

# YOUTH KILLED IN MISHAP AT MALIN TODAY

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Injury, and never regained consciousness after the accident, although hope was held out for her recovery until shortly before her death.

The accident occurred when the steering gear and brakes on Mrs. Driscoll's car failed last Friday morning and the machine swerved sharply across Oregon avenue, going over the curb and striking Mrs. Musselman and her two children. The children were uninjured, Mrs. Driscoll was driving at a moderate rate of speed when the accident occurred, according to witnesses and investigating officers. She and two friends were en route to Crater lake.

Mrs. Musselman was rushed to Klamath Valley hospital, and it was at first believed that her injuries were of a minor nature, consisting of a concussion of the brain.

She was a native of Kootenai, Ida., and has been a resident of Klamath Falls for the past seven years.

She is survived by her husband, and a small son and daughter, as well as her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Bert H. Robideaux, of Klamath Falls, two brothers and one sister.

Funeral arrangements will be announced later.

There will be no inquest, according to Dr. George H. Adler, county coroner, and it is probable that there will be no further official investigation other than routine reports. It was stated by the district attorney's office.

"These ex-officio members are then required under the law to appoint four others, one to be a member of the medical association, another to be a member of the dental association, and two laymen. Undoubtedly, however, the ex-officio members of the board will follow your recommendations as to the appointments.

"As to your other recommendations, that is, the setting up of a new system of county sanitary inspection and the creation of a budget, these matters will have to be considered and acted upon by the board of health after the members have been appointed and organized.

"The county court at this time wishes to express its appreciation to you and the members of your committee for the splendid work done and to assure you that at all times this court will see that proper standards of health and sanitation are maintained free from political interference."

Nevertheless, the committee action represents a big step forward in our program for inclusion of Oregon and the Columbia river on the defense map of the Pacific.

"I think it means ultimate victory. We are very grateful to Senators McNary and Stewer and Representative Mott, Pierce and Ekwall for the effective manner in which they supported and promoted our objectives."

PORTLAND, April 22 (AP)—Col. Thomas M. Robins, division engineer of the war department, made an unfavorable report today upon the proposal for further improvement of Siuslaw river and bar.

In most states (as well as in Washington) the lawmakers are devoting their time, chiefly to weighty subjects such as voting ourselves rich by the process of going deeper into debt.
