DETROIT, CUBS CAPTURE GAMES

Boston, Cleveland Lead Way With American Loop Wins.

By The Associated Press. The Cleveland Indians and the Boston Red Sox are showing a total disregard for the prediction of experts that Detroit is destined to repeat its triumphant march of last year.

Six days along the way, each with four games won and one lost, these teams are providing definite grounds for the contention that a rocky road beckons the mighty men of Cochrane. The Red Sox haven't had to use a relief hurler yet and Bob Grove and Wes Ferrell have started off in a manner to make rival managers wrinkle their brows. The Indians haven't needed good pitching thus far, for the batsmen have settled issues on pure offensive power.

Rowe Wins From Sox

The speedy progress of these two teams in the American league and the Giants in the National Sunday awoke the respective champions to their responsibilities. Detroit barged in to the win column with Schoolboy Rowe pitching a 5-0 shut-out over the Chicago White Sox while the Cubs, with Chuck Klein belting out of Cochrane, collected 16 hits for a 15-6 victory over the Cincinnati Reds.

The Athletics made a surprising stand against the Red Sox even though they did go down 1-1 for their fifth straight defeat.

Huskies Capture Three Crew Races From California

LAKE WASHINGTON, Seattle, April 20. (UP)—Inspired by the Berlin Olympics, Washington swept to three successive, impressive victories over the California crews in the 33rd annual regatta on the Sheridan beach course Saturday afternoon.

An estimated crowd of 50,000 spectators saw Coach Al Ulbrickson's great varsity whip the California crew by about two and a half lengths in the final, main event of the day. The time was 15:56.4 for the three-mile course.

Frosh Win By Five Lengths The Washington Frosh won the two-mile race by five lengths in 10 minutes and 11 seconds. The Husky Jayvee boat whipped the California Jayvees by seven lengths in 15:14.2 over the three-mile course.

The triple win was a magnificent tribute to coaches Al Ulbrickson and Tom Bolles, who teach the old Hiram Conbeare long, smooth, powerful stroke.

It was simply a case of too much power with Washington carrying all the sock.

Course Nearly Smooth Only a slight ripple from a southeast wind roused the water when the varsity boats were sent away by Referee Elmer Leader, brother of Yale's crew coach, at 4:28 p. m.

Coach Ky Ehlright of California, former Washington cox, sent his men out to try to get the jump. The Bears, stroked by Gene Berkenkamp of Sacramento, snapped into a 35 beat.

The blue-tipped blades sent the California clipper into a slight lead. The Bears held a half-length margin 300 yards out.

But Coxswain Bobby Moech of Montezano was not caught napping. He moved his boat up to 56 and the Husky clipper raced even with the California shell.

Down the first mile they raced with little to choose between them. Then the Bears tried to go out in front with short, snappy strokes.

Berkenkamp, the six foot, one inch stroke of last year's championship Poughkeepsie crew, hit up to 35.

Washington matched it with "ten big ones" and was up to 36. It was at the two-mile buoy and the crowd sensed that it was the fight for the telling advantage that might win the race.

New Course Record Washington moved out in front by a length—then gradually increased it by inches and rowed ahead two lengths for a final burst across the finish line.

The time was a new course record on this beautiful sheltered waterway, shadowed by the Cascades and Mount Rainier.

The triple win was nothing new to Washington at the Huskies made a clean sweep of the regatta at Oakland Estuary last year, only to have the California varsity win the national intercollegiate title at Poughkeepsie.

Art Garibaldi enjoyed a super hit but useless day at bat. The Sacramento second sacker hit a home run, two doubles and three singles in eight times at bat. But for all that the Senators lost to the San Francisco Missions 7-4, 2-1. Walter Beck saved the opener by stopping an eighth inning Senator rally. The bases were loaded and only one away when he was called to retire the side and did.

Behind the steady pitching of Ed Stutz the San Francisco Seals turned on the Seattle Indians 7-1 in the afternoon after losing the morning game 5-3.
