

Stock Market Quotations

NEW YORK, April 20. (AP)—A late selling wave knocked the props from under today's stock market after the list had displayed selective firmness during the greater part of the session.

While mild last-minute support arrived for scattered issues, losses, generally, ranged from fractions to more than 3 points. The close was heavy. Transfers were around 1,600,000 shares.

Some of the steels, motors and specialties were given a moderate upward push in the morning, but they fell with the rest in the final hour's downturn. For awhile the ticker tape was 3 minutes or so behind floor transactions, the most active performance in several weeks.

Brokers attributed the reaction partly to the fact that the list had reluctantly responded to optimistic economy developments, indicating to some that these may have been discounted. The Italo-Ethiopian crisis was also seen as a factor.

Columbian Carbon broke about 6 points, and lesser declines were shown by Case, Johns-Manville, Deere, Du Pont, Allied Chemical, Westinghouse, U. S. Steel, Bethlehem, General Motors, Chrysler, Union Pacific, Santa Fe, N. Y. Central and Delaware & Hudson. Secondary bonds were inclined to follow stocks.

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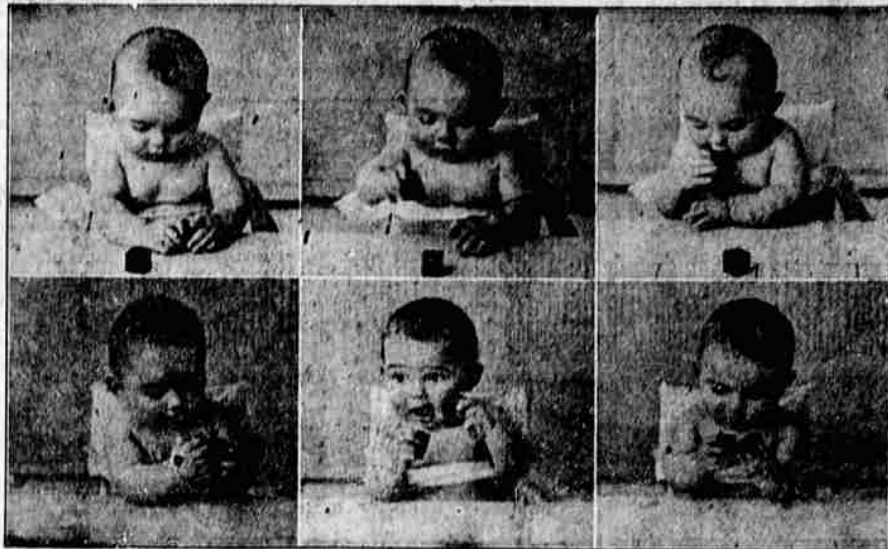

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Strides in Mental, Physical Growth Shown



The baby at 24 weeks, shown in upper panel, can play with only one block at a time. But every week he is becoming more dexterous. The same baby appearing in the lower panel at 28 weeks immediately grasps both blocks and even brings them together. This is just one of the many remarkable examples of the rapid development in infancy pictured in "Life Begins," the seven-reel talking motion picture tracing the growth and development of human infants.

Reactions Measure Growth of Infants' Intelligence

Numerous examples of intellectual growth of infants are systematically shown in the talking motion picture, "Life Begins," to be shown at the Fremont school Wednesday evening, April 22, starting at 8 o'clock.

Intelligence has come to be recognized as one of the most important possessions of the child. It grows just as the body grows, and likewise it has its inception before birth. Intelligence of the child is measured or estimated by what he can do. In school children one of the best indices of intellectual growth is vocabulary, that is, the number of words that the child can use correctly.

Since language is either lacking or only rudimentary during the first year of life, the intelligence of an infant is difficult to judge. It is only by observing the infant's reactions to strings, toys, chairs, hidden objects, mirrors, and people that an approximate estimate can be made of the extent of the infant's intellectual growth.

In the picture, "Life Begins" which was filmed in the infant clinic at Yale university, the average intellectual performance of a number of infants are depicted. Technically speaking, the picture consists of a series of norms. For example, the film shows that at 12 weeks the average infant merely looks at a small red cube that is placed about a foot in front of him. At 20 weeks this looking is accompanied by active approach movements of arms and body, and at 24 weeks the average infant touches, moves, or even grasps the cube. Grasping at 24 weeks is distinctly different from adult grasping, however, for the infant makes little or no use of its thumb. It is not until the youngster reaches the age of 36 or 40 weeks that the thumb comes to oppose the fingers. This thumb opposition is a strictly human characteristic for in apes and monkeys the thumb acts as a finger.

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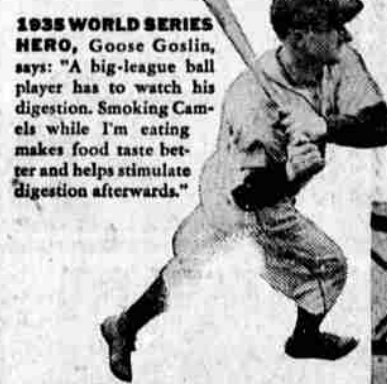
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
