

LOCAL BUILDERS TO SEE PICTURE

The immediate future of the building industry and the part local architects, builders and contractors can play in it is the subject of a new talking picture which will be shown to local members of the trade at 8:00 o'clock Friday evening at the Hotel Elk display room.

This film, produced by the Johns Manville corporation to portray graphically the possibility for those connected with the building industry to play a major part in the reviving of new home construction, is being shown here under the auspices of the Big Basin Lumber company and Swan Lake Moulding company.

Woven into the story plot of the picture, which is full of action and human interest, and whose characters are ably played by a cast including Broadway and Hollywood stars, is the story of how a model home can be utilized to sell the services of the architect, the builders and the contractors to the public through showing just how a comfortable home, "triple insulated" against weather, fire and wear, can be built even on the most modest budget.

The Federal Housing administration single-mortgage plan of financing new construction is also taken up in detail in this talkie, both in its application to builders and to prospective home-owners.

News of Oregon

BONNEVILLE, Ore., April 16 (AP)—The Bonneville dam sea-locks, which some day will accommodate huge ocean ships on a 66-foot lift, hoisted four boats four feet high here to initiate one portion of the \$42,000,000 power and navigation project. Government engineers watched the proceedings of the pioneer voyage.

Only a slight rise was necessary since spillway gates are still open. The locks are recognized as one of the largest single-lift type in existence. They are 76 feet wide and 600 feet long. The locks now offer the only ship route on the Columbia river past the dam site.

PORTLAND, Ore., April 16 (AP)—Potential CCC recruits received an extension of time in which to enroll for the six-month summer period.

C. J. Buck, regional forester, extended the deadline until midnight, April 25. The rolls were scheduled to close last night but nearly 100 vacancies remained.

Buck said it appeared Oregon would have 30 camps and Washington 25 under the forest service this summer.

Enrollees must be single youths between 17 and 28 years of age, and must represent families receiving some form of public assistance.

EUGENE, Ore., April 16 (AP)—Governor Charles Martin told a luncheon group here that a substantial portion of the \$141,000,000 spent each year outside the United States for tax products will come to Oregon as the in-

dustry is developed in the state. The talk preceded ground-breaking ceremonies at Springfield for a new retting and scutching plant, financed by the PWA and popular subscription.

PORTLAND, Ore., April 16 (AP)—Father Joseph J. Boyle, president of the University of Portland, entrained last night for South Bend, Ind., to recuperate from a serious illness. He formerly was at Notre Dame university.

Michael J. Early, vice president of the Portland school, and two special nurses accompanied him east.

CARLTON, Ore., April 16 (AP)—Neil E. Sundquist, 31, of Seaside, died in a logging train accident near here. He was brakeman on the Carlton-Coast line.

Sundquist was crushed by logs when a car was derailed. Funeral services were to be held at Seaside today. The widow and a son, Rodney, survive.

ASTORIA, Ore., April 16 (AP)—Astoria port and chamber of commerce officials formed a joint committee today to seek a federal project for improvement of jetties at the Columbia river mouth.

The United States division army engineers recently opposed repairing the outer 3,000 feet of the south jetty and said the rebuilding of the north jetty probably will be deferred.

The Astoria committee will solicit support of Portland groups.

PORTLAND, Ore., April 16 (AP)—A circuit court suit seeking \$22,500 damages blamed the slip-stream, or propeller-wash, of an airplane for the mishap which resulted in Ray Schanah's plane falling into the Willamette river here Oct. 5, 1935.

Schanahs represented that a passenger plane took off from the airport at a time not previously designated and while he was flying in a pylon race at an air show. He claimed negligence. United Air Lines and the Pacific Transport company were named defendants.

PORTLAND, Ore., April 16 (AP)—Municipal Judge Julius Cohn asked "Sprechen sie Deutsch?" The answer was "Ja." The judge said "fumpf tag." And thus Emil Brocher was fined \$5 for being intoxicated.

THE DALLES, Ore., April 16 (AP)—Word from Celilo Falls indicated the spring run of salmon has started in the Columbia river. Four large fish were reported taken.

GROWERS EXPECT BIG WHEAT CROP

THE DALLES, April 16. (AP)—Although ranchers in the northern end of Gilliam county and in sections of Sherman and Wasco counties lost heavily from winds which carried away newly sown wheat and topsoil in the past two weeks, wheat growers of Wheeler county expect a record crop.

Fields of Gilliam county not harmed by the winds are in fine condition and a good yield is expected, growers said.

Some ranchers who lands were in the path of the winds escaped the full effect of the gales by scoring their fields, thus saving much topsoil.

Wheeler county ranchers said that the cold wave, which caused a considerable loss of lambs, brought some benefit in providing range conditions which will be the best in years.

LOSSES OCCUR ON WHEAT MARKETS

CHICAGO, April 16. (AP)—Losses of 1 1/2 cents a bushel in wheat values resulted late today from unsettled weather conditions over domestic drought regions southwest and west.

The volume of wheat trade was fairly large. Much of it was in the nature of spreading operations in which May wheat was brought against selling of July.

Wheat closed nervous at the same as yesterday's finish to 1 1/2 cents lower, May 97 3/4-98, July 89 1/4-90, corn 1/2 off to 1/4 up, May 61-61 1/2, oats 1/4-1/2 down, and provisions unchanged to 7 cents decline.

Stock Market Quotations

NEW YORK, April 16. (AP)—After considerable dull irregularity in most of today's stock market session, the list turned downward in the final hour.

While a few scattered specialties were able to hold portions of their early gains, declines of fractions to around two points predominated. The close was somewhat heavy. Transfers were around 1,350,000 shares.

In the morning a number of issues responded to favorable company profit statements with substantial advances, but recent leaders were backward throughout. Those that did not slip a bit were unable to better their Wednesday's closing quotations.

Some trading discouragement was seen in apathetic movement of the rails. Even the motors, steels and utilities lacked vitality on sporadic rallying attempts.

Among the better share per-

formers were Indian refining, Johns Manville, American Chain, Standard Oil of Indiana and New Jersey, Kennecott, Youngstown Sheet and Tube and Philip Morris.
