D. A. R. Officers of the State to Take Part in National Meet.

The national theme of the 45th Continental Congress of the D. A. R., to be held in Washington, D. C., April 20 to 24, inclusive, will be Citizenship. Miss Geraldine May, a student member of Lucinda Cox Brown chapter, at the University of Oregon, and personal page for Mrs. John Y. Richardson, cabinet member, is scheduled to take a prominent place on the program. On Monday afternoon she and a boy student from University of Minnesota, who is a member of the Practical Pacific Club of the University, will be the featured young speakers. Miss May's subject will be a "Co-ed's Idea of National Defense;" and on Wednesday afternoon she will deliver an address on "The Right Education of Youth."

A reception will be held Sunday evening at the Smithsonian Institution, preceding the opening of Congress, for the officials of the D. A. R., at which Mrs. Richardson, as reporter general, will receive with the secretary of the institution.
