RIISING RIVER FLOODS ROAD IN BLY AREA

Water running over the Bly-Campbell ranch road about a mile east of Bly stopped all traffic Friday and threatened a log shortage at the Crane mill at Bly.

County Engineer Frank Howard, after looking the situation over with County Commissioners Chase and Taber, said that a temporary bridge will be thrown across the gap in the road immediately.

Work Starts Today
A crew of men will be sent to Bly Saturday to start the bridge and Crane mill will supply timbers. A channel will be dug to take the water across the road in a narrow gap.
Crane told the county officials that he had only enough logs to run until Saturday noon. If the road cannot be used by the trucks, he anticipated it would be necessary to close down the mill at that time.

Sprague Overflows Banks
Rapid melting of the snowbanks in the mountains had swelled the Sprague river over its banks all through the valley in the Bly country. In many places, the river is more than 100 yards wide. The point where the road trouble developed is only a few feet from the bridge on the Bly-Campbell road across the Sprague.
Quartz creek and Drew's creek, running east from the divide, also were roaring along with the over-supply of water Friday. Drew's reservoir is filled even to a greater extent than last year.
Engineer Howard said that no other country roads are flooded, although water lines the road grades throughout the Sprague river district, filling the roadside ditches.

Darrow "Mental Whittler" on 79th Anniversary

CHICAGO, April 18 (AP)—Clarence Darrow—central character in a long list of courtroom dramas who has cast himself in the role of a "mental whittler"—observed the 79th anniversary of his birth today.
The venerable attorney has retired from active practice but has maintained his interest in the profession.
The law, he said in an interview, was a "horrible business."
He added: "There is no such thing as justice—in or out of court."
If doctors treated the causes of physical illness as lawyers and judges handled crime, Darrow asserted, treatment of disease would again be like "black magic."
The aged criminal lawyer outlined the philosophy of his life: "It's been the desire to help the poor, the outcast; to see the common man have a share."
"I say that religion is the belief in future life and in God," he said. "I don't believe in either."
"At 29," commented Darrow, "man is full of fight and hope. He wants to reform the world. When he's 79, he still wants to reform the world but he knows he can't."
The lawyer held a man did his best work when he was 40 to 50 years old.
He became more idealistic, he added, with advancing age.
"I have taken many cases where there was no hope of a fee," he explained. "I didn't do that when I was young."
Darrow devotes most of his time to reading and "mental whittling" in his home near the University of Chicago. He passed his anniversary there quietly.
His recent activities included a trip to Joliet penitentiary, where he visited Nathan Leopold, Darrow's defended Leopold, and the since slain Richard Loeb in their widely publicized trial for the Bobby Franks slaying of 1924. He also pleaded for leniency for an imprisoned negro banker in an appearance before the state parole board.
"I don't get out much any more," he said. "And you know people don't come to see you unless they have a bill."
