

BEAUTY SHOP ADVERTISING PLAN TABLED

Indefinite tabling proved the fate Monday night of the hotly discussed proposal that the city council prohibit the advertising of prices by beauty parlors.

It was the cosmetologists' association, itself, that proposed the withdrawal of the ordinance, which was up for final action Monday night. Following proposal of the ordinance last week, it came under heavy fire from a number of sources.

Councilmen Generally Opposed. A representative of the association said that because the plan had been "misunderstood" the group wanted it withdrawn until the misunderstanding could be ironed out. He suggested indefinite tabling, and that was what was done.

Indications were that this move prevented an outright defeat of the ordinance. Some councilmen indicated during the week in informal discussions that they would vote against it. The Advertising club filed with the council Monday night a previously publicized resolution opposing the scheme.

Hand Tax Argued. With that out of the way, the councilmen, with Council President John Keller in the chair in the absence of Mayor Mahoney, went into a long struggle over the resolution and ordinance calling for a vote of the people on a 4-10 of a mill tax levy for the city hand.

Keller and Van Camp both directed criticisms at the ordinance as drawn.

Van Camp said that the ordi-

nance doesn't say what the band shall do for the city in return for the financial support given it. Keller and Van Camp both pointed out that no minimum is set on the number of pieces in the band, and it would be possible for a band of three or four pieces to demand the money raised under the proposed tax levy.

Ordinance Amended. With Dr. L. J. Goble and Fred Glover, the councilmen worked out amendments to meet those objections, and City Attorney Carahan dictated them into the ordinance. Minimum size of the band was set at 20 pieces, and all money will be expended under the direction and control of the city council. The band will give 18 concerts a year.

There was some talk of setting a maximum of 30 pieces for the band, but this was dropped when it was pointed out that the 4-10 of a mill levy would raise more money as the city grows and a larger band might also be desirable then.

At the present assessed valuation, the levy will raise about \$3600, and a budget has been prepared on that basis. The ordinance will be up for a vote of the people May 15. It constitutes a charter amendment.

Other Measures Pass. The council also adopted ordinances and resolutions which provide for a popular vote on raising the treasurer's salary to \$1620 a year and raising the city park levy from 1/4 of a mill to 1 mill.

There was a discussion of the terms under which the city will receive payments on more than \$1100 in principal and interest on assessments of property owned by C. B. House. It was decided to hold a special meeting to talk the matter over with House.

Councilman Charles Thomas reported that property owners on Hillside will get together and map out the streets in that neighborhood that should be paved. The council will then make a tour of the streets and decide what to do about it.

Bond Information Asked. A letter was received from Walter, Woody and Heimerding, Cincinnati, stating that firm is interested in purchasing municipal bond issues and asking for information on the Bancroft issue of \$550,000 for Klamath Falls. The council instructed the proper officials to send the information.

Council President Keller announced the appointment of Otto Langset as acting police judge, during the absence of Police Judge Clifton Richmond.

Highlights of President's Address Monday Night

By The Associated Press. Highlights of President Roosevelt's address before the young democratic clubs of Maryland at Baltimore last night follow:

"Flaming youth has become a flaming question. And youth comes to us wanting to know what we propose to do about a society that hurts so many of them."

"Many older people seem to take unmerited pride in the mere fact that they are adults."

"You have a right to expect that those in authority will do everything within their power to help restore conditions that make employment and opportunity possible."

"Some councilors say 'confidence and normal prosperity will cure everything—give everybody jobs.' They generally mean by that the confidence and prosperity of 1928. But, my friends, 1928 was no millennium."

"The best that the captains of the country, and the captains of industry, could do for you before the depression was not good enough then and it is not good enough today."

"Some people tell you that even with a completely restored prosperity there will be a vast army of unemployed. I do not accept that. No man who is sensitive to human values dares to accept it."

"Our working population in-

creases every year. . . . work out for yourselves what would happen if all the boys and all the girls of 14 and 15 and 16 and 17 who are now working in industry, found it possible to stay in school until they were at least 18 years old. . . . In the same way ask yourselves how many jobs would be created if the great majority of people who are now over 65 . . . were in a position to retire in security."

"Industry can contribute in great measure to the increase of employment if industry as a whole will undertake reasonable reductions of hours of work per week, while, at the same time, they keep the average individual's pay envelope at least as large as it is today."

"The government must give and will give consideration to such subjects as the length of the working week, the stability of employment on an annual basis, and the payment of at least adequate minimum wages."

"We believe that steps . . . which we have taken and are taking will at least greatly cushion depressions—will prevent the apocryphal rushing to violent mad peak of false prosperity and prevent another violent, mad descent into another sink of suffering and disillusionment."

"I, for one, do not believe that the era of the pioneer is at an end. . . . the period of social pioneering is only at its beginning."

Beautiful Woman Stands Unclothed At Church Altar

Copyright, 1936, by United Press. LONDON, April 14. (U.P.)—A beautiful woman, 25, who yesterday stood nude before the altar of St. Paul's cathedral while 1900 worshippers stood stunned during evensong Monday told police she had intended to demonstrate to the world the true significance of Easter.

Despite extensive investigation it remains a mystery how the woman, whose name is being kept secret, managed to remove her clothing unseen by any in the congregation.

A cathedral official, describing her nude, naked supplication before the altar, said: "She murmured something about disarmament and war."

The cathedral verger, who said the nude supplicant has been identified as belonging to a respectable family of Portsmouth, whence she arrived Sunday, said her friends had told him she was most active in disseminating disarmament propaganda. Examining medical men ex-

pressed opinion that she suffered from religious mania. Police indicated that no action would be taken against the woman. She was held for some time at the Snowhill police station after walking to the altar of St. Paul's slipping a cloak-like coat from her shoulders and standing completely nude before the holy of holies.

Although no official statement was obtainable, it was understood he would be deported to the United States.

Tapia was director of the Mexican public beneficence until last December when he was removed from office following

Calles' sudden return from his five-months self-imposed exile.
