4-H CLUB BEEVES
NEAR SHOW STYLE

MERRILL, April 16.—Well-fed, well-groomed baby beefs, owned by Klamath county 4-H club members are making rapid progress toward show style for the annual junior fair to be held in Klamath Falls next fall.

Owners are being instructed in showmanship and prizes of show hatters are to be awarded the boys who exhibit the best showmanship. Prize winning calves exhibited at the fall fair are expected to be sent to Portland for the International Livestock exposition and the remainder are to be sold locally at auction.

Between 50 and 60 head of young stock were purchased last fall and an equal number of month-old calves are to be purchased by club members in the near future to be prepared for the baby beef show and junior stock exhibit to be held next April 5-9, inclusive. These young calves are to be placed on nurse cows until old enough for hay and grain rations.

Club leaders plan to make an inspection tour early in May. Presentation of movable stock scales, mounted on a trailer to be used for club work in the local loan district, was made recently by the Klamath Livestock association. Price of the scales was \$250, and a close check is kept on weight of the competing animals.

LOANS INCREASED UNDER FHA ACT

During March the First National bank and the American National bank of Klamath Falls increased the loans they made under Title I of the federal housing act more than 33 1-3 per cent. Officials of the banks stated that they had made a substantial amount of loans for construction purposes which could also have been insured under the act.

This substantial increase in the amount of building underway in Klamath Falls is very gratifying to the Klamath County Better Housing committee and shows the work it has been doing is bearing fruit.

There has been approximately \$275,000 worth of federal housing administration Title I loans made in Klamath county to April 1, and approximately \$100,000 loans or more of loans which could have been insured under Title I. These totals constitute in proportion of the building expenditures in Klamath county and have resulted in making the Klamath county relief rolls one of the lightest in the county in proportion to what it might have been. The absorption of the unemployment due to construction work is the most promising sign of the return of prosperity.

Title I of the housing act has now been extended to April 1, 1937, with several changes. The first change is the elimination of new construction on unimproved real property from consideration under the modernization credit plan and the exclusion of loans to tenants except those who are leasees with leases running six months beyond maturity of the loan.

The second change is the exclusion of loans in the amount of \$2,000 or less for the purchase and installation of equipment or machinery upon any type of improved real property. In line with this will be plumbing and wiring systems, furnaces, oil burners, water heaters, etc., will also be eligible. Movable equipment such as refrigerators, ranges and washing machines, ironers, etc., are not eligible, except that on loans from \$2,000 to \$50,000 on Class A property. It is not a requirement that the machinery or equipment becomes an addition to the property.

Another change is that the insurance against loss to the lending agencies is reduced from 20 per cent to 10 per cent of the total amount of the loans made and that any credit built up prior to April 1, 1936, cannot be accepted for loans made after that date. However, as losses to date are less than three-tenths of one per cent of the total volume loans insured and unpaid balances on delinquencies of 30 days or more are running slightly over 2 per cent of the total loans outstanding. The 10 per cent insurance

coverage should be adequate to cover any loss which a financial institution with a normal volume of loans should sustain.
