For a Better City

THIS newspaper is glad to do what plugging it can in behalf of clean-up week. This week has been given that designation, and the junior chamber of commerce is hard at work in an effort to make Klamath Falls people conscious of the importance of improving the appearance of private property throughout the community. Recent years have found steady progress here along that line. Home surroundings have been vastly improved with gardens, lawns and trees. This has not been confined to the pretentious homes, either. Many a humble cottage has been made a better place to live by persons with the vision and the gumption to fix it up and improve the grounds.

There is still a lot to be done, however. There are a good many vacant lots that play host to high weeds and quantities of trash. Many properties are in need of further improvement along the line of painting, repairing, lawn planting, and removal of piles of trash and old buildings. Property holders who have made good starts toward maintaining clean, attractive places will want to continue the good work this year.

That Tabled Ordinance

CONSIDERABLE editorial comment has appeared in Oregon newspapers concerning the beauty parlor advertising ordinance which was proposed, and later tabled, at meetings of the Klamath Falls city council. All that has come to our attention checks with the unfavorable reaction to the proposal that developed here. It is felt that beauty parlors are a business enterprise, and that any attempt to legislate against competition, and to prohibit the advertising of prices, would be poor policy on the part of the city council.

Tabling of the ordinance, therefore, seems to be in line with general opinion. Whether that means permanent abandonment of the scheme was not stated at the council meeting, but we believe that the beauty parlor operators themselves, now that the thing has been thoroughly discussed, will agree that it is better as it is, and that it ought not to be revived.

Dr. Hunter Is Coming

IT'S NOT TOO early to give thought to the annual meeting of the Klamath county chamber of commerce, to be held April 29 at the Willard hotel.

The speaker is to be Dr. Frederick M. Hunter, the chancellor of higher education in Oregon. Dr. Hunter boasts a long and notable career as an educator. He came into the difficult situation in Oregon and already has done much to iron out the troubles that have beset higher education in this state for years.

The chancellor has not visited this part of the state before. He will see Klamath Falls and Lakeview on his trip down to address the chamber's annual meeting.

His visit here affords a rare opportunity to hear an outstanding man. A capacity crowd is expected at the chamber dinner, which is open to the public. It should be one of the big events of the year in Klamath Falls.

Christian Science Church

"Doctrine of Atonement" was the subject of the Lesson-Sermon in all Churches of Christ, Scientist, on Sunday, April 19. The Golden Text was: "The preaching of the cross is to them that perish foolishness; but unto us which are saved it is the power of God" (I Cor. 1:18). Among the citations which comprised the Lesson-Sermon was the following from the Bible: "There is in any man in Christ, he is a new creature: old things are passed away; behold, all things are become new. And all things are of God, who hath reconciled us to himself by Jesus Christ, and hath given to us the ministry of reconciliation" (II Cor. 5:17, 18).

The Lesson-Sermon also included the following correlative passages from the Christian Science textbook, "Science and Health with Key to the Scriptures," by Mary Baker Eddy: "The atonement of Christ reconciles man to God, not God to man; for the divine Principle of Christ is God, and how can God propitiate Himself? Christ is Truth, which reaches no higher than itself. The fountain can rise no higher than its source. Christ, Truth, could conciliate no nature above his own, derived from the eternal Love. It was therefore Christ's purpose to reconcile man to God, not God to man" (p. 18, 19).

The Inside Story From The Capital

WASHINGTON, April 20.—A congressional authority is digging up data on rumor factories. He intends to have one of the congressional investigating committees look into the matter. Also it would not be surprising if he gets some help from the justice department shortly.

His advance information indicates there are no fewer than three or four organizations which will start a malicious rumor over the country for you at a price. Two of these outfits are said to maintain respectable fronts. They were originally organized for merchandising purposes and not into rumor mongering as a sideline.

One of the group is supposed to have started that malicious whisper about a certain brand of cigarettes some months back. Their latest products are fantastic whistlings that there was something wrong about the death of Governor Ritchie. James M. Beck and one or two other prominent opponents of the new deal who have died recently. They seem to have avoided President Roosevelt as a subject during the last few months.

Protest against them is very hard to get, but they are now inner indications that they will not be in business long.

GULLIBILITY
 To show you how foolishly people follow rumors: A commission now is pursuing a financial house and 14 co-defendants for hiring agents to go around the country circulating rumors about a certain stock. The agents received \$10 to \$25 per 100 shares to make a market for the stock merely with whispers. They went to different cities and spread the word in the right places about what a good thing it was. Gullible persons increased the daily volume of purchases six times over and drove the price up fifty per cent so the big shots could get out at a profit.

At least this is the government side of the story, and it has been done before.

APPRAISAL
 Business men seem to know more about politics now than they did before and during the depression. More of them seem to have an understandable knowledge of practical prospects.

For instance, one of the top-notchers, who cannot be quoted, has this practical slant on the political outlook:

If business fights hard, Mr. Roosevelt can be beaten, but if it temporizes he will win.

With some improvement in business and some modification of extreme new deal policies.

This business man, as an anti-new dealer, fears that business may now begin to pull its punches and lose interest.

BUYING POWER
 A new kind of model campaign speech is that of Senator Logan entitled "Why Kentucky Is for the New Deal."

It was inserted in the Congressional Record (without reading) April 9 by the senate democratic floor leader.

Mr. Logan's appeal to reason is almost entirely the fact that the new deal dropped \$227,000,000 of federal donations into Kentucky. He gives names and amounts of each item in millions, including: AAA \$20,000,000, CCC \$23,000,000, direct relief \$36,000,000, CWA \$9,000,000, PWA \$30,000,000, etc., etc.

NOTES
 The new dealers have tired of the Van Nuys bill proposing heavy penalties for business men who influence the vote of their employees. It is being quietly strangled in the house judiciary committee because it is a little too raw. What made them realize it was a counter proposal to prevent federal officials from doing the same thing.
