

Schools Send in Entry Blanks for Modoc Meet

PLANS SHAPED FOR BIG EVENT

Invitations to Annual 20-80 Meet Sent to Fifty Teams.

Progressing steadily since its inception here five years ago, the Southern Oregon-Northern California Track and Field meet on May 9 already shapes up as one of the biggest events of its kind scheduled for Klamath Falls.

The 20-80 club of Klamath Falls, the sponsoring organization, has sent bids to 50 high schools in both states. Replies have been encouraging, officials announced Wednesday.

Medford May Enter Schools which have filled out and returned entry blanks include Alturas, Klamath Falls, Merrill, Malin, Keno, Henley, Lakeview and Grants Pass.

Medford high school is expected to enter the event for the first time. In the past the Tigers have devoted their spring athletic program to baseball, but this season they have joined other schools in the state in offering a track squad.

Corvallis high, one of the strongest teams in the Willamette valley, is considering sending a delegation of athletes to Klamath Falls for the meet.

Albee Named Director Marvin A. Albee of the 20-80 club is the general chairman this season. He is working in conjunction with the high school to make the event a success. Arrangements probably will be made to invite collegiate stars to appear here for exhibition. The University of Oregon, it is believed, has a conference meet on May 9, but it is expected Oregon State athletes will be available.

WILDWOOD, N. J., April 15 (AP)—Ray Mangrum of Los Angeles held first prize money in the second annual Wildwood Golf club's open today but he had to work 10 extra holes to win it.

The Byron Welches are being congratulated upon the birth of a daughter, Esther Clarence. She was born at the T. P. Michael home in Hildebrand on April 2.

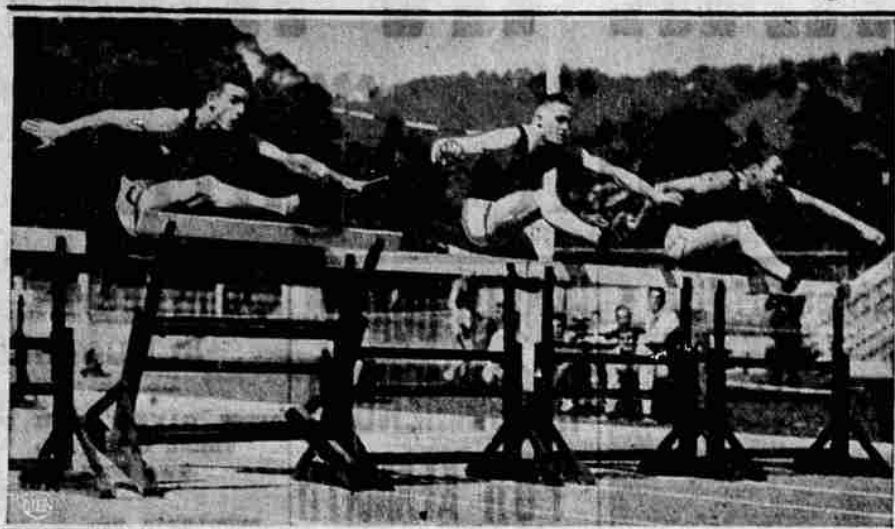

PORTLAND, Ore., April 15. (AP)—Carroll "Ky" Ebright, rowing coach at the University of California, had a bit of praise for Oregon State's crew prospects when he was interviewed here while en route to Seattle.

"They have good material at Corvallis and a mighty fine coach, Ed Stevens, who knows his business," Ebright commented. "We have met the Oregon Staters and I can say that you could get good crews there."

Rowing recently was inaugurated as a sport at Oregon State college. A shell was donated by the University of California, which also provided competition in a meet earlier this year.

Ebright also said he was glad the University of Portland was considering adopting rowing as a sport. "The more the merrier," he opined.

"How many races will you win at Seattle?" he was asked. He replied, "Probably none." Asked concerning the Olympic games, he said, "We've got a chance; not a big chance, though. California has won at two Olympics, but we can't keep it up forever."

Coach Ebright was accompanied by 40 boys, members and "spare parts" of three crews which will race the University of Washington Huskies at Seattle Saturday.

WILD LIFE TOUR STOPS AT BIEBER

BIEBER, Calif.—Seventy men and women, representative of Lassen, Modoc and eastern Shasta counties, attended a dinner session here Saturday night of the Wild Life tour conducted by the Natural Resources unit of the Shasta-Cascade Wonderland association.

The meeting was sponsored by the International Sportsmen's association, whose president, Peter Gerig of Bieber, acted as toastmaster. A resolution was adopted recommending that the Lassen county council of the Wonderland association take steps to organize public sentiment for the conservation of wild life in this area.

Importance of its fish and game resources to the welfare of northeastern California was stressed in a talk by Fred P. Cronmiller, chief of the wild life division of the United States forest service at San Francisco. Cronmiller said the demands of hunters and fishermen were crowding the supply. Trout were maintained in the streams only by constant plantings from the state hatcheries; ducks were scarce; and the mule deer herds were threatened by increased numbers of hunters, by weather hazards, and by continual shrinkings of the forested area because of lumbering operations.

Alfred Cookman, naturalist and lecturer for the civilian conservation corps, gave a talk on birds and displayed a flag of the Adventurers and Explorers club that he said was carried over the South Pole in Byrd's plane. Dr. Cookman divulged that he has a picture of a little sharpshinned hawk chasing a condor, that the Arctic tern flies a round trip yearly from pole to pole, and that the Alaskan sea parrot has a polka-dot chick that dives from its nest into the sea when four days old.

Other speakers were State Assemblyman Clinton J. Fulcher and Theodore F. Jimson, a CCC camp essay prize winner.

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BIG LEAGUERS OPEN SEASON

Thousands See Start of Baseball Tuesday Afternoon.

By The Associated Press The long trek down summer's baseball lane was under way today with the batmen marching triumphantly at the head of the procession.

The sun came down like a benediction Tuesday after, rainy April weather that had disrupted spring training schedules and the baseball faithful thronged eight major league ball parks to see America's national pastime ushered in with fanfare and the crash of numerous baseballs.

F. R. Throws Ball With President Roosevelt throwing out the first ball at Washington and Babe Ruth, the retired sultan of awat, sitting on the sidelines for the first time in many a year, some 205,000 fans, the largest aggregate crowd in five years, jammed into parks in the two major circuits.

The largest gathering was at the Polo Grounds in New York where 35,490 saw the Giants come from behind to defeat Brooklyn 5-5. Hal Schumacher, the pitcher who was supposed to have the Indian sign on the Dodgers, retired to the showers before his mates, riding on homers by Mel Ott and Dick Bartell, overcame the efforts of George Earnshaw, veteran Dodger hurler and went on to win in the late innings. Earnshaw batted out two hits and batted in one run, but he allowed a total of 17 clean hits.

Solons Beat Yanks The closest game of the day was played in Washington where the Senators routed out the New York Yankees, 1-0. Buck Newsom of the Senators and Lefty Gomez of the Yanks put on a scoreless pitching duel until the ninth inning when Cecil Travis singled and Carl Reynolds slapped out a two-bagger that decided the issue.

In Cleveland, Lynwood Rowe started the champion Detroit Tigers off on the right foot when he shut out the Cleveland Indians 3-0 before 18,200. He issued four hits, fanned six and passed none. Hank Greenberg drove in two runs in the first inning with a double and Al Simmons, new-comer to the Tiger line, drove in the third run with a double in the sixth.

Cubs Beat Cards Even Dizzy Dean had little to crow about. His fancy offerings were plastered for 14 hits in six innings as the Cubs defeated the Cards 12-7. The hurling Chicago ace, Lon Warlick, also had to duck at 13 hits rang off rival bats during his seven innings of service. Billy Herman, Cub second baseman who led the league with 57 doubles last year, banged out three to signalize this year's defense of that honor, besides getting a home run and a single.

There were new murmurings around Boston about the short-stopping of Joe Cronin of the ploughshare jaw, who booted two as his expensive Red Sox out-slugged the lowly Athletics to gain a 9-4 verdict. Connie Mack sent in four pitchers to stop the Sox assault but they were belted for 14 hits. Another ace flinger was maltreated here, Boston's Wes Ferrell being worked for 10 hits and six passes.

Sox 7, Browns 6 In Cincinnati it was Paul Deringer, No. 1 hurler for the Reds, who was treated rudely. The Pirates batted him from the box to the third inning and went on to win 8-5. Bud Hefey, nephew of the retired Chick, hammered out the first round-trip blow of the season in the first inning.

It was a battle of extra base hits in Chicago where the White Sox defeated the St. Louis Browns 7-6. Johnny Whitehead and Ivy Andrews were forced to abdicate the hill in this game as the Browns collected nine hits and the White Sox three more.

The Phils took the first of what was expected to be a long series of falls out of the Boston Bees 4-1, as Curt Davis limited the Bostonians to four safe blows. The Phils made all of their runs off Danny MacFayden in the third.

Although there was a total of 164 hits, of which 12 were homers, in the eight games.

WILSON LOSES TO BELCASTRO

Ex-Gridder Gives Pete Licking After Match Comes to End.

Pete Belcastro won an official victory in the main event wrestling match at the Klamath armory last night but came off a poor second in an unscheduled anti-climax with hard-hitting George Wilson, one of the all-time greats of American football.

Wilson, provoked to a rage when he caught a right hook on the chin and lost the deciding fall, gave the junior heavyweight champion of the Pacific coast a thorough trouncing after the match had come to an official close.

Wilson Charges Belcastro Belcastro had donned his dressing robe and was about to leave the ring when the former all-American football player from the University of Washington charged him. Wilson pulled his opponent to the mat and pounded his face with both fists. Belcastro was nearly knocked out by the time Referee Danny Savich could pull them apart.

Recovering from a flying tackle, Belcastro snatched two sharp drop kicks squarely in Wilson's face to win the first fall. It was gained in 12 minutes and 59 seconds of wrestling.

Wilson evened the match with a flying tackle in eight minutes and eight seconds. He gave Belcastro three Sonnenberg butts and then crashed him to the floor with the tackle.

Pete Uses Fist Wilson was all set to take the third fall when he rushed out and hurled Belcastro across the ring with another tackle. As Belcastro got up from the floor he planted a right hand punch on Wilson's jaw. This, followed by another kick, put the gridder down in 26 seconds.

Shortly after Wilson had regained his senses, he attacked Belcastro and settled the dispute to his own satisfaction even though he had to leave the ring credited with a defeat.

Prince Mihailakis, San Francisco Arab, wrestled an outstanding match to defeat Frank Taylor, Ohio, in the semi-windup. Taylor, who turned ruffian for the evening, won the opening fall in the second round with a figure-four scissor. The prince took a fall in the third with a camel lock and another in the fourth with a body press after he avoided one of Taylor's flying scissor holds.

Arab's Best Match The Arab was forced to defend himself constantly against Taylor's foul tactics. At one time he managed to curl Taylor's legs around the ropes in a corner and then directed drop kicks at his opponent's unprotected stomach.

The prince has not yet been beaten in Klamath Falls. The match against Taylor revealed him as an aggressive grappler who can be rough if necessary.

Frankie Peck of San Francisco was stopped by Dan Savich, Utah, in the opener. Savich got the advantage in the second round with a toe hold. Peck won in the third with a reverse headlock and body press. The deciding fall came in the fourth when Savich put on another toe hold.

Wilson refereed the opening match in the absence of Ray Friable and Savich worked the next two.
