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him. His headquarters called the result in the state "a moral victory."

The extent of the write in movement for Landon on the Nebraska ballots pleased his followers.

The administration paid special attention to the way votes for the president on the democratic tickets in both states far exceeded the republican counts. Indications were he would get over 450,000 more than Knox and Borah together in Illinois.

Winners of the Roosevelt organization for a preferential primary in Georgia were met to an extent by state committees headed by the anti-New Deal Governor Talmadge. It will be held June 3, with each candidate having to pay a \$10,000 entry fee. If only one qualifies, the primary will be called off and he will have the right to name the delegation to Philadelphia.

Many contradictions seen. Speculation at the capitol dealt with what yesterday's results meant for the republican pre-convention situation in general.

So many contradictory claims of support are being made that there may be no telling who stands just where until balloting actually begins at Cleveland.

"Uninstructed" delegates are well in the lead of those chosen to date. Among these delegations some have said they favored one or another of the potential nominees.

Friends of Governor Landon of Kansas, look upon delegates definitely for him in his own and some neighboring states as the nucleus of the position he now holds. These are: Kansas 18, Kentucky 18, Missouri 22, New Mexico 6, Oklahoma 21, Virginia 7.

First Two-Man Test

In addition, and despite the Borah showing in the preference primary, Landon leaders look to Nebraska for support.

The only Borah delegates thus far are 21 of the 24 from Wisconsin.

G. O. P. leaders were interested particularly in the results of the Knox-Borah struggle, first two-man primary test in the current campaign.

Returns from 4,437 of Illinois' 7,426 precincts, gave Knox 281,022 votes against 204,859 for Borah.

Politicians also compared the republican and the democratic totals. Indications on the basis of incomplete returns were that democrats in their primary had out-voted the republicans two to one throughout the state. It appeared a record vote for them.

Democrats here viewed this fact with optimism. The republicans declared the bitter struggle for the gubernatorial nomination caused many republicans to pile into the primary fight along with the democrats.

Gov. Henry Horner early today caught up with and passed Dr. Herman N. Bundesen for the democratic gubernatorial nomination. Horner, with 5,063 precincts reporting, had 529,043 votes to Bundesen's 517,472.

Totals for President Roosevelt, uncontested in the primary, showed:

In 1,450 Cook county (Chicago) precincts, 334,726 votes; compared with 361,982 for Bundesen and Horner, and 115,027 for both Borah and Knox.

In the Nebraska primaries, Roosevelt's vote in 1,264 out of 2,025 precincts was 79,354. Borah had 41,717. Landon had 9,147 write-in votes.
