry, Traynor, Frisch and Dykes.

Playing pilots hang on as long as possible, and for reasons other than the welfare of their outfields. There is the highly important financial angle. All are paid for playing as well as directing. Bench managers seldom draw \$35,000, as does the very fortunate Joe McCarthy of the Yankees.

Terry, Traynor and Dykes went far out of their way to obtain satisfactory understudies this spring.

The Cardinals swapped Burge Whitehead to the Giants in order to obtain pitching help for the Deans in the person of Tarzan Parmelee. The result is that Bradenton, Ricketts and Co. now appear to be without anybody who can come close to filling Frisch's brogans at second base when pain returns to the backs of the erstwhile Fordham Flash's legs.

Terry gave Brooklyn \$25,000 for Sambo Leslie. Memphis Bill has had to put much more effort into his work the past several seasons. A trick knee has kept him out of training for a month, and he still limps.

Wilbur Brubaker is Pittsburgh's hope in the event that Traynor's throwing shoulder

tightens up again. Brubaker, a polished third baseman, hit .393 for Kansas City and fairly roared along at the plate during the tag end of the 1935 campaign.

Traynor got in only 57 engagements last term and was forced to limit himself to 119 the year before, so the chances are that Brubaker will have plenty of opportunity.

Dykes played 117 games in 1935, but realizes that he isn't what he was when he was helping Connie Mack to three consecutive flags in Philadelphia. Joe Morrissey, who is 31, and who has been around since he attended Holy Cross, is to spell Dykes. Morrissey fields well enough, and hit .273 for Toronto last trip.

Few can understand why Frisch benched 19-year-old Phil Cavaretta in favor of himself. Offhand, one would say that a youngster capable enough to play 146 games at first base and hit .275 in his first full season in the majors, ought to come on this time out.

One cannot help but suspect that Frisch is out to convince the Wringle organization that his value is not confined to writing down a batting order. The banjo-strumming strategist has been bothered by a bad back for two years, but came up as spry as Jesse Owens this spring.

Cochran and Wilson really are wonders at the most wearing position in baseball. Cochran still is the best catcher in the game, and Wilson must be included in the first five. Cochran has caught 1411 games in 11 years, or an average of 128 per season, yet remains the liveliest individual on the Detroit roster.

Miracle Mike has been ordered to wear glasses while reading, and the Tiger lair is worried, however.

It requires a tremendous amount of enthusiasm and an inexhaustible supply of energy to keep playing in the front line as long as Dykes, Terry, Frisch, Traynor, Grimm, Wilson and Cochran have remained there.

Average life of a big leaguer used to be six years, although the shortage of Grade A talent in recent years may have lengthened it somewhat. Compare that with Dykes' 18 years.

Dykes is the oldest big leaguer in point of continuous service. This personable and versatile infielder first made a go of it with the Philadelphia Athletics in 1919. With George Herman Ruth on the sidelines, the big show is without a 20-year man for the first time since it was old enough to sport one.

Dykes, Terry, Frisch, Traynor, Grimm, Wilson and Cochran will go like Ruth, and all the others.

WILSON HOLDS EDGE TONIGHT

Belcastro Determined to Whip Ex-Gridder in Main Event

Resenting the position of favorite awarded his opponent for tonight's main event wrestling match at the Klamath armory, Pete Belcastro, junior heavyweight champion of the coast, was more than ever determined to score a victory over George "Wildcat" Wilson.

The two met in what has every promise of turning out to be one of the best matches brought to Klamath Falls this season by Mack Lillard, promoter.

Wilson, with his smashing football type of offense, is one of the game's most spectacular performers. Never a defensive wrestler, the former University of Washington football star has blasted his way to the top rank of the heavyweight wrestling division through hard-hitting tactics.

He has thoroughly recovered from injuries received here several weeks ago when he lost to Dude Chick, the Wyoming cowboy. The wrestler hurt his back when he fell from the ring. The injury was sufficiently serious to prevent his continuing the match.

Belcastro will arrive tonight to protect his long string of armory victories. Unbeaten, since he returned from California, the champion expected to whip Wilson with drop kicks and body slams.

Prince Mihalakis of San Francisco and Frank Taylor, Ohio, will offer a strong supporting match to the main event. They meet in the semi-windup.

The opening match sees Frank Peck, San Francisco, and Dan Savich, Utah, facing each other on even terms.
