

Lefty Grove Stops Yankees with Two Hits

RED SOX WIN IN WALK, 8-0

Southpaw Star Shows Old Power In Shutout Victory

By Associated Press. Bob (Lefty) Grove, the port-side flinger of the Red Sox, won't say how many games he expects to win this year, but the experts have boosted their figures a bit after watching him in his debut.

On a chilly, sunless day, the kind on which pitchers are not supposed to be at their best, Grove ruined the New York opening of the Yankees, by shutting them out 8-0, allowing only two hits.

Gehrig Hits Two. "I'll tell you in September," says Grove, when asked how many games he will win, but if his start is any indication, he should surpass his record of last year. He won 26, and led the American league in effectiveness with an earned run average of 2.70.

Grove's two-hitter was matched by Jimmy DeShong of the Washington Senators, pitching to the comparatively feeble Athletics, who were defeated 3-2. One of the hits was a homer by Pinky Higgins.

Several Players Out. Whereas a total of 205,000 fans turned out for the sunny opening of the season Tuesday, only 13,354 were on deck Friday, with the temperature dipping to low levels. The Cards-Pirates game was postponed because of the cold.

Two managers were on the sidelines with injured thumbs, and Bull Jurgens, Cub shortstop, was forced to retire after injuring that member. Joe Cronin of the Red Sox, who says he will stay on the bench if he has a new field combination, proved effective, watched his team play, in multi, his broken thumb encased in splints, while Mickey Cochrane, the driving pilot of the Tigers, also was confined to the dugout with a thumb injury by a foul tip Wednesday. Bill Terry, Giants manager, stepped to the plate as a pinch hitter, sore knee and all, and delivered a double that gave his team a 4-4 triumph over the Boston Bees.

Sox Humble Tigers. Cochrane saw his champions humbled 5-3 by the White Sox, with the largest crowd of the day, 32,175, in the home park. With Jimmy Whitehead pitching seven-hit ball, the White Sox turned on a rally in the seventh inning that netted three runs and resulted in Eldon Auker taking an early shower. It was a case of history repeating itself here, for the Sox beat the Tigers in their opener last spring.

The Cubs were given a bad drubbing by the Cincinnati Reds, 12-3. Paul Derringer, ace pitcher of the Reds, held Chicago to seven hits, while his mates, paced by two former Cubs, Kiki Cuyler and Babe Herman, pounded three pitchers for 11 of their 12 hits.

The Cleveland Indians turned on Mike Meola in the tenth to score three runs and hand the St. Louis Browns their third straight defeat, 18-10. The hefty Babe Phelps enabled the Brooklyn Dodgers to win their first game of the season, 4-3. With the bases loaded in the tenth, Phelps came through with the blow that beat the Phillies.

Staters Capture Game With Normal. CORVALLIS, April 18, (AP)—Oregon State's baseball nine won its first victory of the season Friday, defeating Oregon Normal 10 to 6, although out hit by the Monmouth team and making more errors.

Normal took a two-run lead in the first, but the Beavers scored seven runs before the Teachers could shove over three more in the fifth.

NORTHAMPTON, Mass., April 18, (UP)—Two brothers and a sister, from 6 to 9 years old, were sentenced to Hampden county training school Friday on delinquency charges growing out of their refusal to salute the American flag in school on religious grounds.

The sentences, imposed at a private hearing by Judge John W. Mason of Hampshire county district court's juvenile division, were appealed by Attorney O. R. Moyle of Brooklyn, N. Y., representing the children and their father, Ignace Opelouski, Belchertown farmer. The children are students at the Belchertown grammar school. Their first names were withheld.

Mickey Takes to Spectacles

Tiger Boss Dons Glasses for Reading But Not For Catching.

Gordon Stanley Cochrane, the vice president of the Detroit Tigers, wears glasses while in his life, but Mickey Cochrane, the backstop, does not yet require cheaters.

Vice President Cochrane insists that Catcher Cochrane still sees well enough to catch and help but his Detroit Tigers to their third consecutive American league championship.

"It's the left eye," explains Catcher Cochrane, trying to point out a little white spot. "It's nothing serious. I'm a cinch to be in 100 or more games."

Right now Catcher Cochrane is more concerned about regaining his strength following an attack of influenza than about the brightness of his bulb. The top Tiger has appeared to be a bit under weight all spring.

Catcher Cochrane's eye trouble amounts to a strain—the accumulation of 13 years of wear and tear in the glare and grime of baseball battlefields.

A white foreign coating grew over the eyes of Cy Perkins, coach of the Tigers, during the flag-day of his career with the Philadelphia Athletics. The severe strain of catching day in and day out also was the cause in his case. However, specialists in form Cochrane that his ailment isn't anywhere near as serious as the one which forced Perkins to undergo an operation.

Eleven of Cochrane's 13 years have been spent in the American league, for the fiery Scotch-Irishman established himself as the daddy of receivers in his inaugural campaign with the Athletics. So indispensable have been his services that Cochrane has caught 1411 games over that stretch of time.

Cochrane's loss or the diminishing of his ability to any considerable extent would be an irreparable blow to the Tigers. Regardless of bailing, the Boston University product is the most valuable man in the game.

Cochrane, now 33, is not only the executive head of the Detroit club, but he is a peerless leader on the field. The man from Bridgewater, Mass., calls every pitch and is a master at running pitchers. His judgment is rare and his strategic moves since assuming command of the Tigers two years ago repeatedly have upset the opposition. He has a grand American league batting average of .325, and retains a bulky share of his old speed.

A majority of veteran baseball men consider Cochrane the greatest catcher of all time. Tyrus Raymond Cobb was one of the few outstanding stars who hustled down through the years as hard as the Detroit director.

Cochrane's handling of Robert Moses Grove, George Earnshaw, and Duke Walberg during his years in Philadelphia was a remarkable job of catching. Each of these standouts was a different type. The secret of the tremendous success of all three was pitching low. All three threw quick-breaking curves into the dirt.

Grove threw with a straight over-arm motion, with his fast ball hopping upward as it neared the plate.

Earnshaw tossed a heavy sinker. The Swarthmore man couldn't curb his windup. He took such a big pivot that Cochrane found it tough to throw out a base-stealer even though the large right-hander did not go through his en-

gineering motion. It was this Earnshaw who pitched the Pepper Martin of the Cardinals ran his wildest in the 1931 world series.

Walberg threw his curve into the dirt and frequently was wild.

No catcher was ever more courageous at blocking runners at the plate than Cochrane. No catcher in the modern game could take throws that were off line and dive and tag a runner quite as well as Miracle Mike.

Asked to name the finest pitcher he ever caught, Cochrane parries with, "Well, I got a couple of pretty fair ones on this Detroit club."

Cochrane refers to School-boy Rowe and Tommy Bridges, of course, but goes into ecstasies describing the Grove of 1930-31 and the Earnshaw of 1929-30-31 and the tone of his conversation reveals his pick. It is Grove. There is no mistake about that.

"But when it comes to curving that ball in the clinches, little Tommy Bridges doesn't have to take off his hat to anybody," beams Miracle Mike. "He certainly rolled five or six of them right off the table after Stanley Hack tripped in the ninth in that world series payoff last fall."
