

BIG PORTLAND PENSION CLUB QUILTS GROUP

PORTLAND, April 17, (AP)—Withdrawal of a Townsend club of 1,100 members and demands for a "cleansing process" of the state pension group presented new difficulties today to John H. Weir, Townsend trouble-shooter.

Mr. K. Winton, president of Portland club No. 7, returned the unit's charter to State Manager James Logan, with the statement "we shall go on as loyal Townsend workers and trust the O. A. R. P. Ltd. national headquarters, will see fit to cleanse the state headquarters of its self-seekers, who are wrecking the movement."

Winton also said "we positively refuse to recognize the leadership and policies of the present state leaders."

State Manager Logan earlier this week cited officials of Club No. 7 to explain why orders to bar Luther Eggertsen, a Townsend speaker, were ignored. A substitute sent by Logan to a club meeting was denied the floor.

Officials of the club declined to attend a scheduled meeting with state leaders. Winton, in his letter to Logan, expressed the hope "we will be again invited to join when the cleansing process is finished."

Logan replaced Charles Hansen as state manager a month ago. Since that time, he has received over endorsement of candidates, club speakers, leadership and campaign funds led regional headquarters to send Weir from Los Angeles to straighten out the difficulties.

Weir termed the controversies due to "unavoidable confusion."

UNIVERSITY ALUMS TO AID LIBRARY

Alumni of the University of Oregon are planning on furnishing the Browning room at the new library now under construction at Eugene, according to announcement of Karl W. Onthank, dean of personnel administration.

Since no part of the \$148,000 PWA appropriation can be used to furnish the building, and no state funds are available for the Browning room, alumni of the university have undertaken the job themselves.

The room, situated on the main floor, will be supplied with a notice "Studying Forbidden. This Room is Set Apart for Reading for 'Pleasure' Only." Fireplaces, easy chairs and convenient bookshelves will be featured.

A list of needed items of furniture has been prepared, with estimated costs, and former students will donate actual furnishings or make donations to be applied on their purchase.

It has been suggested that a substantial gift of some kind be made by University alumni now living in Klamath county. To this end, Myron Shannon, at the First National bank, has agreed to accept all donations, no matter how small, and keep them under account until enough money has been contributed to purchase some needed article that will add to the comfort or convenience of students engaged in non-regulated reading.

Donations can be mailed to Shannon or taken to him directly at the First National bank in Klamath Falls.

Senate Considers Contempt Action Against Witness

WASHINGTON, April 17, (AP) Senate lobby committee Thursday considered contempt proceedings against Kurt Grunwald, Russian-born co-founder of the Anti-New Deal Farmers' Independence Council, for his refusal to answer a question on the ground that certain persons "might get into trouble."

The question related to his activities in organization work for the council in South Dakota—work he undertook "because I wanted to get some 'he-men' to go out and fight the AAA."

"Give us the names of some people you saw in South Dakota," said Chairman Hugo L. Black, democrat, Alabama.

Grunwald, crossing his arms on his chest and sticking out his chin, replied:

"I refuse to answer."

Black's eyebrows arched in surprise. He reiterated the question to make sure the witness knew what he was doing, but Grunwald was adamant.

Black then told the witness he was excused until 10 a. m. tomorrow. With mock politeness, Grunwald stood at attention, saluted the committee, and bowed stiffly.

Black called a secret session to decide whether to cite Grunwald for contempt of the senate—an offense that once put Harry Sinclair, one of the country's richest men in jail.

National Guard Man Given Transfer

SALEM, April 17, (AP)—Major Louis D. Farnsworth, United States army instructor with the Oregon national guard the past five years, has been ordered to troop duty with the 62nd coast artillery at Fort Totten, New York. He will leave the first of May.

Major Kenneth Roundtree, en route from the Hawaiian Islands, will succeed Farnsworth here.

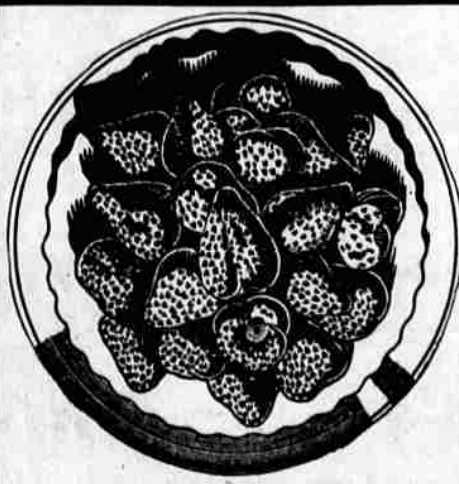
