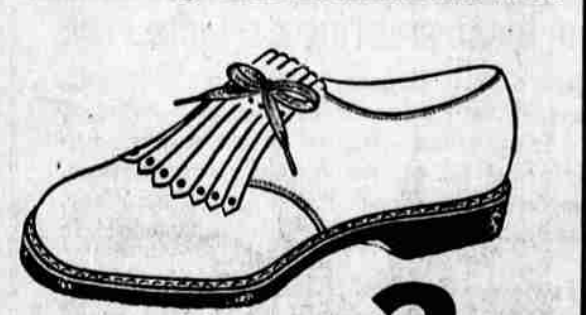

MOE'S STORE TO OBSERVE 20TH YEAR

Just 20 years ago, on Saturday, the Women's Store was opened in Klamath Falls by Henry N. Moe.

The store has always been located on its present site, but has undergone a steady growth and expansion since its organization.

Moe owned and operated the Women's Store alone from the time he came to Klamath Falls in 1916, until January 1, 1936, when Earl R. Isaac, formerly of Ashland and Medford, became a partner in the enterprise.

Moe and Isaac plan greater expansion in the future, and expect to construct a beautiful new basement store with a wide staircase leading from the front of the building down to the basement where several new departments will be located. Other plans for growth are also being contemplated by the owners of this popular store.

The 20th anniversary of the Women's Store will be celebrated on Saturday, April 18, and on that afternoon each woman who visits the establishment will be presented with a flower.

On Friday, Moe and Isaac will be hosts to the store personnel at a birthday dinner to be served at the Willard hotel. There will be 20 guests at the event.

H. N. Moe was born on a farm in Wisconsin, and entered the dry goods business as an apprentice boy at the age of 15.

After completing his term in retailing, he advanced to a responsible position with Marshall Field and Company, wholesalers, in Chicago.

He came to Oregon in 1910 to enter the retail business again, settling in Medford, and spending five years in business there.

He was well satisfied until he and his family made a trip to Klamath Falls, and upon realizing the vast resources of the Klamath country he decided to open a retail store here.

In the spring of 1916 Moe moved to Klamath Falls, and started in a small way in his present location.

In 1927 he purchased the building which houses his store, and the establishment has continually forged ahead.

The policy of the Women's Store is always to maintain a high grade of merchandise, and to keep all lines offered of the best quality. Every item must give satisfaction or money is refunded in every department.

Isaac, who recently entered into partnership in the Women's Store, has been connected with dry goods retail trade ever since he was a young man. He came to Oregon in 1911, and located in Medford, where he was employed by Mann's department store for 10 years.

He later moved to Ashland where he entered business for himself, operating a dry goods and women's furnishing store for 14 years in that city.

He sold his store in the spring of 1935, and after an extended vacation, decided to return to the dry goods business. He came to Klamath Falls on October 14, 1935, and became associated with Moe's Women's Store at that time.

Both Mr. and Mrs. Isaac are enthusiastic over the future of Klamath Falls, and have purchased an attractive home on Portland avenue.

The 20th anniversary of Moe's Women's Store will be marked by special attractions in all departments, and discriminating women are invited to visit the store and participate in the observance of the anniversary.

Condition of Oregon Sheep, Cattle Improved

PORTLAND, Ore., April 16. (AP)—Ranges, sheep and cattle all are in slightly better condition in Oregon this spring than during April of last year, the bureau of agricultural economics reported today.

Hay in the Willamette valley was generally ample and new grass had a good start. Cattle and sheep wintered well and losses to offsprings were light.

Ranges were bad and the lamb crop short in many parts of the mid-Columbia area, but new grass was coming fast, the report showed.

In Baker county the range was late, but prospects better than for several years because of the abundant moisture. Calf and lamb crops were above average. One sheepman lambed 160 per cent, getting 1630 lambs from 1100 ewes.

The cold spell hit Umatilla county hard, leaving cattle and sheep in poor condition and decimating the calf and lamb crops. Most of the hay supplies were depleted.

New grass was just starting in Union county, where hay and feed supplies carried stock through the cold period in good shape. Summer water prospects were the best for three years.

In Walla Walla county the winter was hard on early lambed ewes and the crop. Cattle wintered much better than sheep.

Cool county hay supplies ran short, necessitating shipments from other sections of the state and resulting in the sale of a number of dairy cows to California buyers. Curry county losses were light.

Douglas county grass was probably the best for several years. Cattle, calf and ewe losses were light, and the lamb crop fair. Hay and feed supplies were ample. Wool contractors offered 30-32c. Stockmen felt optimistic and some were holding for higher prices.

Soil moisture was plentiful in Jackson county, but more rains were needed to keep the grass growing fast. Both cattle and sheep crops were good. Hay was short in the Wolf creek area of Josephine county, but ranges in good condition.

Stock wintered well in southeastern Oregon, and range grass is coming fast now, except in Grant and Malheur counties.
