

ROAD LEGISLATION NEARING PASSAGE

WASHINGTON, April 17. (AP)—A \$440,000,000 road building measure, including provisions for farm-to-market lanes and grade crossing elimination, was halfway along its legislative course today and awaited senate action.

The program was approved by the house yesterday without opposition. The bill would extend the Hayden-Carwright act for 1936 and 1937 and authorize amounts the federal government may spend for two fiscal years ending June 30, 1939.

New features are authorization for the expenditure of \$25,000,000 each year for farm-to-market roads and \$50,000,000 each year for the grade crossing work. States must match the farm roads expenditures.

Others spending authorized under the measure for each of the two years: regular federal aid highways, to be matched by states, \$125,000,000; for rural trails, \$10,000,000; public lands roads, \$2,500,000; national parks and monuments roads, \$7,500,000.

The only debate was over additional funds asked by Representative White (D-Idaho) for park roads, and the contention of Representative McClellan (D-Ark.) that financially distressed states be granted highway money without matching it. White asked \$15,000,000 a year for the forest roads.

Representative Whittington (D-Miss.) said adoption of the McClellan proposal would mean discrimination against the other states, and said the party had been generously dealt with.

Whittington praised the earmarking of funds for the farm roads and grade crossing elimination.

MOVE UNDERWAY TO PRESERVE TIMBER

MEDFORD, Ore., April 17. (AP)—Tentative arrangements have been made between the United States forest service and the Rogue River timber company for preservation of the natural scenic beauty along the Crater Lake highway in the Prospect district where logging operations have been a threat for years. It was announced today by Forest Supervisor Karl L. Janouch.

Pending completion of the present negotiations the timber company has agreed to cancel all cutting arrangements and to hold in abeyance a reputed sale of timber to Lewis brothers, sawmill operators.

An appraisal of the company's holdings along the Crater Lake highway will be made, Supervisor Janouch said. This work will start next Monday. Two expert appraisers will be assigned from the Portland regional forestry office. They will be assisted by two forest rangers. The work will take a month.

The aim of the negotiations is to reach an equitable agreement as a basis for an exchange of timber to the timber company in forest reserves lying east of the Cascades.

The area involved lies between Prospect and the national forest southern boundary line.

It is understood that the present plans were evolved in Washington, D. C., between E. W. Moser, manager for the timber concern, and the forest service officials.

AL SMITH'S NAME HEARD AT INQUIRY

WASHINGTON, April 17. (AP)—A statement that Alfred E. Smith made his "take a walk" speech to clear the American Liberty League of "financial taint" was introduced today before the senate lobby committee.

Chairman Black (D-Ala.) read a memorandum by a worker for the Sentinels of the Republic, C. A. Berry, respecting a conversation Berry had with Thomas L. Chabourne, New York lawyer. The memorandum said:

"In passing it might be noted that Al Smith refused one invitation to speak to the league at Mr. Chabourne's insistence, but accepted the second invitation with the comment that the league needed him to help clear it of its financial taint and that he felt he was sufficiently known by the country to be able to use any board to spring back into the public eye."

Kurt Grunwald, Russian-born American who defiantly refused to answer senate lobby committee questions, was excused from testifying without any action against him.

DEJONGE SEEKING HIGH COURT PLEA

SALEM, April 17. (AP)—Attorneys for Dirk De Jonge, serving a seven-year sentence in the state penitentiary for violation of the Oregon criminal syndicalism law, filed a petition today, asking authority of the supreme court to appeal the case to the supreme

court of the United States.

The state high court recently upheld the conviction of De Jonge by the Multnomah circuit court, and refused a rehearing of the case. Assignment of errors was cited as the reason for the request.

The state court's permission must be granted before the appeal can be taken to Washington. Arthur Benson, clerk of the court, said.
